EULOGY FOR BROTHER JOHN MOORE

"THE STORM OF THE LAST NIGHT HAS CROWNED THIS MORNING WITH GOLDEN PEACE"

I believe that God gave us a zest to retain life. Yet it is commonplace that when death threatens men do not persevere in their drive to hang on to life so well as women do. A walk through most cemeteries or mausoleums would attest that the world must have many more widows than widowers.

But our house, Dujarie house, is filled with exceptions to this empirical evidence. Brother John Moore has, for years, been such an exception. Just in the last two years there have been at least half a dozen times when our doctor found it almost unbelievable that John had again weathered a crisis which he should not have survived. He had practically nothing going for him physically. But he had a built-in zest for life which, until yesterday morning, repeatedly defeated death.

John's work and his assignments can be read in his obituary notices. He was already forty-nine years old and a successful salesman when he came to Holy Cross. His years with us were just a bit more than a third of his lifetime. And I am sure that our God looks at many things other than the litany of works we have done. It is always our place to leave judgment to God.

It is also our place, I believe, to pause at the time of the death of a brother and to look for what we can learn about our living from his life. As many of us know, John was pretty much out of touch with what we call reality during his latter years. (Perhaps he was fortunate when we consider most of today's reality.) But one could not live with him without realizing he didn't have a home here. He was always en route: to Freeport to see his parents, to New York or New Jersey to be about his business -- always going somewhere else. We had to encourage him to stay with us overnight and assure him of the probability that there would be transportation tomorrow to enable him to continue his journey. Daily, or even more frequently, he would be surprised when we showed him a room with his name on the door. This served as a reminder, often unheeded, of course, but a good reminder to me nevertheless, that I, too, am on a journey and should often recall that I have no permanent home here.

In what were normal periods for him John was always courteous, polite, and gentle. When he was aware that something was being done for him he never failed to say "thank you".

During his last two days, when his suffering was quite obvious from the difficulty he had just to continue breathing, he replied, when asked how he felt, "only fair-to-middlin" -- But when asked if he wished to receive holy communion he immediately responded "yes". As much as he resisted it, death surely came as a relief to him.

I believe it is part of God's providence, as well as his benevolence, that we do not know the details of what he may ask of us as we grow old. It should be part of our gratitude and our security that what he asks will not be more than we can bear and that our community has and will continue to provide us with the medical, physical, and spiritual support we may need while we are en route to the goal which John has now reached.

In her book, ON DEATH AND DYING, Elisabeth Kubler-Ross opens each chapter with

a quotation from the Hindu poet, Tagore. That was the source of the opening quotation as well as of this, closing one:

"I HAVE GOT MY LEAVE, BID ME FAREWELL, MY BROTHERS! I BOW TO YOU ALL AND TAKE MY DEPARTURE. HERE - I GIVE BACK THE KEYS OF MY DOOR -- I ASK ONLY FOR LAST, KIND WORDS FROM YOU.

WE WERE NEIGHBORS FOR LONG, BUT I RECEIVED MORE THAN I COULD GIVE. NOW THE DAY HAS DAWNED AND THE LAMP THAT LIT MY DARK CORNER IS OUT. A SUMMONS HAS COME AND I AM READY FOR MY JOURNEY."

From the Solitude of St. Joseph

Brothers Tom Maddix, Lawrence Skitzki, and Jim Weston (S-W) offer the following reflection after the Solitude's first year:

As our first year of living together at the Solitude of St. Joseph draws to close, we would like to share with you some of our experiences. We moved into the Solitude on August 13, 1981, with most of the work of renovation finished but with a lot of bits and pieces yet to do.

On September 1, 1981, we opened the doors to the public for private and directed retreat and spiritual direction. Overnight, people started to come. The first retreatant was a person from Boston seeking a place to make a retreat before returning to active ministry in the priesthood. The second person was a single woman making a retreat prior to being admitted to full communion in the Catholic Church. Since then, married and single people, sisters, priests, and brothers, undergraduate and graduate students and people from all the branches of Holy Cross have come to the Solitude.

The experience of doing spiritual direction has been the same. Nine of us volunteer time weekly to meet with people interested in spiritual direction. During the past twelve months, about 20-25 people representing various religious, economic and lifestyle backgrounds come per week to avail themselves of this ministry.

The impact of this immediate response to the Solitude's ministry was quickly felt by us, the core community. Whereas we presumed that the knowledge of the availability of the Solitude would be slow, we were surprised by the response and the need. Through the core community's shared ministry of hospitality and solitude, we open our home daily to the public until 10:30 pm for people to stop and pray. Likewise, with the constant movement of people in and out for retreat and spiritual direction or to pray, we try to create a space that is welcoming, clean, quiet, and reflective for each other and our guests.

The core community began with three in August of 1981 and by early January, 1982, Karen van der Walle, a Sister of St. Joseph from Tipton, Indiana, joined us to make four. Karen lived with us until mid-July 1982 when she moved to Indianapolis to open a house of prayer for her community. While living with Karen, we realized what many other communities like ours have come to realize, that a mixed community of men and women is key to our ministry. So, a year to the day in which the three of us moved into the Solitude, two Holy Cross Sisters, Judith Anne Beattie and Joy O'Grady joined us.

Judith Anne Beattie has been involved with the Solitude since its inception and has been a spiritual director and lived at the Solitude during part of the summer as a retreat director. Judith Anne will continue to do spiritual direction and be available upon request for individually directed retreats while continuing her position on the Notre Dame campus at the newly instituted Center for Social Concerns. Joy O'Grady, a clinical social worker in private practice in South Bend, has been involved as a resource and input person to the directors and has also been available for referrals. For the rest of us, Jim is studying, Larry continues as the treasurer for the Midwest Province of Brothers, and Tom teaches at Holy Cross Junior College and Notre Dame University as a member of a teaching team in theology.

As a community, we have found the year to be rewarding but not without its struggles and questions. We have learned the importance of a weekly community night in which we share a meal, spend time talking about our life together and our shared ministry of the Solitude. Within the context of our community night, we have also come to realize the importance for us of spending one of these nights together in quiet prayer and reflection. Throughout this year, we plan to continue this pattern as well as celebrating the seasons of Advent and Lent with Sunday evening vigils.

We begin our second year with five members in the core community and greatly aware of the many rich experiences the Lord has given us through the ups and downs of the past year. Moreover, we are especially grateful for the many guests who have shared so much of themselves with us, the people who volunteer to answer the phone, greet guests and do spiritual direction and those who support us through the gift of their talent, monetary contribution friendship and prayer.

FROM THE NOVITIATE AT WATERFORD:

Brother Charles Hutti, Midwest's only novice, writes;

"I hope all is well with y'all in the west there. Life here has been clipping along since our arrival in late August and we seem settled and adjusted to one another. One major adjustment that I've encountered is simply living in a much larger community; there are fifteen of us altogether. Three are staff members, Brothers John Gleason(EB), Director, and Joel Giallonza (s-w) and John Paige (EB). Among the novices, two are from the Southern province, two from the Eastern Brothers, three from the Eastern priests, one English Canadian, three from the South-West and myself. So far we've been able to refrain from killing each other and have had a really good time together.

"Four days after we arrived Father Barrosse came for his annual visit. While he was here he met with us

individually and shared our community life. We got to know each other a little better in the process. Also, he gave us two talks, on Prayer, and on Holy Cross: Its History and Spirit.

"We've kept busy. So far we've gotten into the swing of keeping the house clean, painted the front porch and fence, made it through our own efforts at cooking, and celebrated our first week's "anniversary" with a small pizza party. Some of us have gone into Albany for the day and others have gone hiking on Mt Bald in Bennington, VT. (and saw the old novitiate). We have communal prayer three times a day, Eucharist, and our own personal prayer.

"We look forward to our ministry experience and other programs as we move into the rhythm of the year here at Waterford. That's all for now. Keep me in your prayers as you are in mine.

FROM ST. XAVIER'S, NEPAL

Brother John Harris gave a lecture at the Irish School of Ecumenics in Dublin while enroute to the States in late May for home leave. He is teaching at our school in New Orleans for the current scholastic year before returning to the Kingdom of Nepal where he has been teaching the past eight years at St. Xavier's High School.

Brother John hosts CSC Brothers, Sisters, and priests who visit Nepal from both Bangladesh and India. He has been on eight sub-Himalayan treks during the school break periods with both students and fellow teachers. Last October he and Fr. Jim Chambers, S.J. attempted the popular Everett Base Camp trek which brought them above 14,000 feet, near the Thyangboche Monastery, where they decided to stop and take in the local scenery. Several Holy Cross Brothers have made these high elevation treks in Nepal and know the rigors and problems as well as the thrills of high altitude trekking and camping.

Brother John's 30 teaching years include 17 in Bangladesh besides the last 8 in Nepal - and in the States in the Bronx, Milwaukee, South Bend, and Mountain View.

BITS and PIECES from HERE and THERE

Since 1976 Brother Florian Gill has been gathering and selling newspapers and aluminum cans. From this source he has contributed well in excess of a thousand dollars for our Brothers in Bangladesh to distribute to the very poor.

Brother John Federowicz has suspended his long and distinguished career as librarian and this year is studying at the Jesuit University of Seattle.

Brother Richard Weber's silver jubilee celebration at the Center on July 10th was attended by a dozen of the disabled youngsters with whom he works at Logan Center. An adult looked after each of the youngsters whose chairs were placed across the width of the Chapel, in front of the first pews. Their presence lent a very sensitive dimension to the celebration.

I am sorry there has been so little in the Newsnotes about Bangladesh. Nothing got through to us since last winter until their letter, dated February 9, came during Provincial Chapter.

Two graduates of Holy Trinity High School, Dave Daly and Modesto Valle, joined the candidate program on Lincoln Way in August. They are attending classes at Holy Cross Junior College.

Brother Joseph Ballard (Brescia College, Owensboro, KY) has been asked to be on the Cursillo team and be involved as one of the spiritual directors. He recently worked with two priests in a Cursillo involving thirty men.

Brother James Greteman gave a workshop on divorce at Notre Dame in mid-July. He was elected chairperson for a second year for the Professional Advisory Board to the North American Conference of Separated and Divorced Catholics. The Board is composed of bishops, canon lawyers, and therapists who aid the organization. One project this year is to write two position papers with the Canon Law Society on "second marriage preparation programs" and "readiness to enter the annulment process". Jim is also giving a series of retreats for the divorced and widowed. The retreats are given in parishes in various areas.

The TOT-LOT officially re-opened with a week long children's festival August 2-6.
