Dear Friend,

Last year I wrote you to explain the conditions at Columba Hall, the home of the Brothers of Holy Cross on the University of Notre Dame campus. Today, I am pleased to inform you, that since that letter, many things have changed. Thanks to friends like you, donations poured in and I have been deeply moved.

Columba Hall, where brothers have lived in community for over 100 years, is finally being refurbished.

Throughout the spring and summer we watched as Columba Hall slowly improved. During prayer, we could hear the pleasant sound of hammers and saws. Enter the hallway and carpenters were carrying ladders. The elevator would open to workers carrying buckets of debris. The sweet smells of drying plaster and fresh paint were like incense permeating the chapel.

Because Columba Hall is managed by the Brothers of Holy Cross (not the university), it was one of the only buildings on campus that had not been upgraded for many years. As religious men, who live according to the vow of poverty, our pooled salaries simply were not enough to make necessary repairs. It had come to the point that our ability to stay in our sacred community home, Columba Hall, was seriously threatened.

Here Is What the Phase I Donations Have Already Accomplished:

- 1. Maintenance to the building's fire safety equipment was completed to meet all local fire codes.
- 2. Fourteen single rooms were converted to seven larger ones, each with a private bathroom.
- 3. Three other sleeping rooms were expanded to include existing adjacent bathrooms.
- 4. The walk-in freezer/refrigerator in our dining hall has been repaired. It had been dangerous and wasteful because of leaks, moisture and mold problems due to old and insufficient insulation.

After my last letter, friends like you rallied to help. To my surprise and relief, our campaign to save Columba Hall is already halfway to completion. All the emergency repairs have been completed and we won't be forced to leave Columba any time soon.

With Phase I completed (see sidebar), we are about to enter Phase II.

Now we are trying to create accommodations for several more of our older brothers. We hope they can remain at Columba so we can save the high costs associated with assisted living facilities. For the most part, we can take care of our own if they have a handicapped accessible room with individual bathrooms.


To make this possible, we need to continue the renovation efforts until we have added restrooms and showers to six more rooms. In addition, we always reserve extra rooms for visiting brothers and priests who come to the university for meetings, conferences, teaching and other religious purposes of the Congregation of Holy Cross. These three guest rooms are in need of similar renovations. Lastly, the harsh winters of northern Indiana have taken a toll on the asphalt roadways at Columba Hall, and they are in very poor condition. Phase II renovations must also attend to the need for the driveway and parking areas to be repaired and resurfaced.

St. André Bessette, C.S.C.

The brothers have always demonstrated their love for God by doing his work simply and humbly. This year, we are proud to announce that one of our own, Brother André Bessette, C.S.C., of Montreal, has been canonized as the first Saint of the Congregation of Holy Cross. Like all of us, St. André lived a simple life, followed his vows, as he performed the tasks given him by the Congregation.

His life's work was to be the doorkeeper for Notre Dame College in Quebec. He performed this work with such devotion and grace that people began to come to the college just to visit Brother André. He would greet them with friendship and anoint them with oil from the chapel

lamp, which always burned before St. Joseph's statue. Then he would pray that St. Joseph would intercede for his visitors.



As time

went on, many miraculous healings were attributed to the friendly doorkeeper, but Brother André was always clear that the credit be given to St. Joseph.

Now we can pray directly to Saint André, the doorman of Montreal, for he demonstrated through consistent acts of hospitality and constant attention to prayer that sainthood can be found in living out the two greatest commandments: "Love God above all else and love thy neighbor as thyself."

they pass the cemetery on their way to the grotto.




Though you may not know the brothers introduced in our letter, they are members of "a great band of men...who walked side by side in their following of the Lord."


