

Nineteen Receive Habit

Nineteen young men from fourteen states received the habit of the Brothers of Holy Cross on January 25, 1955. The Reception Ceremony was conducted at the Brothers of Holy Cross Novitiate, Rolling Prairie, Indiana. Reverend Ronan Dowd, C.P., presided at the Ceremony which was followed by High Mass and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

The reception of the habit marks the beginning of one full year of Novitiate training. This intensive year of religious formation is terminated with the pronouncement of religious vows for one year. It is then that the young religious begins his life's work in one of the varied apostolates of the Brothers of Holy Cross.

St. Edward's Offers Scholarships

Seniors at Brothers' schools who plan to continue their education under the Brothers of Holy Cross enroll at St. Edward's University, Austin, Texas. To assist them St. Edward's offers thirty Honor Scholarships valued at \$1000, an Alumni Memorial Scholarship valued at \$2000, and the President's Scholarship, value \$4000. The awards are based on academic record, leadership qualities, scholastic aptitude test score, and recommendation of the Principal.

St. Edward's University is a boarding and day college founded in 1885. A family atmosphere prevails at the school, where the student receives much individual attention and studies a well-balanced curriculum. According to its purpose as a university, St. Edward's combines a sound foundation of liberal education with excellent preparation for specialization work. Programs of study at the University lead to bachelor degrees in Accounting, Biology, Business

Administration, Chemistry, Economics, Education, English, General Science, Industrial Management, Journalism, Mathematics, Physical Education, Physics, and Social Studies. Offered as well are programs for pre-law, pre-engineering, pre-medical, and pre-dental courses.

Brother Casimir Stelzel

Brother Casimir Stelzel, another of this year's silver jubilarians, has been closely involved throughout his quarter century in the Congregation in the apostolate of the press. He spent sixteen years at the Ave Maria Press, Notre Dame, overseeing production and business operations and had more than a hand in such projects as the organization of office and shop procedures therein. For more than a decade now Brother Casimir has been at the Foreign



Mission Seminary, Washington, D.C., where he is concerned, along with others, with printing, mailing, and periodically publicizing the Bengalese, the mission magazine published by the Congregation of Holy Cross. Mean-

while he helped organize the more than twenty units of the "Block Rosary" among colored people in Washington, and he attends these prayerful sessions.

Before entering the Community he spent some time prospecting for gold in Alaska, and because he remained there during the winter months when no transportation whatsoever could be had out of the Territory, he earned the proud title of "Sourdough"—a designation for Alaskan prospectors who choose to be snowbound for at least a season.

A few months ago Brother Casimir gave the last souvenir of his Alaskan days, a gold nugget, to the collection of jewels and precious metals being made to crown the Salus Populi Romani, the famous and ancient image of the Blessed Virgin in Rome.

A native of the Capitol City, Brother Casimir gladly shows visiting Community members about, plying them with descriptive lore and details they might otherwise never happen upon. His years in Washington, however, have in regard to politics left him quite untouched.

Auxiliary Organized in Chicago

There were thirty-nine in attendance, comprising parents, relatives, and friends of the Brothers of Holy Cross. Brother Dominic spoke briefly of the purpose of the Auxiliary, stressing closer union between Brothers' families, relatives, and friends, and the Community of Holy Cross. From this bond, Brother indicated, there should flow abundant spiritual and social benefits to the members of the Auxiliary, as well as spiritual and material benefits to the Brothers.

The officers appointed for the first year are: President, Mr. Alphonsus Shea, father of Brother Richard Shea; Vice-President, Miss Mary Ryan, sister of Brother Kieran Ryan; Secretary, Mrs. Leo Martin, mother of Brother Donald Martin; Treasurer, Mr. Arthur Enk, father of Brother Paul Enk. Along with the officers, the following were appointed members of the Executive Board: Mr. Edward Lee, father of Brother Edward Lee; Mrs. Fred Burkhard, mother of Brother Donald Burkhard; Mr. Walter Olszowka, brother of Brother Edward Olszowka; and Mrs. Martha Davis, mother of Brother Stephen Davis.

It was decided that there would be five meetings of the Auxiliary during the year, on the third Sunday of January, March, May, September, and November. The next meeting will be held therefore on March 20, beginning at 3:00 P.M., in the Library of Holy Trinity High.

At present, there are forty-one Brothers of Holy Cross from the Chicago area. Hence, it is presumed that the Auxiliary will grow, and, in the course

of time, accomplish much good in conjunction with the Brothers.

Following the meeting on January 30, Brother Joseph Walter, Principal of Holy Trinity High, invited the members to the Faculty Residence for a buffet lunch.


Junior Military School at Watertown, Wisconsin

Sacred Heart College, Watertown, Wisconsin, is having most of its facilities converted to a Junior Military Academy to accommodate boarding students in grades five, six, seven and eight. The Academy will open in September. Registration is now open for students.

The academic program will be the same as that followed by the Diocese of Madison. The Military program will consist of physical education and U. S. Infantry drill. Literature dealing with the program and requirements for admission can be obtained from the Headmaster, Sacred Heart Military Academy, Watertown, Wisconsin.

Academy students will be accommodated on the first and second floors, the dormitories being on the first floor and the classrooms on the second. They will have the use of two large recreation rooms in the basement, the large dining hall, the chapel and the gymnasium. The bowling alleys area is being remodeled to provide space for dressing rooms and showers.

The third floor of the main building



and the large guest house will be reserved for the accommodation of the faculty and students of the Congregation of Holy Cross, thus constituting a separate school independent of the Military Academy.

The greater part of the large campus facilities will be used by the Military Academy students. The farm will continue to be operated for the benefit of the whole institution.

Austin, Texas

Brother Joseph Heisler, a student at St. Edward's University, won an inscribed copy of *Handbook of Chemistry and Physics*, a 3,000-page tome given by the University's Sciences Division in cooperation with the Chemical Rubber Company, the publishers, for outstanding work during the first semester in introductory physics.

The first of a series of seminars on topics of general scientific interest was held at St. Edward's University. Led by Brother Romard Barthel and sponsored by the Division of Physical and Natural Sciences, the seminar featured two prominent men on campus.

Father Walter Rhein lectured on the nucleus in neutron scattering, a topic of particular interest to physicists, and Brother Raymond Fleck, speaking of developments in organic chemistry, told of recent studies of Benzilic acid rearrangement and of cyclohexanone.

Student Brothers at Vincent Hall are erecting two concrete block buildings, one a maintenance shop, the other a shower room. Brother Ronald Hein, when, like his helpers, not busy with classwork, acts as foreman.

How can we, parents and teachers alike, vitalize our teaching of religion for youngsters? The Religion Workshop held recently at St. Edward's University provided some answers:

Dramatize the material by use of concrete examples, suggested Brother Silvan Mellett.

Brother Raymond Fleck pointed out how the Mass, as the integrating factor in the student's life, could tie up the units in the Religion course and influence secular subjects and extra-curriculars.

Discussing will and morality, Brother Elmo Bransby showed how religion should provide personal motivations for each child and that strong, meaningful motives, not mere exercise, trains the will.

Lastly, Brother Germain Faddoul, relating emotions and motives, pointed out that the type of motivation must be adapted to the individual, since what affects one person does not necessarily affect another.
