

Twin Brothers To Be Ordained

The Rev. Thomas H. Byrne and the Rex. Lex. W. Byrne, 32-yearold twin sons of Mr. and Mrs. Lex W. Byrne of 4600 Meldon Avenue, will be ordained Jesuit priests by Archbishop John J. Mitty in a ceremony at 9 a.m. Friday in St. Mary's Cathedral, San Francisco.

They are the brothers of Sister Antonia Marie, treasurer of the College of the Holy Names; Sister Margheretta Marie of the Archdiocesan Department of Education, Miss Marjorie Louise Byrne of Oakland and Hugh Byrne of Oakland.

Another brother, Joseph, was killed in action at Guadalcanal in World War II while serving with the U.S. Navy.

Born in Salt Lake City, the twins were graduated from St. Mary's High School, Berkeley, and completed their studies for the Society of Jesus at Alma College, Los Gatos. Lex Byrne also attended the University of California for three years.

The two will offer their first public masses June 28 in Our Lady of Lourdes Church, 2808 Lakeshore Avenue — Lex Byrne at 9 a.m. and Thomas Byrne at 9:45 a.m.

The Rev. Bartholomew J. Kevany, pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes, will preach and assist the new priests at both masses.




Escaping the Pandemic's Deepest Cut, So What Remains? by Joe McTaggart, csc


HOLY CROSS VALUES ST. ED'S COMMUNITY CONSTRUCTS DECORATED OFRENDA TO CELEBRATE AND HONOR DIA DE LOS MUERTOS



St. Ed's SALSA Club (Spanish and Latino Student Association) constructed a tiered altar called an ofrenda in honor of those who have passed away in our community to commemorate Dia de los Muertos, the Day of the Dead. This Mexican tradition to honor the dead and inviting them to their earthly home reminds us that they are always welcome and loved. Customarily, ofrendas, meaning offerings, include decorations representing the four elements (water, wind, earth and fire), papel picado, which are traditional, colorful paper banners, and are built in levels to represent heaven, earth, and the underworld. Candles and incense are also added to help guide the spirits of difuntos (the deceased) home for a visit with their loved ones. Pan de muerto, Day of the Dead bread, is baked in a circular shape and offered

on the ofrenda to represent the cycle of life and death. St. Ed's ofrenda, decorated with skulls and skeletons, flags, marigolds, notes and personal items, is the focal point of the main hallway, welcoming our community to stop and say prayers for those who have gone before us. Additionally, a guest book has been placed in front of the altar for students, faculty, and staff to add names of family and friends they've lost to be prayed for by the community.

"It's important to note that Dia de Los Muertos is not a sad holiday. The living view it as a chance to remember those who have passed, share stories and celebrate their life," says Spanish teacher Sherie Quinn. In preparation for All Saints Day and All Souls Day, St. Ed's ofrenda invited our community to remember those who have greatly impacted St. Ed's and to celebrate and honor cultural traditions together.

- Is Christ calling you to assume more responsibility in ministry by urging you to take one step at a time relying on God's help?


O God, allow me to see that my weaknesses can be stepping stones to relying more on you.
