OF BROTHER BARRY LAMBOUR

If he were vain enough to dye his hair no one would suspect that Brother Barry Lambour might have reached the "legal" age that permits retirement. Were you to spend a little time with him you would know that retirement is about as far from his thoughts as it is from those of a graduating senior high school student.

Reviewing the variety of works with which Barry has served God and Holy Cross in the past forty years would surely not lead you to suspect that his Bachelor's and Master's Degrees (from the University of Notre Dame and the University of Texas, respectively) were both in electrical engineering. Probably the key to the EE degrees lies in his work as a refrigeration service mechanic for five years after graduation from Altoona (Pennsylvania) High School and before coming to Holy Cross.

Last February marked the fortieth anniversary of Brother Barry's first vows. In those years he has served from border to border although not quite from coast to coast. At St. Edward's University in Austin from 1946 to 1952 he taught, was a hall rector, and earned his Master's Degree from U.T....Then, in 1952, he was appointed Director of the Brothers' House of Studies (Vincent Hall) at St. Ed's. That ended three years later when he went to another St. Ed's, our high school in Lakewood, Ohio, as Principal.

In 1961 he completed six years in the school a few blocks from Lake Erie and moved near another of the Great Lakes to take over the work of Principal at Holy Trinity in Chicago.... In 1964 he rested from administration and spent a year as an "ordinary teacher" at St. Joseph High School in South Bend before returning to the Cleveland area as Diocesan Supervisor of Mathematics and Curriculum Development for the Office of Education of the Cleveland Diocese. After four years of this work of hopping from one to another of the three dozen secondary schools in the Cleveland Diocese Barry was appointed Regional Superintendent of the Catholic schools in the Akron area, a job he continued for six years, until 1975.

During the 1975-6 school year Brother Barry took a sabbatical back at Notre Dame, participating in a Program for Religious Leaders. But the fall of 1976 found him back on the high school scene when he accepted a request from the Akron Dominican Sisters to be Principal of their allgirls' school, Our Lady of the Elms. (Once upon a time CSC rules forbade Brothers' teaching girls!)... Three years later (1979) he accepted the Principalship of Peninsula Catholic High School in Newport News, Virginia, where he is still looking after educational matters.

Looking at the last thirty-six years one is tempted to say that this is quite an accomplishment for an electrical engineer. And yet, at least until the last decade, it would hardly be considered atypical in the re-

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ligious life. There's just no telling how or where your good refrigeration service mechanic may end up if he comes to a religious community.

None of the above even touches on the service Brother Barry has given this Province in many of its Chapters. Or on the wisdom and circumspection he brings to every important matter that comes to him for consideration. Nor does it mention his unswerving fidelity to the religious life and to his religious brothers. Perhaps forty years is itself some measure of that.

From Altoona to Notre Dame, to Texas, to the Great Lakes, to the Atlantic coast Brother Barry Lambour has served God and Holy Cross faithfully and well -- and we are all the better for it.

BACK TO INDIANAPOLIS

Most Reverend Edward T. O'Meara, Archbishop, has announced the appointment of Brother Douglas Roach as Administrator of St. Francis de Sales Church in Indianapolis. Brother Douglas is the first non-priest member of a religious order to be appointed to administer a Catholic parish in the 39-county archdiocese. Douglas assumes his new position immediately (May 5).

Brother Douglas is no stranger to the Indianapolis community. He served as teacher, Dean of Students, Vice-Principal, and Principal of Cathedral High School between 1957 and 1973.

The last paragraph of the two-page Archdiocesan news release says: "Brother Douglas plans to get to know his parish and its people first, and then meet with other church representatives in the area as well as those who head various civic and community organizations. His goal is to find out what the needs of the people in the Brightwood neighborhood are, and to mobilize the church and other resources to help fill those needs."

Brother Lawrence Miller writes of his retirement work: "Providence is good to me. Out of a clear sky my former department head at the state hospital called to tell me about a part-time job for a Master's Degree social worker. It sounded good -- and I got the job in fif
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teen minutes.

"It is really a contract for services. I do not have an office, and no work hours. I make home visits, mostly to elderly and single parent families. Then I make a written report on conditions in the household. The visit is necessary for all applicants for apartments in Parkside Terrace, a subdivision with a capacity of one thousand. They phone me, give me the details, then I make the visit and submit the report. I like it very much. I am paid by the case, plus mileage. Today I completed my 27th home visit in a month.

"I still do one volunteer case a day at the hospital. The garden is coming along more slowly than last year. And I'm still active at St. Benedict's parish."

EDITOR'S PAGE

This issue is the last one for this (school) year. Perhaps it is not inappropriate to reflect for a few moments on something else that usually bids us a reluctant farewell for one reason or another as spring yields to the more oppressive heat of summer.

In the last couple of weeks, as I have walked along the drive-ways around the Brothers' Center, I've been distracted by dying dandelions. Some are dying a natural death; others are last-gasping, with the naked stems of the plants spread-eagled in all directions as a liquid chemical weed-killer is "doing them in". Except that the stems are not moving, one is reminded of a large sea of worms -- a rather gruesome sight as one walks home.

I've thought before of dandelions. In fact, I think of them annually in April, May, and June. And I wonder that they have so many human enemies. I am amused by the TV commercial in which the wife calls to her husband in the yard, "Ralph, are you talking to those dandelions again?" When I was younger I had to take a special implement made to "root out" the entire dandelion plant and apply it in the front and back yards. Later, while in the novitiate, we found dandelion leaves turning up several times a week in the supper salad.

I have developed a kind of admiration for dandelions. It seems to me they must be the most persevering of plants. They will grow just about anywhere: in the middle of alleys between the car and truck tracks, in the cracks of pavement and sidewalks, through a ton or two of white rock (chat) spread out to make a place to park the car, along railroad tracks. It is impossible to discourage them. In full bloom they are not really unattractive. Rather the opposite I often think. Their brilliant yellow, while short-lived, contrasts rather pleasantly with the sea of green which often surrounds them. When their day in the sun is finished they silently turn to a sort of wispy white and the wind carries them away.

I am not promoting dandelions. It probably would be a mistake to bless them and say: increase and multiply and cover the earth. Still, neither would I be inclined to persecute them unduly. Let them be cut along with the grass as it is mowed. I have heard it said that a weed is simply a plant growing where it is out of place. And I wonder where the place is for the dandelions.
