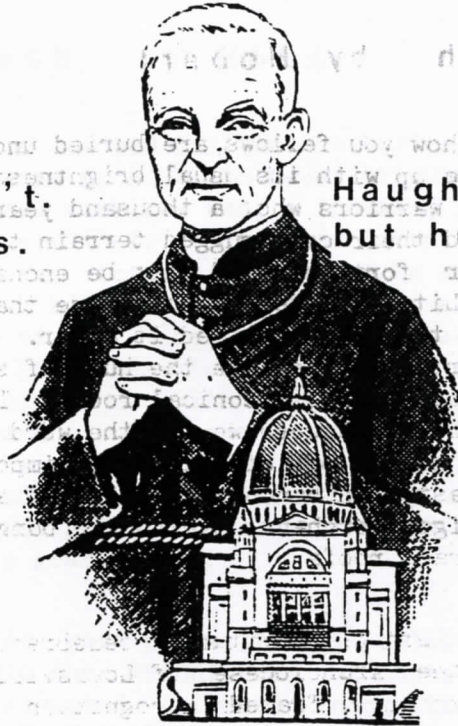

The Northern Ohio Holy Cross Community celebrated the feast of Brother Andre on January 6, 1990, with a Mass at 4:30 p.m. at St. Edward High School Chapel. Bishop A. James Quinn, Auxiliary Bishop of Cleveland, presided and gave the homily.

In his homily, Bishop Quinn noted Brother Andre's devotion to St. Joseph, his commitment to the poor, his humility and his holiness. Speaking of his commitment to the poor, Bishop Quinn said, "He could empathize with the pitiable because he was one of them, one with them. His counsel came from a mind and heart that had experienced illness, weakness and disparagement...Smart he wasn't. But wise he was. Healthy he was not, but holy he was. Haughty he was not, but humble he was. The contrast of his life style and the style of the world stand in bold relief: it's the difference between the saint and the ain't."

Speaking of Andre's humility, Quinn noted: "Humility is a special kind of wisdom and an important ingredient in the art of Christian living. In fact, the test of a great man or woman is humility....Humility affords us an honest perspective of ourselves, both our limitations or our gifts....So the humility Andre teaches us is based on truth -- the truth about ourselves and the truth about God."

Continuing, "Many came to Andre for cures. More came to him for holiness sake, realizing that humankind does not live by bread alone, not by robust health alone, or prestige alone, or security alone. The closer we get to God alone, the closer we get to one another and to the salvation of souls -- ourselves and others. People close to God, people like Brother Andre, inspire others to greater vision, to spiritual heights, to heroic deeds and saintly life. We need more Andres in our time."

KATHMANDU :

After completing his training program at Maryknoll, Brother John Harris has returned to Nepal. He wrote on February 10:

"This letter is to report that all's well here after a safe trip over the Pacific just about ten days ago. I will miss my 40th Jubilee, but will join my confreres in spirit and prayer as you all celebrate in June.

"My classes began a few days ago after arrival and I'm finishing my first week at the English Language Institute. I'm teaching TOEFEL classes which prepare students for that exam given two or three times a year in Nepal and all over the world. We have over 800 students for these adult education classes.

"Our living conditions are adequate and very basic. Breakfast slightly varies, but is usually hot porridge (no milk), toasted plain bread (no butter) and tea. Sometimes a simple omelette is prepared by the cook and a quartered tangerine. An excellent way to keep down that weight."
