Unfortunately, there aren't as many Brothers serving in our schools as there once were. The average age of the Brothers of Holy Cross is over 70 years old. Many of the Brothers are in their 80s or older.

Our older Brother's medical and nursing care costs have risen so high that it is impossible for the working Brothers to shoulder on their own. That's why I am writing to you for your help.
