


Midwest Province Archives







Suggested Reflection for the Feast of the Apostle, St. Thomas

Homily presented at Columba Hall Community Mass:

Although the gospels provide little or no biographical details about the Apostle St. Thomas, what they do mention about him leaves one with the impression of a man who was simple, honest, direct, gentle, thoughtful and intelligent, and, as a friend, true and loyal.

In view of today's gospel reading, can we pose the question: Was St. Thomas, the Apostle, really the "doubter," as he has been so often characterized throughout the ages? Let us reflect upon two other gospel references that might very well suggest that he was indeed otherwise.

Learning of the death of his friend Lazarus, Jesus, in John 11:7-8, tells his disciples "Let us go back to Judea," and his disciples protest, "Rabbi, the Jews were just trying to stone you, and you want to go back there?" to which Thomas, called Didymus, proposes to his fellow disciples, in John 11:16, "Let us go to die with him."

May we not consider Thomas' words here as indicative of the personal wholehearted investment of Thomas' undivided love of and loyalty to Jesus, perhaps rendering his being incapable of surrendering himself so completely to anyone else? For Thomas, being a disciple of Jesus is clearly even worth dying for.

In John 14:4 when at the Last Supper Jesus tells his disciples, "Where I am going you know the way," may not Thomas, who asks "Master, we do not know the way," be seeking only confirmation as a wholehearted disciple of Jesus? Apparently, there was only one way for Thomas, and that was Jesus' way.

So, imagine the effect Jesus' death must have had upon a disciple like Thomas; how devastating to that love of and loyalty to Jesus. How could he ever risk again committing himself as an uncompromising disciple to anyone else but the only authentic Jesus that he had ever known.

So, may we not consider Thomas' post resurrection declaration in John 21:25: "unless I see the marks of the nails in his hands and put my hand into his side, I will not believe," less a matter of doubt or disbelief, but perhaps more the resolve of one whose heart could be given again only to the one who would be confirmed with certainty to Thomas' satisfaction as truly being his Jesus.

The moment of the martyrdom of St. Thomas, the apostle of India, was confirmation of the genuine faith of this dedicated disciple of Jesus, who said, "my Lord and my God." (John 21:28).

We too of Holy Cross have also dedicated ourselves fully to the authentic risen Jesus. Celebrating Thomas' feast today, let us ask him to intercede for us that we too may remain loyal in our commitment as devoted disciples of Jesus.



Carving "Refugees" By Br. James Kane, CSC (M)

This 2019 basswood (9"x6"x1") relief carving is entitled "Refugees." The inspiration for the carving comes from the present, worldwide refugee crisis that cannot be contained, a migratory predicament that challenges affluent societies, one that plucks at the heartstrings.

Hanging in the Columba Hall third floor corridor is a lovely painting done by Brother James Kane. It is a watercolor of his mother, who passed away in 2005. James painted the picture in 2012 capturing her as she looked when she graduated in 1934 from Cathedral High School in New York City.

The picture is done in soft tones to capture the gentle features of her face, and the image is so realistic, it seems life-like.

James' mother raised ten children on her own after her husband died rather young. She herself was a painter and continued to paint even after she was legally blind. Doing portraits most of her life, she turned to abstracts after her sight failed. She had an exhibition of her work once at Marywood in Grand Rapids.

James himself, a teacher of math and computer science, studied art with the National Art League in Queens, New York. The League uses retired art teachers and teachers who are still in classrooms.

Over the years, James has treated Columba Hall to many of his art pieces, particularly his wood carvings. He has done several that now are in Valatie, New York, in the chapel of the Brothers' retirement center. He carved one first of Brother Andre, then one of Father Moreau, and finally one of Father Dujarié.

James likes to carve in soft basswood, but he has also carved in cedar, pine, and butternut. Here in Indiana he belongs to the Council Oak Woodcarvers of St. Joseph County.

In Texas in 1996 James did a clay relief of Father Moreau that used to hang in St. Joseph Hall on the St. Edward's University campus. He has not worked in clay recently.

James' work can be seen not only in Valatie. He has photographs hanging in Holy Cross High School, Flushing (New York) and other work in Holy Cross High School, Waterbury, Connecticut.

When you are next in Columba Hall, be sure to go to the third floor and see James' watercolor of his mother. It is magnificent.
