Reflecting on Congregation's 175-year legacy

Dear Friends in Holy Cross,

September 13, 1841, marked the arrival of the first members of the Congregation of Holy Cross in the United States. As we celebrate our 175th Anniversary in this country, it is good to reflect on our legacy.

That first group of Holy Cross religious in America was a practical one composed of six Brothers and a priest. Though invited to be educators, the group also included a carpenter, a tailor, and a farmer. That diversity of laborers, especially among the Brothers, has been critical to our sustained success over these many years. The brothers' way of life, like the Mystical Body, has always supported a family of generous and dedicated men sharing a wealth of needed gifts that have contributed to the overall success of our mission as educators in the faith.



Beginning with my first day of meeting Holy Cross Brothers in high school, I have been inspired by their dedication, creativity, and faithfulness. Since that providential day in 1963, I have encountered many more brothers, who have had a profound impact on the life of students like me and on the lives of their families. As provincial, I have heard many of you share stories of brothers who have been nothing short of miracle workers in the ways they have influenced you. Sometimes it was in what they taught, bringing to life academic material that opened new doors and informed your lives. In other cases it was how our brothers interacted with you outside of the classroom. These brothers communicated hope and promise that helped to transform you beyond the classroom.

In this annual letter we share and celebrate the lives of three brother educators who have been and still are active in the classrooms of our schools. They are but representative of the many brothers who have made a difference in

the lives of so many. Today we recognize how these three brothers, like all who preceded them in our 175-year history in the United States, are Men with Hope to Bring.

Yes, the legacy begun here in 1841 continues!

Those who know Brother Dennis Bednarz, C.S.C., know he can best be described as passionate and driven, his many loves including his native Chicago, the game of baseball, politics, history, and the Congregation of Holy Cross.

When Brother James Van Dyke, C.S.C. returned to Holy Trinity High School in Chicago, he had been away for nearly 40 years, and Holy Trinity had been without a Brother of Holy Cross on the faculty for nearly a decade. The students, faculty and staff were excited to welcome a brother back to our hallways, especially one with such incredible experiences from his career in law to bring to the classroom.

Brother James teaches Government and Law, World History, and AP U.S. Government at Holy Trinity. He is a favorite among the students, making the often

difficult class materials understandable and relatable to their own lives. He is known among the students as caring, kind and always available for help.

“This school was founded by the Brothers, so I think



it's so cool to have one as a teacher," Viviana Alcala, Class of 2017, said. "He brings an energetic light to the classroom, like a ray of sunshine, and he makes the class fun and exciting."

Having a brother back at Holy Trinity has given the students a visible representation of the charism of Holy Cross that is often discussed. Students, faculty and staff appreciate the gentle wisdom Brother James provides both in the classroom and out.

"One of the things I love most about Brother James is that he is a living model of what it means to be Holy Cross," Principal Marianne Lynch said. "The students relate to him and appreciate him, and when they read

Holy Cross material and the writings of Blessed Basil Moreau, they can immediately connect those ideas to Brother James and the way he teaches and lives."

"Holy Trinity has changed my life twice. First, when I was a new teacher (1970s and 1980s), and again when I returned in 2014 (to present)," Brother James said. "The secret? The unique bonds in the Holy Trinity family of students and staff and its dynamism continues to shape my life, so I hope I am doing something to pay it back."

The Holy Cross mission is brought to life most vividly in the actions of the brothers at each school, but each school reflects that mission and gives back to every brother. We can all be very grateful. ✠

After school he might be helping a student prepare for an audition in the local symphony orchestra and at night he crochets countless afghans and scarves for the school auction.

"Rarely have I met a teenager I do not like. I tried retirement," Brother Phil said. "It didn't work." ✠
