





From The Dujarie Infirmary

With the end of the present calendar year Dujarie House will be completing its twenty-second year of service to the infirm Brothers of Holy Cross in the United States. The patient load is presently quite moderate in numbers: thirteen, about as low as we've experienced in the last eight years.

This seems like a good time for us to list for you the patients we have here and a note or two about them. Behind each name is the date he came to the house. You can see that we have several Brothers who have served a notable portion of their religious life with us.

BROTHER LUKE BAUER (03-29-78). Luke is approaching his 93rd birthday. He has a sister (Gertrude), a couple of years younger, in Fresno. She has come here, by bus, to visit several times and plans another such visit this fall . . . While confined to a wheelchair now Luke is up and around every day and "into most things" which aren't locked. Aside from his inability to walk his health is comparatively good.

BROTHER THEOPHILUS MACHALINSKI (06-19-79). Theo hangs on to life tenaciously. He will be 97 in October. He is moved to his chair an hour or two each day but has been unable to leave his room now for about five months. He is the only patient thus confined. He has not been able to communicate in any discernible way now for more than a year.

BROTHER ANSELM TATRO (12-20-81).

Anselm has more years than anyone in the Province (perhaps in several provinces). He will be 98 next February. He still looks at the newspaper nearly every day and watches television each afternoon and evening, although his hearing is nearly gone. He is always pleasant and grateful for services he receives. He has been confined to his wheelchair for nearly two years now and experiences general confusion from time to time but has longer periods of being alert.

BROTHER AUGUST SOSA (10-30-83).

August remains the youngest patient in our house although fourth in length of time here among the current patients. The original prognosis that he would be unable to effect any practical recovery from his second stroke five years ago has proved essentially accurate. Augie watches television a good part of the day and spends a great deal of his time in the kitchen with our head chef, Richard Snyder. His sister, Kathy Fonosch, visited him from California in August for five days.

BROTHER PAUL MATTINGLY (01-04-84).
Paul continues his wonderful apostolate of constant and remarkable good spirits even though a brain tumor stopped his speech both before and after an operation five years ago. He gets around

each day in his wheelchair, making use of his left arm and leg. His mother (91) and step-father (93) still come to visit him several times a year and are expected again in October. Paul's sister, Sr. Marceline, S.P., always brings them.

still reads the paper each day despite the loss of an eye just a year ago. His deafness makes communication a bit one-sided. But he is certainly alert and aware of the important things which are happening around him.

BROTHER FLORIAN GILL (02-04-85). Despite various disabilities Florian adheres to the regular schedule he sets for himself each day. He has specific times for his visits to the chapel, his walks outside (or up and down the corridors if the weather is not favorable), and a few additional naps (usually after meals). He has improved somewhat this summer, forsaking the wheelchair he had used for nearly a year.

BROTHER MICHAEL DONOVAN (07-29-85). Mike is Florian's "twin": they celebrated their 86th birthdays on the same day last May. Michael is still up and about without much assistance. He spends a great deal of his time in a chair in the library, or outside chapel, or in his room, singing. He remembers all the words to many songs of the past. But he can recall little or nothing from the immediate past (songs or otherwise).

BROTHER STEPHEN TITZER (06-08-87). The nurses are always pleasant and do excellent work, the meals are always good, the reminiscences are always interesting or humorous or edifying. There is always a "thank you," and before leaving the table, an "excuse me." Even if public television (his favorite pastime) were to go under and cease broadcasting I believe Steve would find some aspect of the loss positive. He may be the original positive thinker.
