Donard's Fishing Trip



Brother Donard Receives a Fishing Trip for His Birthday

A couple of weeks ago, I (**Br. Lawrence Stewart**) attended a two-day workshop at the University of Texas Health Science Center in San Antonio, Texas. After the workshop I planned to “pay off” a belated birthday gift to the oldest member of the Midwest Province,

Brother Donard Steffes. Donard turned 96 last December 10. I arranged to take Donard fishing with two of our good friends in Marble Falls, Texas.

Last year Brother Donard was featured in a front-page article in the *Austin American-Statesman* about his retiring from teaching. A link to the article appeared in *Midwest-Midweek*, the Midwest Province weekly web-newsletter to Holy Cross Community members.

The friends on the fishing trip were both retired microbiology professors whom I've known for almost 20 years. Charlie Gauntt is a Texan and Steve Mattingly is a transplanted Hoosier from Evansville. Steve is a product of Reitz Memorial High School (Class of 1961) in Evansville. Steve spent his first two years in college at St. Edward's University (as **Brother Daniel Lynch's** hard-working lab assistant). Since he wanted to major in microbiology, he completed his B.S. at the University of Texas. After earning his PhD, he was hired at the University of Texas Health Science Center in San Antonio, where he joined his good friend, Charlie Gauntt, and taught medical students and conduct research.

One of Steve's fascinating studies was on the Shroud of Turin. He demonstrated that common resident bacteria on our skin could be responsible for forming the image on the Shroud. He cultured the microbe (*Staph epidermis*) and applied a thick coating on his hand, put his hand on a linen cloth for 20 minutes and then heated the linen in an oven. In examining the cloth, a yellow-brown image of his hand could be seen, like a photo negative. Steve's detailed studies have been reported at international science meetings and in the literature. His work provides a natural explanation of how the image on the Shroud could be formed. The copious flow of blood and fluids after Christ's scourging would provide nutrients for bacteria to rapidly grow and imprint the cloth when Christ was buried in the tomb.

The Mattinglys have a beautiful home on Lake LBJ near Marble Falls. Donard and I went to Marble Falls to meet Steve and Charlie and spend two days fishing. Saturday we caught only one fish. So Sunday, Steve invited his son, Bob to come since he is a competitive bass fisherman who can "smell" where fish are. Bob picked out a spot where we spent the next 2-3 hours pulling in about 60 white bass, about 12-18" long, the biggest weighed almost two pounds. Donard took 2nd place in catching the most fish. He was thrilled with the experience.

The photos show us heading out in Steve's boat and sitting at a picnic table with a display of 41 of the biggest white bass. They were filleted, fried and delicious.

Steve Mattingly has arranged to bring Donard back for more fishing safaris in the future and not wait till next December for another birthday fishing treat.

It is anticipated Carroll will remain in the hospital for 2-3 days post-op, and will then be transferred to an area rehabilitation center for continued recovery and transitioning to an Assisted Living residence.



Fr. Eugene Hemrick Visits HC in Peru

Two months ago **Brother John Benesh** received an e-mail from **Fr. Gene Hemrick** in which Gene said that he was thinking of visiting Lima, Peru.

At first John was not sure that Gene was serious about the trip but after more exchanges of messages, a date was set for his arrival for a ten-day visit.

John picked him up at the Lima airport on Friday, January 21 and drove him to the Canto Del Sol residence of the Congregation, located in the eastern fringes of the city. His days in Peru passed quickly and the visit was extended by two days when the snow and ice in the US caused the cancellation of his January 31 departure.

Gene was able to meet all of the CSC men who live and work in the area and was able to visit some of the nineteen chapels in the parish. He also saw the Policlínico Hermano Andres and the site of Yancana Huasi, a day program for children who are physically and mentally challenged. He visited the Fe y Alegria 25 school where John had worked for nine years. He went to the office of the Rosary Apostolate in the center of Lima and then toured the main plaza and a few of the many churches nearby.

Another highlight was a visit to the CSC novitiate in Huaycan. Br. John had spent eight years there and was happy to show off some of his projects, including the stained glass windows in the chapel. John was his tour guide and driver during these days.
