Brother James Newberry, C.S.C. (1929-2022)

Good morning, I am Brother Philip Smith, the province archivist. In the name of all province members, I offer our condolences and prayers to Brother James' nieces Betsy, Janet, Laura, and Mary and to his nephew, Tom, and to his family members who are in their homes watching the service today.

Although I have never lived with Brother James, I met him on scores of occasions over the last 50 plus years. As archivist, I also have had the opportunity to reflect on James' life by reading and reviewing whatever documents he felt were important enough to send to the archives for preservation.

Soon after James' death, Brother Chris Torrijas brought me ten or twelve albums of photos and other memorabilia that James spent hours assembling into categories that clearly testified to those aspects of his life that he found specifically representative of that which was formative for him: his personal history before 1960, and his personal history after 1960 upon entering the Brothers of Holy Cross.

It is clearly obvious that he was proud of and devoted to his family because of the formation they provided for him for his entire 93 years. Likewise, he was proud of his 63 years of formation and growth with the brothers of the Congregation of Holy Cross. And he was especially proud of his time spent in each of his ministries: specifically, for his life with the Native American students on the Cherry Creek reservation in South Dakota; his life with the people and students of St. Patrick High School in Monrovia, Liberia; and his two years as director of André House of Hospitality in Oakland, California. Indeed, four of the albums he left behind chronicle in photo and word his devotion to and love for persons who often found themselves in predicaments leading to disenfranchisement. As a man of quiet missionary spirit, he was willing to "cross borders of every sort" as Holy Cross

religious men and women are asked to do, and he boldly went to places that stretched the borders of his enormous heart to include just a few more of God's blessed poor.

Brother James took Blessed Basile Moreau's educational mandate – to education the heart as well as the mind – seriously. His businesslike demeanor in the classroom, graphically displayed for his students that he was the leader – but not one who would lead only from the front of the class, but as one among them: as a confidant and guide through and over many of their personal, seemingly formidable borders.

Once he assessed a student's potential, he would assist each of them to discover what he, the educator, had come to know about them; and then assist them to capitalize upon this information so they, too, might cross borders of every kind and become guides for others.

Yet Brother James also knew that this was only one aspect of a true Holy Cross education: that for the whole person to be formed, the heart must also be touched, must be expanded to include compassion for others. Once the mind and the heart were in the process of connection, James knew that these young people could be transformed to build up the Body of Christ, not diminish it.


Brother George Schmitz, once a provincial of the former Eastern Province of Brothers recalled: "I have very fond memories of James. During his time as superior at Columba Hall and after, he was my eyes and ears for our Eastern Province Brothers at Dujarié House infirmary. He would go there often and send me reports. In particular, he watched over one brother who suffered from depression, and James was always sensitive to his plight."

This sensitivity to the plight of others is a lasting hallmark of Brother James Newberry: he forged relationships with folks of every age, every rank, every hue, and every need.

Before James entered the congregation in 1960, he reported that "I knew the Lord was calling me to something, but I was befuddled because I did not feel called to priesthood, and I knew no Brothers." Reflecting upon 50 years of being a brother, in 2000, Brother James wrote, "The Lord made no mistake when he asked me to be a Brother rather than a priest, and I thank God every day for the gift of my vocation."

Today each of us offers thanks to God too – for the gift of Brother James to his family, to the Congregation of Holy Cross and for the gift he was to the many persons whom he inspired to cross borders of every kind.

there is no need to knock.


In everyone's life some rain does fall,



Praying “Hard”

Ideas about prayer can be tricky. Sometimes we might experience guilt for not having prayed enough for the people who have asked for prayers. Sometimes we might feel that our petitions to God are overwhelming. God knows our needs. God does not forget. Then there is a Scripture that says to “pray always.” How can this be possible given the busy lives that we lead?

Maybe this question about praying always would subside if it simply meant being open to God’s presence in everything that is happening in our world. Christ chose to be human so he could walk with us in our experiences in everyday life. He did go up the mountain to pray alone at times especially when things got hectic just as we might need to get away or spend some time alone to center ourselves and affirm what is essential in the way we are living.
