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

On The Road to Jericho


Those who have read or heard the New Testament are aware of the details. In the *Parable of the Good Samaritan*: Luke 10:29-31 three men – a Priest, Levite, and Samaritan traveling the road to Jericho encounter as each passes by a sorely beaten man. Only one stops to render the victim of an obvious robbery any help – the Samaritan.

To the Jewish audience listening to Jesus tell this story, the revelation that the Samaritan was the one who stopped would have come as a complete surprise. The centuries old rift between Jews and Samaritans resulting in hatred and ostracization was well known.

Their judgement of the two religious men might have been less negative. The priest's and Levite's choice not to stop and provide aid might have been motivated

by, the audience may have speculated, at least an understandable excuse if not the apparent reason of deliberate indifference or callousness. Both were strictly bound by the Torah's penalties for violation of its laws regulating purification; any physical contact with blood or dead body would render them defiled and unable to perform their religious functions until ritually cleansed. Ultimately there would be always, of course, the appeal to the higher law of Charity

Parables, especially those of Jesus are designed to influence and/or change our attitudes and values. Specifically, here in the *Samaritan*: Who is my neighbor (person[s] to whom I owe Charity).


The Resurrected Life
