Research Team Studies Brothers at Columba Hall

This week, a team of researchers from Rush University Medical Center in Chicago came to Columba Hall to survey and test a group of Brothers who agreed to participate in a scientific study called the “Religious Orders Study.” The study began in 1993 and uses information gathered from more than 1100 older religious (nuns, brothers, priests) who have agreed to participate in medical and psychological evaluations each year and to donate their brain after death.

The study looks at what changes in the brain are responsible for memory and movement problems. It also looks at what transition from the normal brain and physiological performance might lead to mild cognitive impairment (*e.g.* memory loss) and/or early signs of Alzheimer’s disease.

Over a thousand nuns, brothers, and priests in 31 different religious communities and congregations are participating in this nation-wide study within New York, Philadelphia, New Orleans, the Greater Chicago area, other cities in the Midwest, San Antonio, and Los Altos, California.

Brother Roy and Lawrence joined the Religious Orders Study in 2008 and have been the only Congregation of Holy Cross people participating until this week. Roy had learned about the Study when he was attending a conference and a joint meeting with the National Black Sisters Conference.

An invitation was made so that the medical leader (Dr. David Bennett) of the Religious Orders Study gave a presentation at Columba Hall this

winter in hopes of recruiting more Brothers for the study. Ten new volunteers signed up to begin participating. Each volunteer agreed to an annual clinical evaluation and also brain donation after death and signed a consent form and an Anatomical Gift Act.

This week the research team spent more than 2 days with us at Columba Hall to conduct about 3 hours of tests on each participant. The team's first visit with a volunteer is to collect [1] physiological

data: (e.g., height, weight, blood pressure, reflex responses, dexterity, walking gait, blood, balance tests, etc.) and [2] mental and psychological data by using a battery of 21 different tests involving memory and cognition. The results provide a "baseline" of the individual's first performance on the tests. Then annual visits by the research team re-test the person to compare the volunteer's status with the baseline performance.

A benefit of the study is that we subjects don't have to travel each year to be re-tested. The Rush University Medical Center's research team travels to us. *If any other brother or religious needs more information or is interested in joining the Study, just contact Br Roy Smith or me.*


How did you become a missionary?

I answered the call to become a Brother of Holy Cross at age 22 while attending college in an engineering co-op program. After graduation, I taught at Holy Cross high schools in Indiana and Ohio for 16 years. It was a vocation I enjoyed. In 1969 my superior asked me to go to Liberia, something I had never-considered, but this seemed to be God's will for me. ...

Holy Trinity – B-Stem Program



What is B-STEM?

B-STEM is the combination of business curriculum with science, engineering, math and technology (STEM) curriculum. The B-STEM program at Holy Trinity is a four-year honors-level program. Students who successfully complete the program will receive a special honors diploma. Admission to the program is by invitation and is based on performance on the High School Placement Test as well as elementary school performance and recommendations. Students should be qualified for the honors track upon admission.

Why B-STEM?

Traditional STEM gives students advanced skills in science, technology, engineering and math. B-STEM takes those skills and combines them with the business skills that students will need for advanced degrees and real world application.

The goal of the program is to prepare students to succeed in Business and STEM majors in college and to give students the skills needed for successful professional careers:

Critical thinking – the ability to define questions and problems, design investigations to gather and organize data, generate and evaluate alternatives, and implement solutions

Financial literacy – the ability to understand how money works in the world and concepts of costs, profitability, financing, and return on investment

Communication – the ability to articulate thoughts, ideas, and reasoning clearly and appropriately, to a wide audience

Self-reliance – the ability to use personal initiative and self-motivation to set agendas, develop and gain self-confidence, work within specified time frames, and follow a project through to completion

Collaboration – the ability to work with others to achieve a common goal

Creative problem solving – the ability to use imagination and innovation, think in divergent directions, and develop novel approaches to the conception of ideas and solutions

B-STEM Educational Opportunities



The B in B-STEM will engage students in the fundamentals of business. Students will apply their communication, collaboration, financial literacy and decision making skills while learning to become strong leaders and project managers. Starting freshman year, students will participate in competitions like the Microsoft World Series of Innovation. During their sophomore and junior years, students collaborate with organizations like Network for Teaching Entrepreneurship and Future founders to develop entrepreneurial skills. By their senior year, students have a variety of curriculum options that include, but are not limited to, robotics, economics, and a capstone entrepreneurial course.

B-STEM students have exciting summer opportunities for enhanced learning. Summer opportunities allow students to explore things they cannot do during the regular school year. This includes a wide variety of opportunities, such as:

- Travel
- Illinois Institute of Technology Boeing programs
- Internships at corporations such as Wells Fargo, JP Morgan Chase, E.On, and various law firms and nonprofit organizations
- Fermilab internships
- Service programs
- University summer programs like Summer Discovery at the University of Michigan and NFTE Starters Biz Camp at University of Illinois - Chicago.



The program incorporates project-based learning and real-world problem solving opportunities related to business and entrepreneurship, as well as math and science. B-STEM students have the opportunity to become members of prestigious academic and professional societies like the National Business Honor Society and Business Professionals of America (BPA).

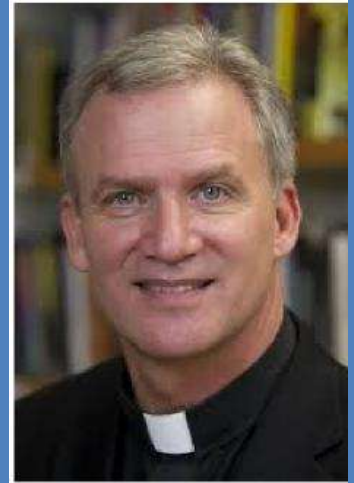
