Brazil Opened to Brothers

Brother Ephrem O'Dwyer, c.s.c., Provincial, has announced that later this year, four Brothers of Holy Cross will be sent as missionaries to Santarem, in the state of Para, Brazil, South America. There they will take charge of a high school, Ginasio Dom Amando, which was opened in 1943 by Bishop Pietriella, O. F. M.

Santarem is a city of some thirty thousand people about three hundred miles up the Amazon River from Belem. It was built at the point where the Tapajos River, coming from the south, becomes a part of the Amazon.

The school, located about a fifteen minute walk from the center of town and on the highest point in the environs, overlooks the Tapajos. There are approximately one hundred boys enrolled, some thirty of them boarders, the remainder coming from Santarem families. The campus is extensive and provides plenty of recreational space.


"Dom Amando" will be owned and operated by the Brothers; however, the legal title will remain in the diocese for a few years. The high school is fully accredited by the state.

Franciscan priests from Europe labor in the immediate vicinity. American Franciscans, with missions along the Tapajos, have promised to welcome the new Brother-missionaries, their fellow Americans, and to serve them in any priestly capacity they can. Bishop Floriano Loewanau, O. F. M., only recently appointed to the see of Santarem, has shown himself exceptionally kind and enthusiastic.

Announcement of the names of the Brothers who will found the mission in Brazil will be made later.


Two Santarems

The meeting of minds between Bishop Loewanau and the Provincial Superior which brings about the new mission of the Brothers of Holy Cross in Santarem, Brazil, calls to mind another Santarem in another far-off country. It is the one in Portugal which has gained fame because it is not far from the Cova da Iria where Our Lady appeared to the three children. It is highly probable that the Santarem in Portugal gave its name to the one in South America.

At any rate, new missions to different lands are not made without considerable sacrifice and prayer, and that is precisely what Our Lady asked for at the Cova. She asked it of all of us through three innocent children. Francisco, holy beyond his years but always a typical boy, wanted to peg a rock at the apparition to test its genuineness. Jacinta, an intense bundle of sanctity and otherworldliness, fulfilled her painful mission like the genuine little heroine she was. Lucia, unlettered but comprehending in great part what the Mother of God told her, still lives and still tells those who will listen. Through the instrumentality of children, then, the necessity for penance and prayer, in this case the rosary, was made plain to the world. Each day that passes makes the message more vital.

The new Santarem can serve as a reminder of the message of Fatima. It will be the work of the Brothers to build the mission on the firm basis of penance and prayer. In this way they can vivify and intensify an already thoroughly Christian tradition. That is what Fatima did to the other Santarem in Portugal.

Registration for the second period is scheduled for July 22 and 23, with classes starting the following day. Besides courses in arts and sciences, commerce and engineering, special care has been taken to make it possible for teachers to study the subjects required for certification in many states.

Gilmour to Operate Camp

Gilmour Academy, Gates Mills, Ohio, announced plans for the opening on June 25 of a day camp for boys eight to fourteen years, inclusive, in the Cleveland area.

The camp will be held five days a week on the Gilmour campus and contemplates the use of the schools splendid facilities for athletics and crafts. The camper will arrive at nine-thirty

in the morning and will be kept busy until three-thirty, when he will return home for the remainder of the day. This plan offers an extraordinary opportunity to the young who otherwise might while away endless vacation time doing little or nothing constructive for his mind or body.

The camp is sponsored by the Gilmour Academy Men's Club and the Brothers of Holy Cross will provide the staff of teachers. All kinds of games will be played and all sorts of crafts undertaken. There will be nature study in the campus woods. Information may be obtained from the Academy.

Phillips Ceremony At Boysville

In quiet, unpretentious ceremonies in the dining hall at Boysville, Clinton, Michigan, young Tom Phillips received the Silver Star on behalf of the bravery of his brother Charles who died a hero's death on a windswept slope in Korea. Brother Hilarion Brezik, C. S. C., principal at Boysville, intended that the ceremony be just for the students there, but anyone with a relative or member of the family in the armed forces could not help but be interested.

Colonel Charles Weigand of the Reserve Officers at the University of Michigan, made the presentation and described the action which merited the medal. State Deputy Vincent O'Meara of the Knights of Columbus spoke to the group.



Holy Cross Host To Visitors

During the past month, the Visiting Committee of the Southern Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges examined the educational philosophy, standards and objectives of the faculty at Holy Cross High School, New Orleans. At the conclusion of the visitation a faculty meeting was called and the Committee reported its findings. Holy Cross, a member of the association since 1925, was given a superior rating.

The Visiting Committee has a rotating membership, composed mostly of educators from the Louisiana State Department of Education and various colleges and high schools. Father Michael Kenelley, S. J., of Shreveport, was chairman for the Holy Cross visit.

All types of games and crafts are planned for the boys. Competent teachers will be available for tutoring.

MISSIONARY TO INDIA


Unlike most religious whose lives are spent in one country, perhaps even in one monastery, Brother Jude Costello's pursuit of souls for Christ has taken him across thousands of miles of water, through foreign lands and into the strangeness that is East Pakistan. At present on furlough in the United States, Brother went to the Orient in 1939.

Having been born in Fort Wayne, Indiana, in 1902, Brother Jude entered the Brothers of Holy Cross at Notre Dame in 1926, following his brother, Erother Simeon, by only a matter of five months. The two made their final profession together in 1931.

After his courses at the University of Notre Dame, Brother taught at Cathedral High School, Indianapolis, and was assistant superior at Sacred Heart Juniorate, Watertown, Wisconsin. Finally, he was made superior of St. Joseph's Juniorate, Valatie, New York. It was from there that he left for India.

Once in East Pakistan, Brother Jude worked tirelessly as a teacher and after serving as headmaster of St. Gregory's High School, Dacca, he was made religious superior of the Brothers there in 1946. He is still serving in that capacity.

In 1950, as a member of the General Chapter of the Congregation of Holy Cross, he traveled to Rome for the sessions; afterwards he returned to the United States for a rest. He will return to India in May.

Brother Jude was made a member of the East Bengal Secondary Education Board in 1947 and is on five other educational committees. In 1949, the Governor of East Pakistan appointed him to membership on a special board to revise the secondary curriculum. This was a signal honor since he actually represented all Christians, a minority body in that part of the world.

Brother has seen the tragedy attendant to the famine in 1942-43 when the grain supplies were extremely low and he has seen the ruthlessness of religious and political warfare on at least five occasions. However, he loves East Pakistan and its people and is anxious to return. He has the real missionary spirit.

Profession at St. Joseph's

Three novices, Brothers Robert Joseph Coonrod, James John Clunan, and Griffith William Edwards, will pronounce their temporary vows in religion at St. Joseph's Novitiate, Rolling Prairie, Indiana, on the feast of St. Joseph, April 3. The new religious will reside at Dujarie Hall, Notre Dame, Indiana, and will start classes at the university in June.

Brother Robert Joseph comes from New Haven, Indiana, Brother James John from Scranton, Pennsylvania, and Brother Griffith William from Albany, New York.

Glory Comes to Gilmour

The Lancer Forensic team of Gilmour Academy, Gates Hill, Ohio, entered the "B" preliminaries of the statewide speech contests held at Cathedral Latin High, Cleveland, recently and came away with a clean sweep of first places in all nine events. The Gilmour student publication "The Hall Crier" said modestly that "They (the Forensic Team) performed the spectacular." With this coup under their belts, they will enter the finals at Columbus.

Gilmour Academy is placed in the "B" section, which means they compete with high schools of less than 450 students. Until his recent appointment as Registrar at the academy, Brother Ivo Regan was the coach. Brother Francis Englert has since taken over the work.

In another event, The National Scholastic Writing Contest sponsored by the "Cleveland News," Gilmour students won seventeen awards. Six of these were gold keys which automatically qualifies the papers for the national competition. Certificates of merit were awarded to eleven other student compositions. Only one other high school in the Cleveland area won more prizes. Ten different kinds of writing, essay, short story, literary article, etc., won for Gilmour.
