Brother Harold Thielen, teacher of French at St. Edward High School, entered an essay entitled The Impact Teacher in a contest sponsored by the National Catholic Education Association and the 3-M Company. The entry was one of the forty winning ones in the United States.

The Register of Southwestern Indiana recently quoted Brother John Herbert Kuhn, Principal of Memorial High School, on his ideas of school administration at Memorial. Brother John is a member of the Diocesan School Board.

The Standing Committee on Religious Renewal and Observance will meet at Holy Cross Junior College on Dec. 28 and 29. Brother Columba Curran returns to active participation on the committee, and Brother Robert Saltsman is a newly elected observer. Brother James Moroney is Chairman.

Le Mans Academy is the new name for Sacred Heart Military Academy. Brother Carl Englert, headmaster, reports the new name will not be used until the academy is incorporated in the State of Indiana. For practical purposes this will be for the opening of school in September, 1968.

Brother James Moroney recently gave conferences at Columba Hall and Father Gibault School for Boys. The theme of the conferences centered on recent trends in Scriptural Theology. Discussion periods followed the conference in each house.

An extensive development program was recently approved in principle for Cathedral High School, Indianapolis. Brother Douglas Roach, Principal, is in the midst of working out certain administrative details and collection of additional funds before plans can proceed. Most of the funds will be earmarked for the expansion of science facilities.

Analecta, a publication of Province Canadienne Des Peres de Sainte-Croix, Montreal, has devoted its entire Mars-Juillet 1967 issue to "Etude sur la renovation des constitutions," and "Chapitre provincial ordinaire," and "Decrets, recommandations et voeux du chapitre provincial 1967." It is highly recommended if you can read French.

Plans for remodeling the Columba Hall kitchen are being studied by a number of Brothers interested in this project. To date plans are incomplete and no funds have been allocated.

The alienation of property process as required by the Constitutions, Art. 509 and 617:16 for the sale of the Watertown site has been carried out. The property is now being appraised and is expected to go up for sale some time early in 1968.

According to CMSM Newsletter: Christian Brothers voted to retain "lay" character of the congregation, as established by founder St. John Baptist de la Salle. School will continue to be their primary concern as the "most effective agency for bringing religion to youth," according to Superior General, Brother Charles Henry.

The Declaration of Interdependence

When in the course of Human Events it becomes necessary for one Congregation to celebrate the bands which have connected them with another, and to give thanks for the stations to which the Laws of our Congregation and our God entitle them, a decent respect for the Blessings of our Brotherhood requires that we should Declare our Interdependence.

We hold these Truths to self-evident, that each of us has been created in Brotherhood, and that we have been endowed by our creator with certain Communal Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness---that to secure these rights we unite in fellowship to celebrate our Nation's Bicentennial.

We of Kentucky (in Louisville assembled) invite you to lodge with us this Bicentennial summer while enjoying Dixie's tribute-Lincoln, (his birthplace and boyhood log cabin are but a short stretch from our plantation). On your way you could visit the Trappist Monastery of Gethsemane and return in time to see the outdoor musical "The Stephen Foster Story" on the grounds of My Ol' Kentucky Home. The next day you could relax on board the "Belle of Louisville" a triple-decked paddle boat as it cruises down the Ohio River. Or you might want to go to Butcher-town (a restored 19th Century German village). Caution: there is a distillery behind every hill and they will try to tempt you in for some samples. "Cum on down!" we can take up to ten for the month of June.

We of Illinois (in River Grove assembled) invite you to "... our kind of town--Chicago is!" We of Ohio (in Lakewood assembled) welcome you to the State of Presidents. Our Blossom Music features the nation's leading stars, or Severance Hall will salute the best in American music. Five playhouses nearby offer the range in drama, and the Salvador Dali Museum (free by appointment) is sure to please your artistic taste. Cedar Point (Ohio's answer to Disneyland) offers a full day of rides and amusements for seven dollars. We have five rooms and hospitality waiting.
