THE EUCHARISTIC LITURGY OF RESSURECTION was celebrated on October 25, for Brothers Crispin Reeb and Theophilus Machalinski. Father Paul Doyle, C.S.C., served as presider. Readings for the liturgy were: Wisdom 3:1-9, Romans 6:3-9; John 11:19-27. Father Kenneth Grabner, C.S.C., was homilist.

In his homily he recalled the thought that each person has two births: one from the womb of our mothers into the world, and then from the womb of the world into the fulness of the next life. This images with the bird being pushed out of its nest into the broader world, a death and rebirth. "Little birds aren't always happy about this, of course, but consider the alternative. Life is like the mother bird that pushes its offspring out. In our life we are pushed out of the nest of this world into the expanded consciousness that will be our gift in the next world."

(Services for the deceased Brother Crispin Reeb, Southwest Province, were celebrated with Brother Theophilus. A niece of Brother Crispin, Mrs. Jean Burns, presented a remembrance at the evening wake service. The text follows.)

I am sure wherever he was assigned, he touched many a life as he has done mine. None of us is without fault; nor was my uncle. "I am sure I speak for my relatives as well as



(The Wake Service for Brother Theophilus was held on October 29 in the evening. Following is the "remembrance" as presented by Brother Thomas R. Henning. Since the talk given was extemporaneous, the following are Thomas' recollections of his reflection.)

I was with Brother Theo at Holy Trinity High School (Chicago, Illinois) for years and also again at St. Edward High School (Lakewood, Ohio). It is difficult for me to give this talk as I had become very close to him in his closing years.

Theophilus was born in Erie, PA., one of 12 children. He certainly learned to share, and no doubt this helped him as a Brother of Holy Cross. Lord knows, we as religious do a lot of sharing and brother did a lot of that. He applied for admission to the community at the young age of 14.

During his approximately 33 years at Trinity, he was a teacher and an administrator. I was the kid on the faculty at that time and have fond memories of not only Theo, but Maximus, Victor, and others. When Theo would come then to my room after night prayer, he would tell me things like: don't open all the windows because I was wasting heat; or turn the lights off in the classroom on a bright sunny day, but he would always end with a little pat on the back for encouragement.

In the early days at Holy Trinity, the Brothers would put the students' grades on cards that were in

the house library. As a young religious, I would keep tons of grades, add them up, divide to see what the student would get. After awhile, it dawned on me that the older brothers would be in the library late Sunday night and record their grades for the boys. Theo told me he would look at all the grades on a boy's card, take the average of them, and then he would give the student his grade. He said that he was probably too hard on the boys and in this way he felt he gave them a fair grade and a balanced report card. If a boy had mostly A's, Theo would at least give him a B.

Brother Theophilus worked very hard in the house when he was in Lakewood. He would mop the basement corridor almost everyday, would take out the trash, and all sorts of other housekeeping activities. I would watch him empty the trash from my office window. I would reflect that there was a man who at one time was what we call a "big shot" considering the many years of administrative service he had given. Now he was humbly doing things for others in another way. The students at St. Ed's used to call him "brother free day," knowing full well that I would close school for a few days upon his death. He fooled all of us by living one day beyond his 98th birthday.

Now he is with God enjoying eternal rest and interceding for us. I know he will especially remember us with vocations to Holy Cross.

Good-bye Theo; I thank God for our friendship, for the time I was blessed to share with you.

myself: when possible, Uncle Henry was there for us, be it a first communion, wedding, or a death in the family. We could depend and rely on his presence and support with words of encouragement or through a phone call from him to let us know we were not forgotten. It meant so much. He always showed genuine interest in our projects whether large or small.

"His gifts to us as children were our rosaries. Let it be our gift to uncle to reflect on each of these beads his good deeds and pray that his journey to heaven will be a swift one.

"To you brothers, he was known as Chris; to my aunts, cousins, brothers and sisters, he was Uncle Henry. To me, he was not only my uncle; he was my buddy. Brother Chris, Uncle Henry, our friend, may

you rest in God's peace."

Father Paul Doyle, C.S.C., also gave reflections about his association with Brother Crispin. Using the statement, "Cleanliness is next to Godliness," he listed some of the ways brother modeled this.

"Godliness was evidenced in his efforts and concern for the sake of the local community which were practiced for the love of God. No one, no cause, no thing rivaled God in his life. Some of us well remember him as having the highest priority in his faithfulness to prayer.


"Chris knew much of God. When the Master returned for him Chris recognized Him, faced Him, embraced Him. He had the confidence that the Lord's embrace lasts forever."

COLUMBA HALL, 1989

Responding to Chapter legislation because of the needs for satisfactory housing for the retired religious of the Midwest Province, a major renovation program was begun and is now nearing completion.


The concern for the life-safety needs of the members of the house meant an entirely new electrical system, heating system, along with the installation of a sprinkling and smoke alarm system. The action began during the month of May with asbestos removal and continues thru the month of November. The final touches being put into place include completing the renovation of some private rooms, the dining room, and entrance. Carpeting of the corridors will complete the action by many laborers in many fields under the supervision of the Panzica Company, South Bend, Indiana.

On August 25, 1954, Columba Hall received its name. Prior to that the building was called, Community House. The name change was in honor of **BROTHER COLUMBA O'NEILL** who had lived there for 25 years of his religious life. He died in 1923. **BROTHER GERARD FITZ** was superior when the name-change took place.



The Community House was built during the year 1900 responding to a need for a house for the Holy Cross religious living on campus who were not directly involved with students. The cost of building was said to have been \$20,000; the bill for the present renovation comes to \$1,000,000. Time has added some 0's.

In 1946, after the formation of homogeneous provinces, the Brothers established their Provincial headquarters in the Community House. The last minutes of the Community House prior to the change included this note, "Here ends the minutes of the local council of the Community House as a combined Society." **BROTHER JACOB EPPLEY**, presently a member of the Southwest Province now residing at St. Joseph Hall, St. Edward's University, Austin, Texas, served as the first Brother Superior.



Looking back, in 1959-1960, there were ninety-two Brothers in residence at Columba Hall which seems to be the highest on record. This number did increase during the summer months when "Brother students" were in residence.

Among the most distinguished visitors: it needs to be noted that Brother Andre, founder of the Oratory of St. Joseph, Montreal, was listed. He was a delegate to the General Chapter of the Congregation held at Notre Dame during the summer of 1920. Brother Andre returned to campus in 1927 for the consecration of Bishop



The Sisters of the Holy Cross too were in residence at the Community House at one time. Sister Holy Family served as infirmarian. Their superior was Sister Pulcheria. One incident showing the strict diagnostic screening, concerns a novice who was probably suffering from novitiate battle fatigue. When he appeared before Sister and reported that he needed a rest, the response was different than he might have expected. "Rest, is it?" said the Sister, "this is no rest home. You Have a good bed in your own house; sleep in it." And she dismissed him. In today's world the report might be that he was suffering from nervous exhaustion and bring the doctors, both mental and physical.




The provincial council was in residence at the Community House in 1946. Renovation projects since then included the installation of an elevator during Brother Ephrem's first term of office as provincial, 1946-1950. The price tag was \$17,000. During his second term, 1950-1956, air conditioning equipment was installed in chapel for \$1,200. In 1958, under the provincial administration of **BROTHER DONATUS SCHMITZ**, total improvements amounted to \$154,545 with a proposed kitchen remodelling plan to cost \$31,000. Interestingly, this total is in excess of the assessed value of the property at the time of the lease in 1946. Some renovation of the Chapel took place in 1958 with further work there starting on September 17, 1984.

The Community House/Columba Hall has seen changes during its lifetime in the 20th century. The present contractor has made efforts to be aware of the history of the building in designing the present renovation. One example is the restoration of the wainscot throughout the building. Also the entrance way has been remodeled and now looks "just like it used to," according to **BROTHER JUDE COSTELLO**, a present resident and former superior.

As the doors are opened with special invitations on December 3, 1989, a tradition continues at Columba Hall, making an effort to be a Community House, a residence and place of hospitality for Midwest Province membership, all C.S.C. religious, and friends and guests who visit.




CSC APOSTOLATES - APOSTLES

DHAKA, BANGLADESH: BARACA

BROTHER RONALD DRAHOZAL serves as director of Baraca, the Rehabilitation Assistance Centre for Drug Addicts. The centre was established on July 1, 1988; therefore, a rather new service for Holy Cross in Dhaka.

In 1987 **BROTHER DONALD BECKER** visited a rehabilitation centre for drug addicts in Kathmandu, Nepal. He was impressed by their efforts and felt a great need for a centre of a similar type in Bangladesh. Returning to Dhaka, Donald shared his concerns with **BROTHER JARILATH D'SOUZA** and learned that he already had started counselling and providing other assistance for drug addicts.

The finances for the centre came through the Brothers for the first two months. Then Caritas of Bangladesh began to help BARACA until it became one of its projects in March, 1980


NOTRE DAME, INDIANA; WSND-FM (88.9 mh)
