

Scott is both a tenor and liturgical guitarist.


The Kirners were guests of Brother Carl, who is a member of St. Mary's Sunday Choir at Saint Mary's.



In the corner of fourth and Walnut in the downtown area of the city of Louisville, KY, Thomas Merton experienced an "earthquake" that changed his life forever. As he would later say on the last day of his life to a group of Buddhists — We are all one, we only have not recognized it yet."
