## Provincial visits stress understanding

### NEW PROCEDURE FOR PROVINCIAL VISITS.

#### DUAL PRESENTATION IS PART OF NEW FORMAT.

+ Brothers from around the Notre Dame and South Bend area came together in the auditorium of Holy Cross Junior College on Saturday evening, February 15, for this year's opening of the Provincial Visit. It is the second time that such a visit was opened with a gathering of several area groups. The first such opening took place while Brother Thomas Moser, Provincial, attended the unification Chapter held in Bangladesh in late December and early January.

The purpose of the combined opening was to avoid needless repetition of relatively involved and lengthy presentations. It thus eliminated the usual formal opening and closing of a visit.

After Brother Thomas opened the meeting with a prayer, he turned the first part of the meeting to Brother Paul Kelly, Assistant Provincial, who explained the use of the document of Special Durable Power of Attorney and Living Will Declaration. It is a document that would allow a Brother to choose, in writing, another Brother of Holy Cross to carry out his wishes at a time of disability or incapacity. Once a Brother has been designated and the document witnessed by two other persons, the power of attorney is given to a member of the Holy Cross community and would not necessitate looking to a third party for decisions. This process, therefore, reaffirms the desire of a Brother to have his wishes carried out by another member of the same community that he freely chose to be his way of life.

Brother Paul then went on to explain the workings of the remainder of the document and answered a number of questions from the floor.

For the second presentation, Br. Thomas reviewed personality types as found in the

Myers-Briggs Personality Profiles. Assisted by Br. Paul, he went on to explain behavioral types that help to realize "How do we really understand one another in community?" Each Brother in attendance then filled out a profile sheet that was self-scored and studied. From the answers obtained, and in the light of Jungian psychology, it was then possible to have the means to gain a self-knowledge and the courage to embrace one's individual humanness as essential ingredients in both spiritual and psychological growth. Once understanding one's self, it is then possible to understand and appreciate others in community.

During the following week, Brothers Thomas and Paul were available for individual meetings with the Brothers in the Notre Dame and South Bend area.

Similar presentations and meetings took place in the Cleveland area starting on February 22 and in the Chicago area starting on March 1.

PEACE AND JUSTICE by Bro. William Mewes

+ The Soviets extended their nuclear test ban initiative for three months, until the end of March, 1986. The U.S. has carried out at least seven nuclear tests since the Soviets began their test moratorium in August of '85. If you believe the U.S. should join in a nuclear test ban, write President Reagan (The White House, Washington, D.C. 20500) and urge him to do so. You may also write your Congressperson (U.S. House, Wash., DC 205150) in support of HB 3442, which would stop all U.S. nuclear testing contingent upon the Soviets continuing to do likewise. A ban on nuclear explosive testing is seen as a first step toward a nuclear Freeze. The Freeze has been endorsed by our General Council and by our Midwest Province Chapter, 1982.

**Resources:** Perhaps the best material written for Catholics on the complete war and the peace issue is "The Challenge of Peace: God's Promise and Our Response," a pastoral letter by the U.S. Catholic Bishops. It's a must reading for anyone dealing with the issue, such as religion, history, and Current Events teachers. Any Catholic who speaks out on the issue of the nuclear arms race, or those who vote, should at least be familiar with the official summary or with the bishops' main statement points.

"Sojourners Magazine" lists resources. Their April 1985 issue has lists of books on the topics of justice, peacemaking, and liberation.

The Center For Peace Studies of Akron University publishes an International Peace Studies Newsletter which gives various resources in each issue. In order to get on the mailing list, write Center for Peace Studies, The University of Akron, Akron, OH 44325.

An annotated guide to introductory resources on the subject of peace, "First Steps to Peace: A Resource Guide", describes selections from over 100 organizations and publishers. It includes sections on pamphlets, books, films, speakers, etc. The booklet is produced by the Joel Brooke Memorial Committee, The Fund For Peace, 345 E. 46th Street, Suite 207, New York, NY 10017. The cost is \$2.60 postpaid, three for \$5.00.

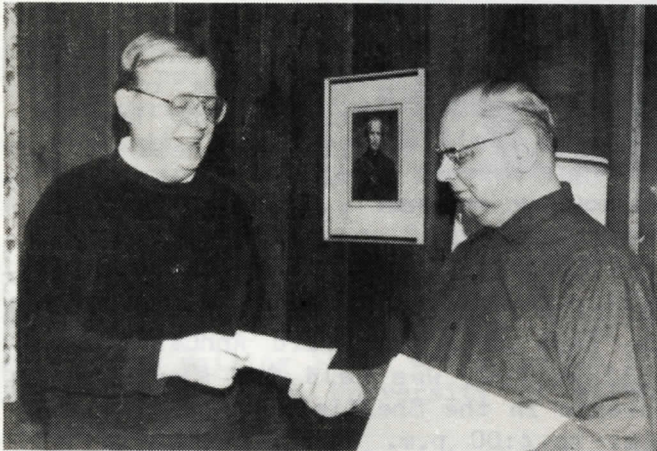


FROM THE ASSOCIATION OF ST. JOSEPH:

FROM THE EASTERN PROVINCE:

+ Brother John Paige (E), Director of Novices, circulated a paper entitled "The Identity of the Religious Brother in Holy Cross: An Historical Reflection. It was published on January 6, 1986.

The twenty-one page presentation is a scholarly synthesis of Holy Cross Brothers in a particular format for this time in history as we prepare to adopt a definitive Constitution at the General Chapter.

The reflections covering five periods in the history of the Congregation carefully analyze the foundation, expansion, revitalization, and stabilization that have taken place over the years.

Brother John concludes the presentation with statements from Fr. Barrosse's Circular Letter No. 24, in which he states: "It is imperative to remain open to change..to recognize that any changes we make will be followed by still further changes in the future..that we appreciate our distinctive vocation as religious of Holy Cross..that it is this that we want to put more effectively at the service of the Church and the world..and that it is indispensable that we approach the future in a spirit of discernment. The future is God's."

The complete reading of Brother John's paper during this year of the General Chapter would be one of the best preparations in understanding and appreciating the the work cut out for those working on and participating in the Chapter.

FROM MINNEAPOLIS, MINNESOTA:

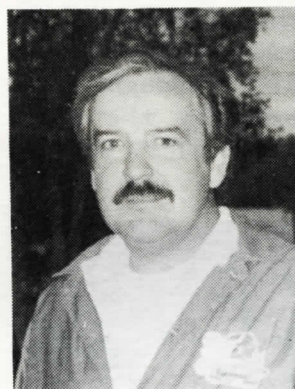
Brother Charles Smith, Director of the Midwest Province Office of Life Development, was one of two religious who delivered opening statements to the gathering. With interest areas of Charism, Identity, Public Witness, Community, Obedience, Structures of Authority, Consecration, and Mission to be covered at the meeting, Brother Charles stated that the painful work of CONVERSION must patiently continue if we are to be renewed; that our progress in ecumenism, Christianizing authority, liturgy, and spirituality should give us hope that we are proceeding correctly.

The other speaker was Sister Margaret Michael of the Sisters of the Holy Cross, who spoke on the historical renewal taking place in the lives of the Sisters.

The large gathering broke down into small groups that reported to the Bishop at the end of the dialogue. The over-all questions he responded to included: How can Religious contribute something unique, different from the contribution of other Christians, to the Christian life of the local Church and How can the local Church support and encourage Religious life in its midst?

### News from the Missions

FROM MONROVIA, LIBERIA, WEST AFRICA:

"Fortunately we had distanced ourselves enough from the events of last November that the curfew was lifted and we had a Midnight (11 p.m.) Mass in the local parish. On the way we first celebrated a semi-private Mass with our chaplain and then went on to the Archbishop's residence for Christmas dinner. All the local religious were his guests, and the FMM Sisters prepared a fine meal. In the evening we joined the Salisian community for socializing. Just three of us are here at the moment (Feb. 2), Bro. Edwin Mattingly, Fr. Martin, and I. It is difficult to be accustomed to Christmas here. Two things upset my normal perception of the season, one is the weather and the other is the end of the school year which comes just before Christmas. Four Christmases and I still have not adjusted my mental calendar. Only this year did it dawn on me that we had ended the school year without a Christmas program. 'Twill not be so in 1986.

### REFLECTIONS ON THE SPIRITUAL SPRINGTIME:

+ "For Christians, Lent is a spiritual springtime. The word Lent comes from the Old English word Lencten, which probably referred to the time of spring when the days first noticeably began to lengthen after the long cold nights of winter. There is ample biblical precedent for linking the spiritual seasons with the natural seasons." (The Word Among Us, Lent, 1984, page 6.)

"Special ministers of communion and deacons may bring blessed ashes to the sick and those confined to their homes. If a minister is not available, a member of the family or another person may bring blessed ashes to a shut-in, using one of the formulas in the Sacramentary to impose the ashes." (Congregation of Holy Cross Ordo, page 53.)

"Turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel." (Alternate formula in the Sacramentary for distributing ashes.)

"Come back to the Lord with all your heart; leave the past in ashes, and turn to God with tears and fasting, for he is slow to anger and ready to forgive." (Joel 2:13.)

"Something strange is happening--there is a great silence on earth today, a great

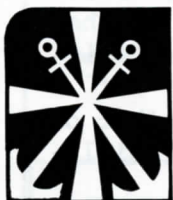
silence and stillness. The whole earth keeps silence because the King is asleep. The earth trembled and is still because God has fallen asleep in the flesh and he has raised up all who have slept ever since the world began. God has died in the flesh and hell trembles with fear." (From an ancient homily on Holy Saturday.)

"Do not be amazed; you see Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He is risen; he is not here." (Mark 16:6.)

"Rejoice, Heavenly Powers! Sing, choirs of Angels! Exult, all creation around God's throne! Jesus Christ, our King, is risen! Sound the trumpet of salvation!" (Sacramentary, page 297.)

"Praise to Thee, my Lord, for our Sister, Mother Earth, who sustains and directs, and brings forth varied fruits, and colored flowers and plants." (St. Francis of Assisi.)
