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## AMERICA, THE BEAUTIFUL

(Ed. Note: Since our March issue the snow has melted in the South Bend area, leaving along the roads and drives the previously hidden "collections" of non-meltables. During the warmer months ahead many of our people will add to the collection -- beyond the tax-payers' ability to hire workers to remove it.

I apologize if any readers are offended because this lead-essay is not religious. Surely it is spiritual. While written a quarter century ago by Marya Mannes it did not come to my attention until 1968 when it was used in the liner notes for a jazz-oriented tone poem by the late Gary McFarland. Mr. McFarland's album carried the same title (above) with the tragic sub-title: "An account of its disappearance." Probably this 'revival' will meet the same fate as the original essay and the tone poem. As the commentary in the album says "nothing has really changed since Marya's essay in 1958 -- except to get worse." Yet, many of our Brothers are directly involved in education and all of us are also involved indirectly.)

Cans. Beer cans. Glinting on the verges of a million miles of roadways, lying in scrub, grass, dirt, leaves, sand, mud, but never hidden. Piel's, Rheingold, Ballantine, Schaefer, Schlitz, shining in the sun or picked by moon or the beams of headlights at night; washed by rain or flattened by wheels, but never dulled, never buried, never destroyed. Here is the mark of savages, the testament of wasters, the stain of prosperity.

Who are these men who defile the grassy borders of our roads and lanes, who pollute our ponds, who spoil the purity of our ocean beaches with the empty vessels of their thirst? Who are men who make these vessels in millions and then say, "Drink -- and discard"? What society is this that can afford to cast away a million tons of metal and to make of wild and fruitful land a garbage heap?

What manner of men and women need thirty feet of steel and two hundred horsepower to take them, singly, to their small destinations? Who demand that what they eat is wrapped so that forests are cut down to make the paper that is thrown away, and what they smoke and chew is sealed so that the sealers can be tossed in gutters and caught in twigs and grass?

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What kind of men can afford to make the streets of their towns and cities hideous with neon at night, and their roadways hideous with signs by day, wasting beauty; who leave the carcasses of cars to rot in heaps; who spill their trash into ravines and make smoking mountains of refuse for the town's rats? What manner of men choke off the life in rivers, streams, and lakes with the waste of their produce, making poison of the water?

Who is so rich as that? Slowly the wasters and despoilers are impoverishing our land, our nature, and our beauty, so that there will not be one beach, one hill, one lane, one meadow, one forest free from the debris of man and the stigma of his improvidence.

Who is so rich that he can squander forever the wealth of earth and water for the trivial needs of vanity or the compulsive demands of greed; or so prosperous in land that he can sacrifice nature for unnatural desires? The earth we abuse and the living things we kill will, in the end, take their revenge; for in exploiting their presence we are diminishing our future.

And what will we leave behind us when we are long dead? Temples? Amphora? Sunken treasure?

Or mountains of twisted, rusted steel, canyons of plastic containers, and a million miles of shores garlanded, not with the lovely wrack of the sea, but with the cans and bottles and light bulbs and boxes of a people who conserved their convenience at the expense of their heritage, and whose ephemeral prosperity was built on waste.

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Organized by Mr. Bob Livernois the faculty and staff of Gabriel Richard High School (Riverview, Michigan) honored Brother Remigius Bullinger on March 25 at a "wine and cheese" gathering. Remi reciprocated with a few thousand well-chosen words of thanks, etc.

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"Through the eyes of Mother Teresa of Calcutta, a sense of personal responsibility in the matter of social justice at home and throughout the world" was the theme of several high school recollection days at St. Thomas Aquinas Parish in Lansing, Michigan. Brothers Paschal Pesce (E) and Thomas Giumenta (E) were among the spiritual directors for the program

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Indianapolis Cathedral High School reached the final four in the Indiana High School basketball tournament before losing to the eventual state champ, Plymouth, 62-59 in the afternoon round. Cathedral was only the third Catholic school to reach this plateau since being admitted to the IHSAA tournaments in 1942.

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FROM ANCHORAGE - Northern Lights

Some excerpts from a late March letter from Brother Harold Ruplinger:

-Our backyard was taken over for a day in early January by a family of moose: the bull, the cow, and two calves.

-Brother John McMuldren was named chaplain for the Catholic Chapter of the Boy Scouts of America in southcentral Alaska.

-Brothers John and Harold conducted a Faith Rendezvous during the February Fur Rendezvous weekend. A number of youth travelled many miles to join the activities: youth liturgies, socials, and dinners. Visiting youth were hosted by families of the area parishes. The youth built a float which was entered in the annual Fur Rendezvous Parade held on February 20.

-Brother Charles McBride spent many hours preparing national and international materials for the Pilgrimage of Faith's trip to London and Rome from March 2 - 15.

The group included the 174-voice Anchorage Papal Choir. The trip came about because of the Pope's invitation for the choir to visit him after his Mass in Anchorage a year ago. There were 468 Alaskans making the trip.

-While the pilgrims were in London and Rome Brother Charles attended a 3-day workshop in Seattle sponsored by the Catholic Communications Campaign. The major topic of discussion was the status of the new Catholic Telecommunications Network of America. Charles hopes the archdiocese may join the network within a year.

-The "Roaring 20's", young adults from 19 to 29, are beginning to solidify as a group that meets to be supportive of one another through retreats, social gatherings, and aiding the Youth Ministry Program.

-Brothers John and Harold volunteered their art, acting, and vocal services to St. Patrick's parish in presenting the annual St. Patrick's Variety Show in March. The show travelled to entertain the aged in local Pioneer Homes and the Pioneer Home in Palmer.

-The big events expected in April will be the Provincial Visit by Brother Philip Armstrong and the fourteen-mile "Good Friday Walk", commemorating the fourteen stations. Pledges will be taken by the walkers to support the work of two Brothers who came to the diocese recently to work

with the derelicts of downtown Anchorage and to support the needs and activities of the Youth Ministry Program.

-Presently, plans are being made for the Communications Office to go on Cable Television in Anchorage in June. About fifteen hours each week is the plan for starting...In June Brother Charles will attend a workshop in New Orleans sponsored by the Catholic Communications Foundation.

-Brothers Harold and John hope to spend the month of May on vacation and attending enrichment workshops in the Midwest.
