Reflection for Columba Hall Tribute To 2023 Jubilarians

Presentation on the eve of jubilee by Brother Robert Mosher, C.S.C.

In this reflection for today, it is my intention to honor not only the 2023 jubilarians but also all Holy Cross members.

"Before my birth the Lord called me, from my mother's womb he gave me my name. He said to me 'You are my servant that my salvation may reach the ends of the earth"

These words, which I have just quoted from the Old Testament prophet Isiah Chapter 49, verses 1,3, and 6, confirm, I believe, why the jubilarians are here in Holy Cross today.

In Chapter 1 verses 35-39 of his Gospel, St. John the Evangelist tells us that "John [the Baptist] was . . . with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he said, 'Behold, the Lamb of God.' The two disciples heard what he said and followed Jesus. Jesus turned to them following him and said, 'What are you looking for?' They said to him, 'Rabbi, where are you staying?' He said to them, 'Come, and you will see.' So they went and they stayed with him that day."

The jubilarians, having much earlier in their lives discerned a vocation to the religious life as Brothers, also sought out Jesus as the Baptist's disciples did. And Jesus likewise responded to them, "Come, and see, and they indeed came and saw: the *Congregation of Holy Cross*, and they have stayed with Jesus ever since for these forty, fifty, sixty, and seventy years respectively.

And heeding Jesus' counsel, they, the Jubilarians, once having put their hands to the plow, have not looked back.

Like St. Matthew's merchant in chapter 13, verses 45 and 46 who found a pearl of great price, and sold all he had to buy it, so too have our Jubilarians done by having pronounced their vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience.

Their vow of Poverty frees them from any material encumbrances upon their relationships with God, religious Community, and those whom they serve.

Their poverty is evidenced in their simple, uncomplicated lives, devoid of the allurements of and preoccupation with material gain and worldly success. It is what motivates them to empathize more readily with the poor and the marginalized.

Their vow of Chastity transforms their choice of a committed love for one person to

a desired love for all persons. Their emulating this love that God himself has for all of his creation enables them to recognize more easily who their brothers and sisters really are.

Their vow of obedience facilitates their willingness to listen to others, especially Superiors, and accept their judgments and decisions in manifesting God's will for participation in the life and work of the Congregation.

Their life in Community has been an example of the best that can be lived: with unity amid diversity, sufficiency along with simplicity, holiness as well as human frailty, youth together with age, the sharing of values, goals, and resources, and, above all, fraternity.

Their life in Holy Cross has been a taste of the salt of the earth which has *not* lost its savor.

Ministerially, the Jubilarians' lives in Holy Cross have been as on a journey along the road to Jericho, during which they have often paused to provide in many different ways a dressing and healing of the wounds of others who have been somehow waylaid by the vicissitudes of life.

Jesus, the Good Shepherd, has called Holy Cross to tend his sheep, and all its members have done so faithfully, at times searching for the strayed and finding the lost.

The Congregation of Holy Cross is a city built by the Lord and so the Jubilarians and all of its other members are his workers. who have not labored in vain.

Holy Cross is the city of St. Matthew's Gospel, a city set on a mountain, the light of which cannot be hid, a light which dispels all the darkness; the light which is Christ.

On this eve of the occasion of the celebration of jubilees of profession of vows, let all of us in Holy Cross thank God for his loving call to our vocations as Brothers and as priests. and rededicate ourselves as his very faithful servants, and that God will especially bless our 2023 Jubilarians.


