#### 200<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Year for Brothers: Saint Joseph – Holy Cross

BROTHER REMI MERIANNE: A Voice of Reason against Separatists 1809-1888

Etienne Merianne was born February 10, 1809. He joined Jacques Dujarie's Brothers of St. Joseph in Ruille one month before his sixteenth birthday. He became a novice on September21, 1825, nine months after entering, but did not profess final vows until August 19, 1838, ten years after he had received his teaching credentials on October 7, 1828. By the age of nineteen he was considered by the government to be prepared to teach French children. Throughout his years as a religious Brother, he apparently excelled in the teaching profession.

The amalgamation of two organizations is rarely accomplished without wrinkles and heartache especially if one of the organizations is fifteen years old and the other is a fledgling. Add to the mix a hierarchy of education and the result can be less than conflict free. Thus it was with the amalgamation of Jacques Dujarie's Brothers of St. Joseph and Basil Moreau's auxiliary priests in 1835, the Brothers fifty strong and teaching in thirty schools, the priests six in number with four seminarians. The joining was, however, accomplished with minimum chaos thanks to the gentle sanctity of Dujarie and the charism of Moreau, at stake a revolutionary idea of joining as equals (more or less equals) clerics and nonclerics. Originally, the apostolates of the two groups were to be separate and complementary, the Brothers as teachers, and the priests as pastoral substitutes in parishes, but rather rapidly the priests moved into school management and teaching, thus threatening some of the Brothers trained under Dujarie to manage their own schools. It did not help, of course, that the priests enjoyed a lengthy and deep education-preparation for apostolic work while the Brothers cobbled

together one or two years of study before being shuttled out to the primary schools.

In the early days of the amalgamation there was a minority of Brothers who took umbrage at the merger and developed an underground agitation for a separation of the two societies.

In France, one of the most respected voices for a united Holy Cross over the same period of time was Brother Remi Merianne, who labored for sixty-three years in education, supported his priest-supervisors, and on occasion counseled provincial superiors. We can appreciate him today as a man who entered Dujarie's group when it was moving toward Moreau's stewardship and who recognized that groups evolve like any other organic being. Remi accepted the evolutionary movement in Holy Cross as inspired by the Holy Spirit for the betterment of Church work. He did not fight to preserve the old ways, the old order, the old system of community used under Dujarie.

By 1877 Remi was a trusted source for the history of the Brothers. In a letter dated September 1, 1879, Remi reveals that the Brothers were founded as "The Brothers of St. Joseph" not "The Josephites." What we know about Remi comes from the available copies of his correspondence much of which has been lost or not preserved. For Remi then we must be content with what we have – a handful of letters and a legacy of respectability. Brother Remi died at Angers on February 2, 1888. He had given all but the first fifteen years of his life to the Brothers first known as the Brothers of St. Joseph and later known as the Brothers from Holy Cross. He was a champion of Brothers and priests united in one religious community, never wavering in this heartfelt vision.


## Columba Hall, 2<sup>nd</sup> Floor Named in Honor of Brother Vincent Pieau





Brother Vincent was born Jean Pieau on February 15, 1797. He was orphaned early, and in 1822, at the age of 26, he traveled to Ruille to join Dujarie's young band of Brothers. He served as one of the four resident Brother Directors of the Brothers of St. Joseph until he was sent to America in 1841, the oldest of the seven men sent from Le Mans to Indiana. He was chosen because he could train the two missionary novices sent with the group, and he could train new recruits in Indiana. Vincent's duties over the years were multiple: he was a factotum who could be used to fill any vacancy that arose at Notre Dame. Of the seven Holy Cross men who came to America in 1841, Vincent, eldest of the missionary colony, outlived all but two of them. Death came to the patriarch Vincent on July 23, 1890, at the age of 93.








# Dedication: Reflection on Brother Vincent Pieau By Brother Philip Smith

Just as Andre Mottais has been deemed the second founder of the Brothers

of Saint Joseph and Father Dujarie's right-hand man, so, too, we can honor Brother Vincent Pieau as the co-founder of the American branch of the Brothers and of the University of Notre Dame. For the entirety of his years in the States, he was referred to as the Patriarch of all Holy Cross religious. A very intelligent and adaptable man, he was able to attend to any situation or assignment. Brother Vincent held just about every position in the American Congregation from that of baker, butcher, sugar master--to director of several schools and orphanages--to master of novices and provincial council member to Assistant Superior General. Father Sorin had complete trust in his abilities and in his wisdom to handle any situation in an insightful and compassionate manner. The following was written about him in August of 1890 in the *Notre Dame Scholastic*.

"On Wednesday, July 23, the venerable Brother Vincent passed peacefully from earth in the 93rd year of his age. He was one of the 6 religious, who, in 1841, accompanied Father Sorin from France to the shores of this Western World. Ever since that time he has been the associate of the venerable Founder of Notre Dame in the great work which he inaugurated and has carried on to such a successful issue. For many long years Brother Vincent had directed and watched over the formation of the religious spirit in the youthful candidates in the novitiate, and the lessons inspired by his piety and beautiful example left a deep and lasting impression and contributed materially to the infusion of that zeal and devotion which have made the Congregation of Holy Cross, in the United States, so happily successful in the attainment of its mission. When advancing years deprived him of physical strength, he still continued a model to his fellow religious, whose work he aided by the power of the prayers with which he constantly was occupied. His was a life full of years and merits, and we may have every confidence that it has been fittingly rewarded by that glory and joy which await the good and faithful servant." -- Scholastic, 24:1, 1890.
