Reflection for Liturgy for Pentecost Composed by Brother Robert Mosher, C.S.C. Delivered by Father William Blum, C.S.C.

Today in celebrating the feast of Pentecost we the Church commemorate the descent of the Holy Spirit upon Jesus' 12 Apostles.

It was at the Last Supper that Jesus told the Apostles that He and His father would send them the Spirit who would reveal to them all truth and be their advocate.

As described by Luke in *Acts* 2, the events of Pentecost are preceded by divinely orchestrated theophanies of loud wind and tongues of fire, in the midst of which the 12 Apostles undergo a complete trans-formation: Peter who had denied Jesus in the presence of a servant girl, now prolaims Him before a crowd of 3,000. When the other 11 speak, they are understood in the foreigner's own language. In the days that followed, all 12 no longer hid from the authorities, but boldly preached the name and teaching of Jesus, no longer intimidated by threats or actual imprisonment. Eventually, 11 surrendered to martyrdom.

Pentecost harkens back to Old Testament events; Moses at Sinai: amidst theophany of wind, thunder, fire, Moses with the 12 tribes present, ascends the mountain to God to receive God's Covenant for his new people.

The Apostles' speaking in tongues reminds us of the opposite of the confusion of languages at the Tower of Babel.

As a member of the Holy Trinity, the Holy Spirit is the personified procession of the love between the Father and the Son. The Holy Spirit transforms us through love.

Like the Apostles, we have experienced Pentecost at our baptism, confirmation, and, as religious, our profession of vows. With our cooperation, the Holy Spirit has been the means of any success we have so far become and/or achieved.

According to Holy Scripture (Philip, Peter, and John) there are five signs of the Holy Spirit present and at work: (1) ability to provide nearly miraculously righteous good example; (2) constant joy; (3) explainable hope; (4) consistent love; the willing of good to another; 5) insatiable determination to learn everything by every means possible about Jesus.





Sharing Earth




