Le Mans Academy Drum Corp, Color Guard and Cadet Officers participated in the annual St. Patrick's Day parade in Chicago on March 17. Brothers Leonard and Edward Grams marched with the cadets in the parade.

Brother Donald Fleischhacker was named to the Dean's List at St. Edward's University for his work during the first semester. An average of 3.20 is required for this honor.

Brother Gonzaga Day continues with his excellent work for the missions. In early March he made shipments as follows: 596 lbs. to the West Indies, 5697 lbs. to Liberia, and 778 lbs. to Mexican Migrants. He is presently recovering from surgery at St. Joseph's Hospital.

Chairmen of chapter committees and sub-committees met at the Center on April 8 to outline the agenda for the chapter committee meetings this summer. The chapter committees will meet for 2 or 3 days beginning at 1 p.m. June 12.

Brother Anton Mattingly has been named principal of the archdiocesan group of students who will participate in the Foreign Study League program this summer. 80 students will participate in the program which will visit five countries in Europe over a five week period.

Mike Haley has joined the Boysville staff for the spring semester. Mike is the first student to volunteer his services under the "Christian Service For Youth Program" approved by the chapter last summer. Several other college students are making applications for the summer program.

The new government in Ghana has informed the schools there that each school must farm 50 acres and the first crop must be harvested by December. Schools have also been asked to send students to assist with the harvest of sugar cane in the Komenda region. Brother John Sekyim went with the St. John's contingent and came home exhausted from his efforts. One of the Brothers wrote recently: "We've talked a lot about people coming to help in Ghana. Two new fields are opening up: guidance counseling and agriculture. Mr. Sedoh (headmaster at St. Augustine's) definitely intends to hire a trained guidance counselor next year if one is available. He said he'd gladly accept a brother if he applied. Such a man could do a world of good for the boys; also, perhaps he'd run across some candidates for Holy Cross."

Examination results in Liberia once more indicated that St. Patrick's was one of the top schools in the country. Over-all, 36% of the students passed the national examinations for 12th grade students, and 23% passed the 9th grade examinations.
