





Sources for the Magi

World history and culture have devised the appellations – kings. Wise Men are cited in the Nativity Gospel of St. Matthew (Chapter 2). Actually scholarly speculation identifies them, if factually authentic, as more likely Persian Priests reputed to have delved into the occult aspects of Astrology. In view of the fact that they would have had knowledge of or access to Old Testament prophetic records still available from the time of the Persian occupation of Israel, their expedition in search of a star supposedly signifying the promised birth of a savior King in Bethlehem would seem plausible.

In his effort in establishing a convincing connection between Jesus as absolute heir of the messianic prophesies of the Old Testament, Matthew tailored his writings with quotes and allusions from the Old Testament. So he did in composing the story of the Magi, referencing from each of the following:

Isaiah 60: "Nation shall walk by your light." "Kings by the radiance of your dawning." (v. 2) "Your sons from afar the wealth of nations shall come to you." (5) "Caravans of camels shall come to you. Dromedaries of Media and Ephah." "All from Sheba shall come bearing gold and frankincense." (v. 6)

As well as Psalm 72: 11: "May all the kings bow down before him."

Notwithstanding possible apocryphal elements, the story remains an enduring component of the Christian celebration of Christmas. And as a part of scripture, a revelation.

The Fire of Grace

Sometimes we can achieve our goals by will power alone. The pianist practices a run of notes over and over again until he or she has mastered them. A football player along with his team executes a play in practice until it becomes second nature. These examples take will power sometimes going beyond normal effort. Body and spirit keep saying enough is enough, but we press on.

Is there another motivation that God invites us to consider? Jesus seemed to have it in for some who practiced the letter of the exterior law and put down those who could not do likewise. Maybe these people lacked the means to follow all of the details involved in dietary requirements, for example.

What is the motivation that God appreciates? Maybe it begins with a recognition of one's own limitations. Surrendering to a higher source of God's energy and love may result in a fire from within. St. Paul can say, "I can do all things in Christ who strengthens me." The fire of God's grace which is love can motivate us to accomplish what God calls us to be and do. We only have to recognize and accept this gift of God's grace.

- Do you act on will power alone at times?
- Do you experience God's grace to help you in difficult times?
- Is prayer a means to activate God's fire within you?

O God, send forth within me the fire of your love.


