


"People helping people," elderly to elderly; this has been the basic philosophy. From medical care to free meals, over 2,000 people daily are the recipients of the services available through the network.

Between the Lines by Brother Lawrence Miller, CSC

Showings

Showings is one of The Classics of Western Spirituality. Dr. Susan Muto, director of the Institute of Formative Spirituality at Duquesne University in Pittsburgh, lists Showings as one of the top ten spiritual classics. Another word for showings, as used in the title of the book, would be revelations. Julian herself used the word "shewings." For examples, the following quote from a manuscript in the British Museum reads: "Here es a vision schewed be the goodness of God to a deuoute Woman and hir name es Julyan that es recluse atte Norwyche and yitt ys on lyfe." (Butler's Lives of the Saints, Vol. II, P. 302.)

As I started to write this column, it occurred to me that nowhere in my notes do I have mention of Saint Julian. So this was researched a bit. Butler's listing of her is "Blessed" and a Virgin. However, blessed was given her by friends in life. It seems she was given the name Julian by parishoners of the Church of St. Julian near which she had her hermitage. Her real name is now known. She lived in a "Anchoress-house" as a recluse, and in her old age had two maids to wait upon her. My own notes show she lived to age 81, but neither her birthday nor deathdate seemed to be accurately known. (c. 1342-1423)

Julian of Norwich is a contemporary of St. Catherine of Siena, one of two female Doctors in the Church. St. Teresa of Avila is the other. Little is known about Julian's education and it might well be that one of her two maids in her old age (some sources say one) was a kind of secretary. Julian is one of thousands of men and women during the middle ages who lived as solitaries for the love of God, but of whom nothing else is known. (Ibid. p. 19)

The anonymous author of *The Cloud of Unknowing* would also be a contemporary of Julian.

Another contemporary of Julian is Thomas a Kempis, who died in the year 1471 at age 92. Incidentally, there is a new translation of the *Imitation of Christ* from the original Latin by Joseph N. Tylenda, S.J. It was published about three or four years ago by Michael Glazier, Inc. It has a very interesting twelve page introduction worth the price of the book.

Background knowledge is important to the understanding of *Showings*. If you read it, be sure to study carefully the first 119 pages of Preface, Foreword, and Introduction. My approach to reading *Showings* is somewhat like my approach to reading the *Imitation of Christ* — a bit at a

time. Showings is also in short chapters, but the narration is altogether different from the *Imitation*.

Julian of Norwich's Showings is translated and introduced by Edmund Colledge, 0.S.A., and James Walsh, S.J. It is an account of 16 "showings" or revelations of God's love in a series of experienced visions. These visions are recorded in what is referred to as the short text, and after Julian had time to pray and reflect on her experience, a longer version was written known as the long text.

Translators spent thirteen years of work on the critical edition of Showings. This work is important in view of the feminist movement of our day. Julian experienced God as "father" and as "mother." "As truly as God is our Father, so truly is God our Mother." Love of God is the theme of her writings and she was considered a mystic and a saint by her contemporaries in England." She wrote about the central problems of the spiritual life, particularly of those related to the encounter between the soul and God. Her writings are now considered to have universal and permanent value. As a woman, she represents the feminine teacher and feminine insight that are less rare in the Western Christian tradition than many of our contemporaries might think. In that age (Julian's) women and men who successfully sought to be alone with God had an enormous impact on the people of their areas precisely because they were able to achieve 'divine solitude." (Preface P. 2) In order to understand this "divine solitude" in a more realistic way, let me quote and elaborate more completely: "Sometimes their influence extended beyond their immediate environs to a larger region or group of nations. They fulfilled a social function of praying, counseling, reconciling, settling political conflicts; . . . On occasion they were asked to share their spiritual insight and experience either orally or in writing." (Preface P. 2 See p. 3ff. for the character and the content of other feminine teachings.)

Elizabeth Dryer, writing in America, Aug. 5, 1978, lists five aspects of Julian's spirituality: "1) her simplicity; 2) her attitude toward the natural and its relation to the supernatural; 3) the trinitarian dimension of her spirituality; 4) her use of feminine imagery, and 5) her vision of hope." (P. 55) One of the most often quoted sayings of Julian is as follows: "Lord . . . I may make all things well, and I can make all things well, and I shall make all things well, and I will make all things well; and you will see yourself that every kind of thing will be well." (P. 229)

New Appointments

BROTHER DAVID NAPLES has been named the second president of Holy Cross Junior College, Notre Dame, Indiana. He took over the leadership of the school on April 16. The presidency has been vacant for a year since the death of Brother John Driscoll, one of the college's two founders. Brother James Leik, the other founder, has been serving as acting president.

The announcement was well covered by the local media including the three Michiana TV stations and the local papers. The announcement was made by William H. Shannon III, president of the 1-year-old Board of trustees.

Holy Cross Junior College was founded in 1966.

BROTHER JAMES SPOONER was selected by the Board of Trustees as principal for St. Edward High School, Lakewood, Ohio. James, a 1964 alumnus of St. Ed's, is presently serving as associate principal of Archbishop Hoban High School, Akron, Ohio.

BROTHER WALTER DAVENPORT will be the new president of Holy Cross High School, River Grove, Illinois. His name was presented by the Lay Advisory Board and the search committee to Brother Thomas Moser, Provincial, who made the announcement. Walter served as first principal for a six year term at Holy Cross from 1961 to 1966 and returned for another three years from 1967 to 1971. During the last two years Walter was Assistant Superintendent of Secondary Education in the Diocese of Cleveland, Ohio.

The Call To Assembly Of The Lay Society

C.S.C. Internazionale, dated Oct., 1987, has outlined a projected assembly for the lay society in the Congregation of Holy Cross.

My first reaction to reading this issue of C.S.C. Internazionale was positive. The more I read it, the more I discuss it, the greater seems the need for such an assembly. Now, after about three months of reflection, I am personally committed to the idea.

The need for, and the purpose of such an assembly, is not clearly spelled out in C.S.C. Internazionale. However, considering the times and keeping in mind our approach to recent provincial chapters, we are reluctant to have matters clearly spelled out in advance. It would seem to me it becomes the responsibility of the assembly to formulate its own agenda with help and guidance from the project coordinator. Hence, the agenda would grow out of our perceived needs, and that is why it is important to have full participation. That is the way God works among his people. Lumen Gentium issues a universal call to holiness (see especially Article 40), and this document could also be considered as a topic for discussion.

"Assemble and listen." (Gen. 49:2) I was really pleased with the use of the word assembly as used in C.S.C. Internazionale. These two words, "assemble," and "listen," have deep Biblical significance. Together they mean active participation. To assemble is more meaningful than to gather; to listen is more meaningful than to hear. One translation of 1 Kings 3:9 is a "listening heart." The Hebrew use of the word heart is what today we would call a holistic approach to life. What is our communal "heart" as Brothers of Holy Cross today?

We have had some good experiences flowing out of our assemblies as a province, and I'd expect no less of an assembly of the society. The Gathering '87, for example, was a good experience. Another good experience was the Forum in 1978. During November, 1978, we had a Thanksgiving Forum at Adrian, Michigan. Fourteen Brothers gave prepared papers and compiled summary reports. These papers were subsequently distributed in a booklet of ninety-four pages called *Re-Creating A Vision*. I re-read these papers again recently and they are inspirational. Some of these papers need to be updated, and once updated, could again be used with considerable inspirational value.

It would seem to me that it is important for all Brothers to participate in the assembly of the lay society. In addition to being present, as many as possible need to express their views on the life of a lay religious today. So many scholarly books and scholarly papers have appeared about the religious life in our times, but what is that doing for us?

For the assembly to achieve its purpose, we need to prepare ourselves by way of reading, prayer, and reflection on the religious life in our times.

I suggest reading Jesus Before Christianity by Albert Nolan (Holy Cross Brothers, October, 1985 p. 10). Let this be part pf the preparation. We know more about Jesus today than any generation in the past 2000 years! Why not let that influence our lives. Jesus was the turning point in history, and he can make a difference in our lives, not only individually, but also communally. The communal aspect is to be emphasized.

A second book I would suggest is Following Christ In A Consumer Society, by John Francis Kavanaugh (Holy Cross Brothers, December, 1984 p. 8). This book is difficult to read. However, most of us are at an age where we have the time to read more difficult works/classics.
