The Brothers of Holy Cross who teach at St. Anthony High School, Long Beach, California, recently moved into their new, metropolitan-style home, and many thanks are due thoughtful Monsignor Dolan for a modern and convenient home, but one which is at the same time religiously appropriate.

The Brothers are perhaps most happy with their chapel and its Philippine Mahogany altar with a carved wood reredos. The unique altar crucifix which rests against cloth of gold was bought at Lourdes last summer and personally carried back home by Monsignor to insure its safe arrival. The pews are of the same material as the altar. There are attractive statues of the Blessed Virgin and the Sacred Heart.

The house, which provides rooms for nineteen Brothers, is two floors in the front wing and three in the rear wing. It is white stucco with a tile roof.

Thanks are also due the St. Anthony Mothers' Club which presented electrical appliances, china and considerable kitchen ware to the culinary department. The modern equipment will mean that food can be stored and prepared with little or no loss or waste.

Helping to Lift the Clouds

The new year is nearly always considered the hallmark of confidence and hope, but this one, many will agree, comes grinding toward us already tinted with blood and groaning under the attendant tragedies and sadness of "man's inhumanity to man." For it is a fact, plain and simple, that once again, a handful of selfish men has been able to pit countless millions of God's children against countless others by brewing synthetic hates and demanding impossible loot in the name of intransigent political ideologies.

One sees in the press pathetic little pictures of crying Korean children, in rags and tatters, orphaned by the war. There are photos of widows prostrate in grief over the loss of some member of their families. Again, who has not caught the vacant stare of utter wonderment of the old man whose sense of loss is so overwhelming that he surveys in total unbelief the scattered stones and twisted remnants of his home and possessions. Or think for a moment of the grimness of shallow trenches lined with the bodies of victims of war atrocities lying in the almost impossible attitudes of sudden death. Multiply these examples by thousands and one has a whole new world of human expendables. They suffer greatly and deeply while the diplomats talk, eat, and rattle swords.

And this does not include the military. What of the young man from down the street who went, smiling but apprehensive, to the induction center? Or the great numbers of our relatives or neighbors who went away to experience death or suffering in some strange land.

Although the lesson which the times teach is obvious, it can stand repeating. It is the old story of prayer and penance, and a deep feeling of personal re-

Centenary Celebration 1851 — 1951

One hundred years ago the United States Government, in response to several appeals from the authorities at Notre Dame, agreed to open a post office on the campus. Colonel Thomas Fitzgerald of Niles, who was then a Senator, prevailed upon Henry Clay to establish postal service there despite the fact that South Bend was so near. In doing so Clay decided that the corporate name of Notre Dame du Lac was too long and shortened it to Notre Dame, Indiana. It has remained so ever since,

Up to 1914, priests of the Congregation of Holy Cross were postmasters and a list of their names reads like a Notre Dame "Who's Who": Sorin, Maher, Corby, Morrissey and Zahm. Brother Emilius Ill held the post until it was taken over by Brother Theogene Merline in 1921. Brother Marcellinus Fahey became postmaster in 1945.

There are eight Brothers employed at the Notre Dame Post Office. A ninth employee, the assistant postmaster, is a layman, Mr. Albers. Brother Eli Pelchat is a Senior Clerk and secretary to the Civil Service Commission. There are four regular clerks, Brothers Ives Kilroy, Ramon Purzycki, Donan Johnroe and Armin Demute. Brothers Flavius Ellison and Richard Amedio are substitute clerks. There are special delivery carriers who are students at the University of Notre Dame.

Through the years the Notre Dame Post Office has grown to a First Class rating and in 1934 became the occupant of a new and attractive building. Congratulations to the staff!

Holy Cross In East Pakistan

The history of the Congregation of Holy Cross in India began as far back as 1852 when Father Basil Moreau at Le Mans, France, bade good-bye to a small group of his religious, priests, Brothers and Sisters, which was to open, with Rome's approval, a mission in Bengal, now East Pakistan. With the exception of some twelve years, 1876-1888, the history has been continuous and the mission has grown. Indeed, when in 1952 the centenary anniversary is celebrated, it will be a hundred years marked by heroic work.

Today the Brothers of Holy Cross of the United States Province have twentyone Brothers in the Dacca District of East Pakistan working under the direction of Brother Jude Costello, C.S.C., their religious superior. Brothers Eugene and Fabian have the longest mission records of any of the Brothers.

Oldest in point of service on the mission is Brother Eugene Le Feuvre who was born at Dacca in 1873. He entered the Congregation of Holy Cross not many years after the mission was reopened, and was professed in the Cathedral of Dacca on June 3, 1900. Thus, in 1950, he celebrated the fiftieth year of his religious profession. He has spent most of his religious life teaching. Brother Eugene has the distinction of being the first and only Holy Cross

Brother to celebrate his golden anniversary in East Pakistan. He has the best wishes of all the Brothers in the United States.

Brother Fabian was Francis Leimeister before he came to Religion in 1910. He was born in 1887 on a farm at Oxford, Ohio. After his novitiate, Brother met Bishop Linneborn, the then recently consecrated Bishop of Dacca, and became intensely interested in the missions. However, it was not until 1924 that Brother Fabian set foot in India as a missionary. He had spent the intervening years teaching in the Brothers' High Schools in the United States.

In 1932, Brother was elected by his mission associates to represent them at the General Chapter of the Congregation to be held in the United States. That trip eventually meant that he would be in his homeland for five years. 1937 found him safely back among his beloved Indians.

The East Pakistan mission has profited from Brother Fabian's brain and brawn. He is always an eager worker and enjoys calling himself a "General Supernumerary" which is somewhat hard to explain but probably means "show me the work no one else wants to do and I'll do it."

Brother Fabian's brother, Brother Lewis Bertrand, followed him into the Brothers of Holy Cross and now directs the Dujarie Farm at Notre Dame.


Missionaries By Proxy

Brother Donatus Schmitz, C.S.C., Principal of Notre Dame High School, West Haven, Connecticut, attended a meeting of the Connecticut Association of Independent Schools at St. Thomas Seminary in Bloomfield on November 17. All independent schools, elementary and secondary, approved by the Connecticut State Department of Education for the academic year 1950-'51 are eligible for charter membership. Rev. John M. Ryan, C.S.C. 1882 — 1950

Rev. John Michael Ryan, C.S.C., aged 69, died at St. Joseph's Hospital, South Bend, Indiana, December 6, 1950. He had been ill for some time.

Father Ryan meant a great deal to the Brothers, especially those residing in the Community House, Notre Dame, where he was chaplain. They knew him as a humble, friendly and devoted priest.

Born in Chicago in 1882, he came to the Congregation of Holy Cross in 1903 and was ordained in 1909. He received a doctor of philosophy degree from the Catholic University, Washington, D. C., and taught for many years at Notre Dame; finally, he served as head of the history department as well as rector of a number of the residence halls. He is the author of a history series.

Father Ryan's thorough manliness made many friends among students and faculty alike. A group of his students joined him daily in his hobby of long, brisk hikes through the woods and along the country roads north of the University of Notre Dame. He became haplain to the Brothers at the Community House two years ago. Someone said of Father Ryan that he was never so happy as when he was able to do something for you. It seems an appropriate epitaph.
