MIDWEST PROVINCE NEWS ITEMS

February 1999

On Friday, January 22, the Midwest Province hosted the Brothers, Sisters and Priests of Holy Cross in the observance of Moreau Day, this year marking the 200th anniversary of the founder's birth at Laigne-en-Belin in 1799.

At 5:00 p.m.a Eucharistic Liturgy was celebrated in St. Joseph's Chapel by the recently ordained Fr. Tom Doyle, C.S.C., who gave a fine homily. Immediately following mass, the sizeable crowd made its way through rain, fog and piled snow to Schubert Villa, where a grand buffet meal was served in the main dining room and both lounge areas. Brs. Joseph Fox, Thomas Shaughnessy, Thomas Rock and others assured the smooth flow of the entire evening's activities.

On February 4 and 5 the Holy Cross brothers and priests in Bangladesh celebrated several significant events together. Br. Bijoy Rodrigues and Fr. Stephen Gomes, provincials, presided at ceremonies in Dhaka marking the official transition of the two governmental entities from vice province status to that of full province, as mandated by the 1998 general chapter.

Combined with the event were also the 50th jubilees of Br. Jarlath D'Souza and Fr. Richard Timm, the 200th birthday of Fr. Basil Moreau, and the perpetual profession of five young Holy Cross religious.

A congratulatory message from Br. William Geenen, provincial, was included in the souvenir booklet printed for the occasion.

In your prayers, please remember the following intentions. Br. John Dolan (EP) died at Holy Cross House, Notre Dame, on January 10 at the age of 88. He had spent much of his religious life in apostolic work at North Dartmouth, Massachusetts. On January 11 Fr. Charles Mahoney (EP) died at Holy Cross House, also at the age of 88. He was the first Holy Cross chaplain to the brothers at St. Patrick's High School in Monrovia, Liberia. Fr. Albin Hosinski (I) died at Holy Cross House on January 18 at the age of 83. He was stationed for a time at Holy Trinity Parish in Chicago, and over many years at parishes in his home town, South Bend. He resided for several years at the Mission House before transferring to Holy Cross House. The stepmother of Br. Bernard Donahoe also died recently. Br. Edward Dailey, now living at Columba Hall and assisting the provincial administration in the business office, reported that Mrs. Agnes Griffin, sister and cousin respectively of Brs. Majella and Quentin Hegarty, died recently at St. Paul's Hermitage, Beech Grove, Indiana. The January News Items had requested prayers for her in her last illness.

Special prayers are being offered continuously for Br. Richard Weber, who has been diagnosed as having pancreatic cancer. Br. Richard appreciates the support and concern shown by so many and simply requests our ongoing remembrance of him in prayer. Please remember also the continued recuperation of Br. Thomas Schuerer at Boysville, who suffered a heart attack recently and underwent bypass surgery.

The Helen D. Schubert Villa won the Michiana Construction Industry Advancement Fund "Excellence in Construction" award in the category of "Building Award-Institutional." The award was presented at a luncheon on February 9 at which the Troyer Group, architects and designers, Verkler general contractors, and the Brothers of Holy Cross were present. The luncheon was held as part of the building trades Expo '99 at Century Center. Brs. John May, Director of Planning, and Philip Armstrong represented the province.

News from Ghana as Reported in Holy Cross Today - Ghana for December 1998

In his Christmas Message, Br. Michael Amakyi, District Superior, reminded the district members that only by sacrifice do religious bring Christ to others. "The evangelical counsels demand that we totally and without reservation leave everything to follow and serve Christ. We are to be gifts for Christ."

Br. Jerome Kroetsch announced the addition of two staff members at the Holy Cross Skills Project in Takoradi, Brs. Kenneth Kunditani and Emmanuel Mino.

A Holy Cross Associates group is being established in Ghana by Br. Daniel Dardoe, who visited the U.S. last summer to learn more about the Associates and their organization.

Br. Vincent Gross celebrated his 40th anniversary of profession on January 30 with a large gathering at Brafuyaw, the District Center. Vince has served in West Africa in both Liberia and Ghana for 32 years. Br. Michael Amakyi, district superior, reported that a hundred invitations were sent and over two hundred participated, including market women with whom Br. Vince has been trading for years. Br. Michael described the occasion as a "joyful mystery," contrasting it with the "sorrowful mystery" of the death and burial of the father of Br. Joseph Annan, and the forthcoming "glorious mystery" of the district meetings scheduled to prepare for the 1999 District Chapter later this year. Br. Joseph Tsiquaye, in Ghana for the meetings, gave the homily at Br. Vince's celebration.

Fr. Bob Malone, C.S.C. (EP), responding to a call from the district for additional help, arrived in Ghana on December 2 to begin a two-year tour at St. John's School as chaplain to the Holy Cross community and students. Fr. Bob Gilmour, long time member of the district, helps staff the pre-novitiate program at Butumagyebu, just outside Sekondi.

Br. William Gates has been appointed to the recently re-constituted Board of Governors for St. John's School, Sekondi. Br. William has served in Ghana for over 40 years.

At the initiative of Mr. Patrick McBride and other regular worshipers at the 10:00 mass on Sundays at St. Joseph Chapel at the Holy Cross Village, an energetic group identifying itself as Friends of the Brothers of Holy Cross has been established under the guidance of Mr. David Hurley, Development Director for the province, and Fr. Kenneth Grabner, chaplain to the brothers. The mission statement of the group declares that its purpose is to "support the Brothers of Holy Cross by sharing, through prayer and action, in the spiritual life and ministries of the Brothers and by providing resources to help further their work. We educate the public about the Brothers and foster interaction with them to build community and encourage religious vocations."

Every fourth Sunday of the month, mass is followed by a brunch in the Marriott cafeteria opposite the chapel, and then a brief presentation in the adjacent Basil Hall lounge. During Lent

hundred people in attendance.

On the Martin Luther King, Jr., weekend the temporarily professed brothers of the United States met in Austin, Texas, to hold their second annual retreat. Br. Dan Mallon again played a major role in organizing the retreat, which was attended by the other Bonaventure House residents from Akron, Brs. Ken Haders and Ed Fox, as well as Brs. George Bourbeau (EB), Robert LeGros (SW), Robert Wurzelbacher (SW), and candidate Gary Megan (SW). Br. David Brahmstadt (EB) was prevented by bad weather from reaching Austin. Other formation staff participants were Brs. Philip Armstrong, Mike Winslow (SW), and Bill Zaydak (EB) Br. John Tryon gave a valuable presentation on the first day and led a sharing session.

The retreat was held at Mang House on the St. Edward's University campus and at Steiner Lodge on Lake Austin. The participants attended the Eucharistic Liturgy on Saturday evening with the Br. Vincent Pieau Residence members and staff. The spacious new facility overlooking the downtown Austin skyline comprises assisted living care, retirement residential space, and apartments for several brothers formerly living elsewhere on or off campus, including Br. George Klawitter. On the closing night everyone attended a dinner at the Br. John Baptist Province Center hosted by Br. Richard Critz, provincial, and prepared by Br. Richard Daly.

To organize the handling of the increasingly complex task of maintaining the buildings, infrastructure and grounds that make up the Holy Cross Village at Notre Dame, Mr. Mark Maurer was recently employed as Facilities Manager. He will be responsible for coordinating, directing and supervising programs of maintenance, housekeeping, grounds, snow removal, security, and all services related to providing and maintaining an attractive, safe and secure environment.

Selected out of a field of 60 applicants, Mark comes to the Village from the South Bend School Corporation, where he was Assistant Facilities Manager. Prior to that, Mark was employed at the Culver Academies, Culver, Indiana. He is a graduate of St. Joseph's University in Philadelphia and has a degree as well from IUSB in management and administration.

He began work at the Village on January 18 and is temporarily situated in the province business office. Mark is meeting with employees, learning about the contributions of the brothers and lay employees who have been involved in providing these basic services, and familiarizing himself with the expanding Village facilities.

James Newberry, recently sponsored two formal presentations for brothers in the area to update them on the development of the Village. Holy Cross College administrative personnel, faculty and staff personnel have a standing invitation to stop in at any time for a briefing.

The Center held a buffet luncheon and open house for administrative officers of St. Mary's College on January 26 and the University of Notre Dame on January 27 to explain the nature and purpose of the Village and to highlight the value of its presence adjacent to these two institutions of higher learning. General open houses are scheduled for others from the two schools in the near future.
