

# Midwest . . . NEWS NOTES

BROTHERS of HOLY CROSS - NOTRE DAME, INDIANA 46556

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September 1978

A large representation of community members from the Notre Dame area and around the province gathered for the celebration of the Eucharist for Brother Ephrem O'Dwyer on Tuesday evening, August 22. The next day Br. Ephrem's body was sent to Valatie, New York, for a wake service on Friday, August 25, and a funeral mass and burial the next day. Celebrant of the mass was Father William Ribando, provincial of the Eastern priests. Father Thomas Barrosse was a concelebrant. A homily prepared by Brother Elmo Bransby was delivered by Brother Renatus Foldenauer, provincial.

Br. Bonaventure Foley has been named the recipient of the Coronat Medal by the trustees of St. Edward's University, Austin. Awarded periodically to persons for distinguished service to Catholic education, Br. Bonaventure will receive the medal at a special celebration of Founder's Day, October 15, which this year coincides with the centennial of the founding of St. Edward's. Besides serving many years in several schools in the Midwest and in the provincial and general administrations, Br. Bonaventure is being cited for the specific contribution he made to the development of St. Edward's High School and the University during the first years the Brothers assumed responsibility for the those schools.

Br. Joseph Chvala received a grant of \$875 from the Martha Holden Jennings Foundation for a writing project involving 700 sixth and seventh grade boys in 30 Catholic elementary schools in the Greater Cleveland area.

Br. Pedro Haering has notified the board of trustees of Cathedral High School, Indianapolis, that he is not seeking renewal of his contract as president and principal when it expires next June. The office of president and principal will be separated under a planned reorganization.

Br. James Greteman, Sioux City, has been named an advisor to the executive board of the National Divorce Group for Catholics.

Br. Celestis Mueller exhibited two of his works in the summer art show at the Chicago

Academy of Fine Arts. Since moving from Chicago to Monroe this fall, he has discontinued his activities collecting postage stamps for the missions.

Br. Paul Rosonke writes that he is arranging a charismatic renewal weekend, September 22-24, at the Indian Mission in Cherry Creek, South Dakota. Four Indians from the parish joined him when he attended the charismatic week at Notre Dame in August. Br. Br. James Blume began studies for the priesthood for the Fort Wayne-South Bend Diocese at Saint Meinrad School of Theology in August.

He will be a student next year and reside with the community at St. Augustine's College, Cape Coast.

John Schuszler is recuperating at Dujarie House after hospitalization in Liberia for hepatitis. He will remain in the United States for several months. On home visits from Ghana this summer were Brs. America, July 29-August 5, 1978.

In case you missed it, you will find it well worth your while to look up this summer spirituality issue of America. Included are articles on modes of meditation, Julian of Norwich, and an excellent piece by Henri Nouwen entitled "Unceasing Prayer."

Studies in the Spirituality of Jesuits, March-May 1978.

The entire issue is devoted to the topic "Affectivity and Sexuality: Their Relationship to the Spiritual Life." Spiritual directors, psychologists and psychiatrists explore the relationship between emotions and prayer in the lives of religious men. Reasons of the Heart, by John S. Dunne, C.S.C. Macmillan, \$7.95.

Father Dunne subtitles his latest work as "a journey into solitude and back again into the human circle." This book is a probing development of a statement attributed to Pascal, "The heart has its reasons which the reason does not know."

Finding Grace at the Center, by Keating, Pennington and Clarke. St. Bede Publications, Box 61, Still River, MA 01467. \$2.00.

This slim paperbound book serves well as a primer for what has come to be known as centering prayer. Short articles by two Cistercians and a Jesuit offer guidelines for the practice of an ancient form of prayer. An excerpt:

"In the center of your being lives God: Father, Son, and Spirit, Centering prayer allows you to experience His presence and be touched and transformed by Him.

"Simply sit, relaxed and quiet, enjoying your own inner calm and silence. For a few moments, listen to His presence and allow yourself to be touched by it.

"After a time, perhaps a single word will come: Jesus, Lord, Love, or any word that captures your response to His inner presence. Place into this word all your faith, your love, as you enter more and more deeply into Him. Slowly and effortlessly, repeat your word. Allow it to lead you more and more deeply into God's presence at the center of your being, where you are in God and God in you. Surrender to His re-freshment and re-creation.

"Center all your attention and desire on Him, leaving your faculties at peace, allowing Him to draw you into His perfect prayer of adoration, love, and praise. Let it happen. Whenever you become aware of any thoughts or images, simply return to your word.

"In coming out of prayer, move slowly to silent awareness and then a conscious interior prayer, such as the Our Father, savoring the words and meaning, entering into them.

"The centering prayer may be used once or twice daily for twenty minutes or more.

"If you are faithful to it, you will soon discern in your life the maturing of the fruits of the Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, gentleness, and kindness.

"You shall be truly abiding in Him and He in you."
