Thomas Dillman and William Healy, a well has been dug for the Tubman Orphanage in Virginia.

Aspirants at Holy Cross Juniorate won many prizes during School Sports Day last month, among them Ilarish Rozario, the Senior Group champion, with three first place awards, and Prodip Costa, the Junior Group champion. *** Aspirant Sushil Costa, ill and scheduled for an operation, asks our prayers. ***

At the Scholasticate in Mohammedpur, some student-Brothers spent their free days doing part-time work at the Home for Destitutes set up by Mother Theresa's Missionaries of Charity at Tejgoan. At Holy Cross High School, Bandura, a house chapter was spent discussing "Vocation Consciousness," and a program of action was presented by Br. John Emminger. One result is Br. Benedict Rozario's giving a series of talks in the various grades. Br. John teaches a special English class to the minor seminarians each morning before his regular classes and is available for extra help in the evenings. ***

The school garden club at St. Nicholas High School, Nagari, began selling again to the local market, first cabbages, and--to come later--carrots, cauliflower, beets and corn. The club is directed by Br. Paul Enk. ***

St. Joseph School of Industrial Trades in Dacca has an all-time high enrollment this year, with 81 students in the hostel and 30 day students. The school now has six apprentices; this may increase to twenty as students complete the three-year course and elect to stay on. *** Lines are being laid for a new carpentry shop, a new electric shop and a radio shop. Work continues on the apprentices' hostel and also on a new kitchen for students.
