SENIOR FRIENDSHIP CENTERS and BROTHER WILLIAM GEENAN

(The following is excerpted from a front-page story, with pictures, in a Sunday edion of the SARASOTA HERALD TRIBUNE. The story was written by Dorothy Stockbridge.

Brother William Geenan, a man whose vision created a solid gold network of 'people elping people', is resigning as executive director of The Senior Friendship Centers. He ame to this decision so that he can concentrate on future planning and development.

Senior Friendship Centers (SFC) had become the base for bringing in available state nd federal resources to Sarasota's elderly. Those sources are capped now, Geenan says, hile the demand for services continues to rise, especially among persons over 80. He ontinues: "Any expansion now has to come from local initiative. I want to see our prorams and services made available to everyone in this country who needs them."

By shedding the daily management of (five) Centers, Geenan will have more time to elp people in other areas organize similar programs. The Friendship Centers, particulary the health service operated by retired volunteer doctors and nurses, have become models or the country.

Geenan sees his role as educator. "Most people do not understand the problems of the lderly until they become old. They believe if there's no economic need, there's no need it all." he said.

Brother William was visiting Sarasota ten years ago when he met two elderly people: friend of his father's, confined to a hospital, and another man who approached him while e was parked near the airport reading a map. Both expressed their loneliness and isolation. These separated instances weighed heavily on Geenan who had until then been involved in the education of youth.

> Shortly afterward he approached his superiors and made a plea to do something about the needs of our elderly. He was told to go ahead. "What should I do? he asked. "You made the plea," he was told, "You figure out what to do." The result has been a life-long commitment.

> "I see people who need an advocate in many situations," he explains. "Many of us, including myself, can be that advocate even if it only means stopping and listening. Sometimes we can react in a positive way. Often the greatest need of our older residents is to be heard." (next page)



So Brother Geenan returned to Sarasota on September 1, 1973 with \$79 and a type-writer. "We just opened," he recalls. "Holy Cross Brothers carry on programs of community commitment. We're supposed to be trail blazers and do tasks that other people find difficult or impossible." When asked about his long range plans he admitted, "In the beginning I was lucky to know what I was doing that day."

The first center was an old house provided by St. Martha's Church. It became a gathering place for the elderly who otherwise would have stayed in their downtown apartments. Soon Geenan had volunteers playing music, leading card games, and teaching classes. Those who came revealed other needs: transportation, assistance in housekeeping, shopping, etc. - which needs SFC began meeting.

Over the years Geenan has seen people who came first to volunteer now needing the services themselves.

SFC opened its Health Service in 1978 in response to an estimated 6,000 Sarasotans who were not receiving medical attention, usually because of finances. A group of retired physician's was gathered. The doctors were granted limited licensure to practice medicine as volunteers. The Health Service has recorded nearly eleven thousand patient visits.

The County School System is involved in the Candlelight Dining program by opening six schools as dining sites and providing school buses to transport the 600 who congregate nightly for the hot dinners. In addition about 100 per night have the meals delivered to them when they are unable to get out.

Brother Geenan is looking forward to the time - in the near future - when Senior Friendship Centers will open their doors to include the youth in this area. "The experiences shared then," he explained, "will give our residents an opportunity to see the good and positive sides of our younger generation. And it will give the younger people a quiet lesson on how to age with grace and dignity."



Following is an excerpt of a letter from the Brothers in Ghana to Brother Philip Armstrong - which letter arrived on April 19.

"We are still unwinding after the big affair on 19th, March. We had a very fine time. Fr. Bob set up his usual excellent liturgy and we managed to find enough food to feed everyone-no minor task I assure you. Vincent was even able to find some beer for the guests. Joe Annan was very pleased with the way things went and that is most important.

"The situation in Ghana continues to worsen. On top of everything else, we are now faced with a very serious dry spell. There has been no significant rain for Many rivers and streams several months. that villagers depend on for water have gone totally dry. Even the Denu is dry. The water lever of the Volta is dangerously low and threatens the functioning of the Volta Dam. Many factories have closed down because they depend on water. Koforddua/Nsawam area has been particular-Schools were able to stay ly hard hit. open only 3 weeks second term because of the lack of water. And all over the country pumping systems are breaking down. We have had water at St. John's only once since Christmas. If, we are told, the water level of the Volta continues to go down we may be without electricity. find as I reflect on what is happening that this is almost unbelievable. Except that it is happening. I find it a great mystery how people find food to eat and how the poor find money for food. Eggs now over 6 cedis each; orange, small size 3 cedies, etc..."

FROM NARINDA, BANGLADESH

Brother John Rozario, District Superior in Bangladesh, wrote the following letter to Brother Philip Armstrong on April 11.

"Last night about 5:30 we had rain and a hailstorm. It did extensive damage to the trade school roof, which is asbestos. The hailstones were almost as big as baseballs. I don't remember having seen them so big and in so large quantity. the storm, Brother Jerome went to the shop and returned with a sad face. He said it was as if someone had sprayed it with a machine gun. Of course the electricity went out. This morning after breakfast I went to look. Through the window I could see the roof which looks like a shower head full of holes. I doubt that they can be repaired; the roof will have to be replaced.

"The machine shop, fitting shop, carpenter shop, and the big store room have asbestos roof. The electricity and radio shop and the office have concrete roof.

"Brother Robert and others are going to check how extensive is the damage and what to do next. It will be many sq. ft. of roofing to be replaced.

"As I get more news I will keep you posted."
