
Golden Jubilarians

By dint of unnting self-discipline and persevere he acquired a mental training to ome a superior student of life, a very rough and effective teacher, writer speaker, a much-sought counselor, a searching mind which has not ered any loss of its acuity even at advanced age.

rother Maximus was born in Poland came to this country at the age of

fourteen. Shortly after his arrival he applied for admission to the Brotherhood of the Congregation of Holy Cross, Notre Dame, Indiana, receiving the habit August 15, 1897. The first three years after his Novitiate he studied at Notre Dame, after which time he was appointed to teach at St. Hedwige's grade school, South Bend, Indiana. The following two years he assisted in the University Book Store, and then from 1905 to 1906 he taught at Sacred Heart College, Watertown, Wisconsin, where he was finally professed, March 19, 1906. In 1907 he was assigned to teach at the Holy Trinity parish grade school, Chicago. With the opening of Holy Trinity High in 1910, he was transferred to teach on the secondary level, at which station he remained uninterruptedly to this day. Twice he was Principal of Holy Trinity High and Superior of the Brothers, from 1917 to 1921, and from 1928 to 1934.

The many former students, and all the priests and Brothers associated with him in teaching during these many years, will be happy to hear of this unique blessing bestowed by God upon Brother Maximus of reaching this happy anniversary of his Golden Jubilee of his final Religious Profession. Brother Victor Czerwinski


Another Golden Jubilee among the Brothers at Holy Trinity is that of Brother Victor, who is celebrating the 50th anniversary of receiving the habit, March 19, 1956.

Unswerving fidelity to duty and an unusual degree of self-effacement are the admirable virtues around which the entire life of this excellent Religious is built. The great endowment which Brother Victor brought to the Religious Life as a Brother were a strong Spirit of Faith and a deep sense of God. These two gifts which he assiduously cultivated produced in him that perseverance which carried him through all the difficulties of his teaching life and through all the trials necessary in the formation of a good Religious.

While engaged in teaching first in the grade school and later in the high school department of Holy Trinity, he was obliged to acquire all the high school and college credits necessary for graduation. He even did more, for thanks to his uncommon assiduity he fulfilled all the requirements for and was graduated with the degree of Master of Science. Therefore, despite the long hours of elemen-

tary school teaching of classes with as many as sixty to seventy boys, and a school day that began at 7:30 A.M. and ended only at 3:30 P.M., Brother Victor attended late afternoon and evening classes year after year. Then every summer he spent in the college classroom and in the laboratory in strenuous and exhausting work until he finally reached his goal. To us who today rarely leave the scholasticate without our degrees and educational requirements, such perseverance is indeed inspiring.

The esteem for Brother Victor's chief qualities dates even from the time of his Novitiate, for shortly after this period of religious formation the Provincial assigned him to the position of Assistant Master of Novices, and this office he held for several years.



This spirit of devotion to duty and perseverance Brother Victor manifests in his daily work in the classroom and in his work as treasurer of the school. In all these services of obedience he has proved himself unfailingly responsible and devoted.

Such fidelity brings the reward of peace and deep supernatural contentment in the autumn of the life of a Religious. This peace and contentment Brother Victor enjoys manifestly in a marked degree. And his sense of God to which such indomitable fidelity must be attributed makes his life one of confident awaiting the sight of this Ineffable Reality of his Faith.

Columba Hall Enriched

Columba Hall was enriched during the past month by a five-foot statue of the Sacred Heart delicately decorated. The statue, mounted on a forty inch pedestal, stands in the main corridor and faces the front entrance. Both the statue and



the pedestal are from the Daprato Studios.

Columba Hall is not only a residence for about seventy Brothers who have assignments at Notre Dame, but also the headquarters of the Brother Columba Apostolate established to spread devotion to the Sacred Heart.

During most of his life as a religious, Brother Columba O'Neill (b. 1848—d. 1923) lived in this building. By distributing badges of the Sacred Heart he fostered his favorite devotion and obtained many favors for his clients. The statue of the Sacred Heart will help to perpetuate the memory of Brother Columba and to encourage devotion to the Sacred Heart.

Farm Wins Award

February 18, 1956, St. Joseph Farm, Notre Dame, Indiana, owned and operated by the Brothers of Holy Cross, became the 296th farm in the United States to receive a Progressive Breeder's Registry Award from the Holstein-Friesian Association of America. This association dates back to 1885 and has its headquarters in Brattleboro, Vermont.

In obtaining the award, St. Joseph Farm's 85 milk cows qualified with 13,548 pounds of milk and 533 pounds of butterfat per cow. To qualify for this rare award the required average per cow is 11,600 pounds of milk and 440 pounds of butterfat. The Brothers' cows produced a sixth more milk and a fifth more butterfat than the amount required.

Dacca, East Pakistan

January 4 proved to be a red-letter day in the long history of St. Gregory High, for on that day the Honorable Mr. A. K. Fazlul Huq, Minister of the Interior and Education in the Central Government of Pakistan, and Dr. M. Ahmed, Director of Public Instruction, paid a visit to the school. Mr. Huq, "the Lion of Bengal," is well over 80, having been a prominent figure in Indian politics for many years, and at one time Prime-Minister of Undivided Bengal when it formed part of British India. Brother Martinian conducted them on a tour of the school, during which they paid short visits to the various classes. Inspection of the school was followed by tea in the office. Upon a petition presented by the students, Mr. Huq granted the remainder of that day and the whole of the following day as holidays in his honor. As the distinguished visitors were leaving, Brother Martinian expressed his pleasure at the honor accorded to the school by their visit and invited them to return whenever they are in the province. A compliment even greater than their visit is the fact that both officials have sons among the 980 students at St. Gregory's.

During the holidays Brother Donald Allen made a trip to Chittagong to collect specimens of flora and fauna for his science room.

Dear Brother Gerard:

First off, I would like to express our sincere thanks to the members of the various clubs who have in the past year sent donations to help keep the Missions running over here. In particular I would like to thank Jerry Becker and the members of his club in South Orange. They sent a very generous donation at Christmas. It came just in the nick of time.

Last July, August, and September we had the worst floods in the history of Bengal. For six weeks we were under water. I was thinking of investing in a snorkel tube. Since there were more fish than students in the classrooms, I dismissed school. Our house, a two storied affair, looked like Noah's ark. We even had to move the chapel from its own building to the second floor, but it was comforting to have the Blessed Sacrament with us during those weeks. To get back to the ark, with the rising of the water all the wild life of Bengal began to converge on us. There were snakes, rats, cats, and ants. The white ants caused the most damage. As the water came up, so did they, hollowing out almost every piece of wood. Not only did they eat away the woodwork in the buildings, they even went after the desks, benches, and blackboards. Several days after we reopened school one of the teachers was writing on the blackboard when there was a crash and he went sprawling into the next room. There was nothing left of the blackboard and partition but a pile of dust.

With 1,200 boys in school and the furniture collapsing, repairs and replacements had to be made. In desperation I have cut down a big tree in the yard and have had it cut up into planks. As soon as these are somewhat dried out and cured, I'll have them made into benches and desks. All this costs money. That is where Jerry Becker and his club came to the rescue. I had nothing when I started to cut the tree but trusted that St. Joseph would prompt someone to come to our rescue. With what Jerry's club has since donated, I'll be able to make all of the benches that are needed. We're also grateful for help that has come from "Mary's Workers, Circle No. 5," Shreveport, La., and from Miss Rose Marie Dolan, Waterloo, Iowa.

Here is a bit of good news. In the government examinations our school ranked one of the highest in the country

when more than four-fifths of our students passed the Matriculation Exam. Only two boys in all of East Bengal received Junior Scholarships for Minority Classes, and one of them was a Catholic boy from our school. He is now attending Notre Dame College in Dacca.

Brothers Lorenzo Powers, Hobart Pieper, James Tallarovic, Daniel Rozario, John Harris, and Joseph Popma send greetings. The last two are devoting most of their time to the study of Bengali.

What's a Tapir?

February 13, Brother Julius Wade-kamper wrote from Brazil:

Dear Brother Gerard,

Brothers Genard Greene, Francis Boyes and I went for a vacation up the Tapajos River into the very heart of the jungle. On the way we stopped at the houses of the American Franciscan Fathers who have all the missions in that direction. Their boat and helpers were at our service traveling the 250 odd miles up the river to Maloquinha. The first day there I went hunting with a native guide. That day we got nothing but four large turtles and a small animal about the size of a large rabbit.

The next day Brother Francis and four large hunting dogs came with us. We started early and walked very fast because we wanted to get miles back into the jungle. The guide practically ran and when he got a few feet ahead of us we couldn't see him. Then Brother Francis in his descriptive English pictured how it would be for the two of us to be lost there. I never realized that the jungle could be so deep, dark, damp, and quiet. After walking for more than four hours we had given up hope of wild game when suddenly the guide stopped short and listened carefully. Brother Francis and I didn't hear anything but by the way the guide took off we knew that he did. We had no choice but to run after him, and did he go through that tanglement of brush, vines, and trees. When we were completely exhausted, he stopped and listened again. This time we could faintly hear the barking of the dogs. Off he went again and we after him. We went through swamp with water over our knees and the splashing got us soaking wet. We were dead tired but the barking of the dogs and the growing excitement spurred us on. Soon the barking of the dogs seemed very near and we changed directions to go around them and approach from the other side. Next we saw a little pond of muddy water

with the dogs on the edges barking furiously. They had driven a tapi South America's biggest game anima into the middle of the pond. In a flat our guide was up on a mound of di and aiming his old single shot shotgun the head of the tapir. He aimed, pull the trigger, and nothing happened. I had a faulty shell. I jumped to the mound, aimed at the head of the tap and the next instant he dropped de into the water. The dogs immediate swam to the prey and started nipping at his flanks. The guide looked som what discouraged, but I was thrill with having killed this big game bear In a moment the guide had slipped of his sandals and was in the water wi the dogs dragging the tapir to short We skinned it and cut off the choi pieces of meat. With the ingenui found only in these native Brazilia the guide made harnesses and stra out of leaves and vines so that all of could help carry the meat back to t village.

If you like I may tell you later about a day spent fishing and our rurn trip to Santarem.

Brother Paul Schaefer, our superichas returned safe and sound from the States but all his freight is held up the warehouse in Belem. Pray that may be released and delivered to us fine has many things in the shipment the wenced for the school year.

So long for now. Keep us in yo prayers and God love you.
