

Justice & Peace Commission

We continue with our report of justice and peace and social ministry activities going on at various ministries connected with the Brothers of Holy Cross, Midwest. This report focuses on Holy Cross Village.

Holy Cross Village residents, brothers and lay, are involved in a number of volunteer programs both



on campus and off campus. On-campus volunteers help with resident activities in the Quinn Memory Care Center and/or Dujarie House. A "wheel chair brigade" takes residents outdoors in order to enjoy the fresh air and see what's going on around the campus. Others help with pushing wheel chairs to the chapel or from the chapel to the dining room. Volunteers also help feed patients in the dining room. Another group has volunteered to pray and keep vigil with those who are dying or near death and help to provide consolation to family members of the bereaved. A group has taken training and has become involved in providing respite care to other members of the Village when the primary care-giver/spouse needs to do shopping or keep other appointments. Residents serve as lectors and Eucharistic ministers regularly and take Communion to sick or homebound in the community. There is a 20-voice choir which provides music for special occasions. The "Free Wheelers" provide drop-off or pick-up at the airport or for occasional doctor's visits.

Off-campus activities include volunteering at St. Vincent DePaul Society, the Catholic Worker House, prison ministry and Dismas House (a transitional housing program), St. Augustine Soup Kitchen, Little Flower Food Bank, and the Sister Maura Brannick Health Center. Village residents and staff have participated in the yearly Alzheimer's Walk and the LaSalle Neighborhood Project which

involves cleanup or painting houses of the poor or elders. They have also raised funds and provided donations for an overnight drop-in center for teenagers, Sister Maura's Food Bank, the Little Flower Food Pantry. A number of residents have taught courses for seniors at Forever Learning Institute.

All of this volunteerism, especially to other members of the Village, fits in with one of the original goals of the Village--for residents to be neighbors to one another.

Some residents are also more involved in social justice issues such as working to promote foster parenting in that there are 500,000 or so unwanted children who need foster parents for them to get out of state run institutional systems. Another issue of interest is that of pro-life, meaning abolishing abortion, protecting those dying from being euthanized, helping mothers through pregnancy centers to have their children and helping those involved in abortions to deal with the aftermath and to reconcile with God and themselves. Abolishing the death penalty is another issue of concern.
