This Week

Information on individual early Brothers of St. Joseph for posting week by week in 2020.

August 30 – September 5 On August 31, 1835, the Brothers moved their motherhouse from Ruille to Le Mans and came under the direction of **Father Basil Moreau.** On August 31 the following year the Brothers' motherhouse in Ruille, the Grand St. Joseph, was sold. It still stands but is now an apartment building.

September 6 – 12 In this week in 1792 Brother Stephen Gauffre was born. He came to Ruille in 1820 to join the Brothers, the 4th recruit to Father Dujarie's new Community. He taught as a Brother all his life. In September 1831 seventeen Brothers signed the "Declaration of Fidelity" at Ruille as they sensed their Community falling apart because of the 1830 mini-revolution in France.

Date of death for Brothers of Saint Joseph who entered before the 1837 Fundamental Act of Union and died in the Community in September. (Age in italics. Rank after year of death.)

A Tribute to Br. Etienne and the St. Joseph Brothers

On Tuesday, September 1, Columba Hall members held a 5:00 evening prayer service commemorating the 200th anniversary of our history as Saint Joseph Brothers.

Our service began with the dedication of the house parlor to Br. Etienne Gauffre. Brother Joseph McTagggart read a reflection on Br. Etienne. A commemorative plaque has been posted on one of the walls of the parlor.



Brother Stephen Gauffre was horn in 1792 in St. Loup du Gast. He was the fourth young man to answer James Dujarie's call for Brothers, arriving at Ruille on November 16, 1820. He was 28 years old. He and Brother Andre Mottais were the first to receive and wear the religious habit, given to them on the road near Ruilk by Dujarie when Stephen and Dujarie welcomed Andre back from

his months at the Christian Brothers' novitiate in Paris. Stephen received his teaching diploma in May, 1822. He did not profess vows until 1842, five years after the Brothers and priests had signed the Fundamental Pact of Union (1837). We still have some of his letters written from the schools where he taught. He died in Le Mans in 1851, just as the new school year was beginning.

Following this, Brother James Kane read out the names of St. Joseph Brothers who had died in the month of September. The sound of a bell being struck was heard after each name. (See list above – pg 1) Daily Office continued the service.

Service concluded with Brother James Walters (Moreau House of Studies) presenting a reflection on Br. Etienne (See below for James' presentation). We ended with a hymn and departed for supper.

When Br. George (Klawitter) asked me to give this reflection last year, he didn't know that I myself was in the process of discerning a transfer from a seminarian to a brother. A year later, here I am, a brother among brothers! In some ways, I see it as providential that God made this call clear to me during this 200th year anniversary of the founding of our society.

"We asked how we might follow, and we found many footprints on the road. A great band of men had passed this way, men who had made and lived by their vows, men who had walked side by side in their following of the Lord. They beckoned us to fall in step with them. We wanted to be part of the family they formed in order to share in their life and work."

My dear brothers in Holy Cross, I don't know about you, but this line from our Constitutions has always struck me. As a young religious in formation, when I hear these words, I am reminded of the many Holy Cross brothers and priests who have gone before me. I am captivated by the great, well known members of our Order, names like Basil Moreau, Edward Sorin, Andre Bessette, Patrick Peyton, Flavian LaPlante, and Ted Hesburgh. But, you know, I find even more inspiration in reflecting upon the scores of Holy Cross religious whose names and stories are more obscure and elusive. It is in this latter category that I would place many of the Brothers of St. Joseph who would go on to become Brothers of Holy Cross. This group of men, men like Andre Mottais, Vincent Pieau, and Etienne Gauffre, many of whom lived their religious life in relative obscurity, have nevertheless paved the way for the generations of Holy Cross Brothers who have followed them. Yes, it is true that these early brothers lived difficult lives, lives marked by

uncertainty, illness, and constant struggle; yet despite these trials, they remained steadfast in their trust in Divine Providence. Furthermore, their commitment to and love for God and one another continues to inspire us in living our own holy vocations today.

As I reflect back upon the early brothers of St. Joseph/Brothers of Holy Cross and the uncommon bond which they shared with one another, I am reminded again of our Constitutions. As Constitution 4 beautifully exhorts, "It is essential to our mission that we strive so attentively together that people will observe: 'See how they love one another.' We will then be a sign in an alienated world: men who have for love of their Lord, become closest friends, brothers."

Gentlemen, just like the brothers who came before us, we have each been chosen by God to witness to His love in a world desperately in need. While our contemporary response to this need may look different than it did 200 years ago, our mission to be "educators in the faith" is the same today as it was in 1820 when Fr. Dujarie founded the Brothers of St. Joseph and in 1837 when Fr. Moreau formed the Congregation of Holy Cross.

And so, as we continue to commemorate this bicentennial of the Brothers of St. Joseph/Brothers of Holy Cross, may we look back on our forbearers with gratitude and admiration. The same time, let us remember to look forward to the bright future of our society and of our Congregation.






