

What do their friends say when the boy's in trouble? What do they say?


"He IS the wrong crowd," that's what the friends say: "He IS the wrong crowd."




## Bible Bites by Brother Robert Mosher, C.S.C.

#### Paul and the Silversmith Riot

Demetrius, a silversmith and employer of related craftsmen in Ephesus organized, according to Acts 19:23-43, an emergency meeting of employees to protest against St. Paul for being responsible for risking their livelihood – the crafting of miniature silver shrines of the patron **goddess Artmis of Ephesus.** 

In his preaching, Paul had persuaded a great many people that gods made by human hands were not gods. Arguing that related crafts would be affected, Demetrius took his complaint to the street, arousing a fury. Some of Paul's companions were seized. Paul himself was cautioned not to go outside.





To forestall a riot becoming a catastrophe, a temple magistrate intervened. The clerk maintained that the temple had not been robbed by Paul's claim. He reminded the Silversmiths that the courts were available for resolution of any legitimate charges. His comments reestablished order.

## Holy Cross Roads Writings for the Journey

#### **Our Truth**

Given the state of affairs, many are all too happy to criticize us, leaving us feeling unworthy or even rejected. Being human, we will never reach the kind of perfection which we think Jesus is talking about when he says, "Be perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect." Who could come up to that standard? Sure, we could wear a "mask", always "keeping up appearances" of always doing the right thing or blaming others to take the focus off ourselves.

Is there another way of looking at this? In the context of this Scripture passage the "being perfect" could mean "be compassionate as your heavenly Father is compassionate." Remember Jesus has just said before these words that his Father allows the rain to fall on the just and the unjust alike. The truth is we are finite creatures and God loves us in spite of our humanness and maybe because of it. We are God's beloved not because we live "perfect lives" but because we share in the special relationship that the Father has with his son. Perfectionism can be an ego trip that takes us far from that relationship. What God wants us to be is our true selves. Being authentic, we will show others the path to finding their own truth.
