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More resolve for Peace and Justice in '86

+ History was made on January 1, 1986, when the Rose Bowl Parade was interrupted in order to have two world leaders address each other's nations via television.

Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev spoke first to the American people, followed by President Reagan, who, in turn, spoke to the people of the Soviet Union.

The two leaders agreed that the recent summit was a first step to easing tensions and echoing sentiments that the American and Soviet peoples are peace-loving.

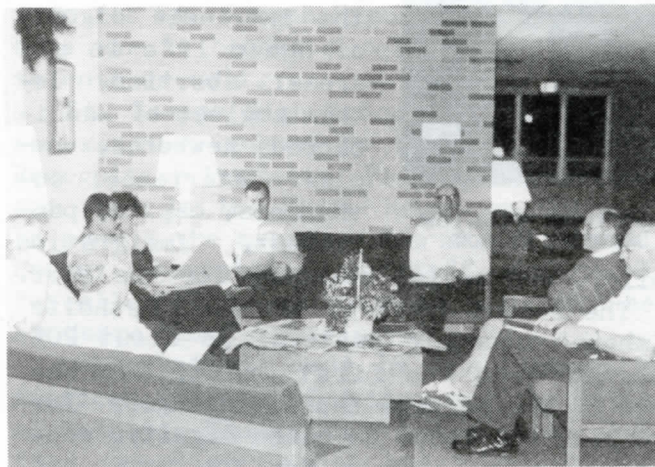
It was indeed a fitting way to start off the New Year of 1986--a year dedicated to the pursuit of world peace. Although peace is the main issue in both addresses, the subject of justice was alluded to only by President Reagan. Nevertheless, it was a welcomed viewing of television after a year of reports of terrorism, corruption, injustice, and tragedy.

Putting words into action

+ Two meetings on Peace and Justice were held in the Notre Dame area during the month of December. The first was held on December 4 at Columba Hall and the other on December 19 at the Brothers' Center.

The two major questions asked at the Columba Hall meeting were: Why did you come to this meeting and What can be done? Replies from feeling powerless to halt nuclear weapons to helping Holy Cross Brothers to move on the issue; from simply seeking information to supporting the effort through prayer and education were voiced on the first question. Replies to the second question ranged from prayer to community, civic and religious, action. Writing letters to political leaders was a move adopted by several Brothers in attendance.

Bro. William Mewes was to draw up exam-

ple letters to Pres. Reagan and Gen. Sect. Gorbachev. Bro. Douglas Roach would contact Dr. James Muller, recent Nobel Peace Prize winner, to ask what the Brothers should be doing to promote nuclear sanity.

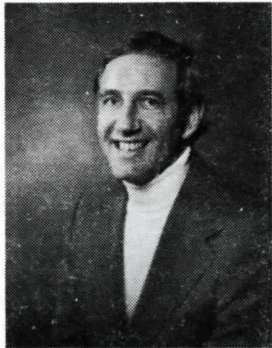
The December 19th meeting at the Brothers' Center addressed the very same questions. The replies followed the same areas of concern. It was reported that several Brothers from the Columba Hall meeting had sent prepared letters to Pres. Reagan and Gen. Sect. Gorbachev.

The Center meeting went on to emphasize a definite Holy Cross program for Peace and Justice. Two suggestions for action on the issues were to study and discuss the Bishops' Pastoral on Peace and Justice and to continue carrying announcements and articles in the HOLY CROSS BROTHERS publication.

Brother Charles Smith, who chaired the Center meeting, tentatively set a mid-January date for a combined meeting of Brothers from Columba Hall and the Center to be held at the Columba Hall. The meeting is to begin group study and discussion on the Bishops' Pastoral letter.

PEACE AND JUSTICE...By Br. Bill Mewes, CSC

+ Bishops have an obligation to speak out on moral issues. U.S. Catholic Bishops have done so, and it behooves us to consider some of their statements.

Cardinal Archbishop Bernardin of Chicago has strongly proclaimed the "consistent ethic" or "seamless garment" pro-life approach which respects the intrinsic dignity of human life in all areas: abortion, lethal neglect of handicapped newborns, nuclear deterrence, euthanasia, capital punishment, immigration

policy, and social spending for the poor.

The second draft of the U.S. Catholic Bishops' economic pastoral is about 20% shorter than the first draft, but the core of the message has not changed. For example, the focus on human dignity, economic rights, concern for the poor, and participation are still very evident. "The way society responds to the needs of the poor through its public policies is the litmus test of its justice and injustice," the new draft says. The text points out that the Church is not bound to any particular economic system or ideology, whether on the right or on the left. All systems must be judged by the criterion of human dignity. Also, more attention is given to the effects of military spending on the economy.

In his 1986 World Day of Peace message, Pope John Paul II said that the build up of nuclear weapons is still "the

most dramatic and compelling example" of how people can be held in "social and economic subjection" by force of power (CRITERION).

+++ Brother William co-authored (with Gary Houser) an article for VIEWPOINT on the editorial page of the SOUTH BEND TRIBUNE, Wednesday, December 4, 1985. The article: "Danger of accidental nuclear war is increasing," points out that a nuclear holocaust would more than likely be the result of accidental error rather than a planned aggressive attack. It is based on findings that seeming inexplicable, inconsistent and unpredictable human "goofs" account for 50 to 70 percent of all failures of major weapons and space vehicles.

Each anniversary of his beatification is yet another opportunity to celebrate his membership in the family of Holy Cross, in the Universal Church, and in the Communion of Saints.

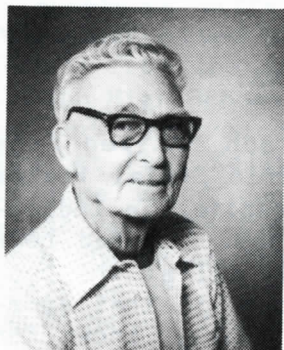

Brother Louis was born in Huron, Ohio, on November 30, 1895. He entered Holy Cross on October 20, 1921. From 1926 to the present he's been in New Orleans, Milwaukee, Portland, Watertown, Rolling Prairie, and at Moreau Seminary, Dujarie Hall, and Columba Hall on the Notre Dame campus. He has been in residence at Columba Hall since 1968.

Not all his work behind the plow on the many fields he turned has gone unnoticed. Very few, except maybe the "Gipper" President Reagan, recall Brother Louis' starring role in KNUTE ROCKNE, ALL-AMERICAN. Yes, Trivia fans, he was the farmer behind the plow in the scene depicting the plane crash in which Knute Rockne died.

St. Joseph High School was selected as an exemplary school by the Private School Recognition Project. Principal Glenn Rousey went to the White House on October 1 to accept the award on the staff's behalf. Between the lines

THE FUTURE OF OUR PAST: The Spanish Mystics Speak to Contemporary Spirituality, by Segundo Galilea, c. 1985, Ave Maria Press, Notre Dame, Indiana.

Some time ago I was at the Ave to buy a book. While there I started to browse through some of their new titles. **THE FUTURE OF OUR PAST** attracted my attention; so I bought a copy. You might call this impulse buying or a good \$5.00 investment. For me, this book turned out to be exactly what I am looking for at this point in my life.

The book is about Teresa of Avila, John of the Cross, and Ignatius of Loyola. For several years now I have been reading some of the top spiritual classics, and this book helps me on "how the mystics can enlighten and inspire some of our current Christian endeavors." There has been a tendency to shy away from reading the mystics, on my part, probably because of the word mystic. However, Segundo Galilea and others, including Thomas Merton, are now pointing out that "unless we take the trouble to reinterpret the cultural and religious language of the great spiritual masters, we will be depriving ourselves of access to the wealth of their experience and their message."

Segundo Galilea is a priest of the San-

tiago (Chile) Archdiocese. "He is director of the Chilean Foreign Mission Institute and an advisor to the U.S. Hispanic Apostolate. He is former director of CELAM'S Latin American Pastoral Institute, and a member of the staff of the Center for Intercultural Formation in Cuernavaca, Mexico."

THE FUTURE OF OUR PAST is easy to read. There are 94 pages in the book. Even if a person is very busy, the book is still to be read in a reflective mood. Almost every page has a quote from John or Teresa or Ignatius. Here is an interesting quote about Ignatius: "The Spiritual Exercises, which are the written synthesis of Ignatian spirituality, are essentially a contemplation of the humanity of Jesus in the most significant moments of his life in order to acquire 'an intimate knowledge of our Lord, who has become man for me, that I may love and follow Him better.'" (The Spiritual Exercises, Second Week).

JANUARY PRAYER FOR PEACE AND JUSTICE:

O God, source of all holy desires, right counsels, and just works, grant your servants that peace which the world cannot give, so that we may be obedient to your commands and under your protection enjoy peace in our days and freedom from fear of our enemies. This we ask in Jesus' name.

(Prayer: Votive Mass for Peace)

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
