Are You Listening?

This is a special time in our Church. Pope Francis is inviting all Catholics to get involved in the process called "synodality." This term refers to the input the bishops will receive from the members of their dioceses to be presented at the next synod in Rome.

We are asked to be particularly aware of how well we are listening to others' concerns about the future of the Church as well as our own when we meet in small groups. This is especially a challenge when another person's viewpoint differs greatly from what we see as priorities.

To be aware of what another person is trying to communicate to us, we need to review some basic points. First, when the other person is speaking, we need to try to put ourselves into his or her world. This means we are not thinking about our own ideas at the same time. Next, we become aware of the emotion(s) the other person is showing as he or she is speaking and how it is affecting us. By naming our emotion we become able to freely choose how we want to react.

When we have truly listened, we become open to something new happening. Our faith tells us that Christ is present where two or more are gathered in His name. This is how Vatican II gave the Church a new awakening that is still being fully implemented. This is how the Church chooses a new pope. Maybe it is through listening to the "people in the pews," our Church can begin to truly become the "People of God."


