Pope Francis names it in one of his letters as our Common Home. Carl Jung discovered the Collective Unconscious in his therapy. This connection is real and it verifies that the prayers we offer for others do make a difference. We are connected to a "spiritual internet." Tests have recorded that those who are prayed for in love do better in the healing process than those who were not. Eating Meals Together

People in Palestine in Jesus' time considered eating meals together as a somewhat like ritual expressing and celebrating their common ident\ity and affinity as humans. Satisfying hunger and seeking nourishment to survive are characteristically indicative of being human.

Such a notion may explain why the scribes and pharisees complained about the behavior of Jesus: "This man welcomes sinners and eats with them" (Luke 15:20). Biased, they equated anyone unlike themselves as subhuman, and were completely unaware that Jesus, as the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, was made flesh – *humanity*.

Therefore, considering who Jesus is, he was more than ready and willing to recognize and relate to anyone he ate with or otherwise encountered as fellow humans – sinners or sinless.

Futhermore, St. Paul tells us: "He [God] made Him [Jesus] who knew no sin to be sin for us, that we might become righteous of God" (2 Cpr 5:21).





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
