## BROTHER EPHREM HONORED

Saturday evening, September 22, Brother Donatus Schmitz, the recently appointed Provincial of the Brothers of Holy Cross, gave a testimonial dinner in the cafeteria of St. Joseph High School, South Bend, in honor of his predecessor, Brother Ephrem O'Dwyer.

Brother Gonzaga Day planned and directed the affair. Brother John Chrysostom Ryan and the silent Brothers from Dujarie prepared and served the meal, and they and all the trimmings. One of the Brothers from the initiate and Columba Hall assisted with the details.

Brother John Baptist Titzer, Provincial elect of the South-West Province, was the toastmaster. The speakers in order were Brother Donatus; Rev. Theodore

Mehling, C.S.C., Provincial of the Indiana Province of the Priests' Society; Brother General, the Very Reverend Christopher J. O'Toole, C.S.C.; and the Rev. Monsignor John S. Sabo, Dean of the South Bend Deanery. Seated at the table were over 200 guests.

The celebration was a fitting tribute to Brother Ephrem and his achievements as Provincial. It is impossible to estimate accurately the temporal, intellec-

Felix is now returning to the Dacca mission in Bengal.

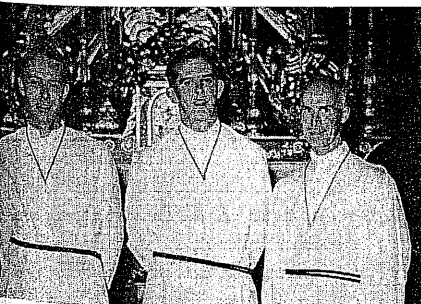
### Brother Donald William Schmitz

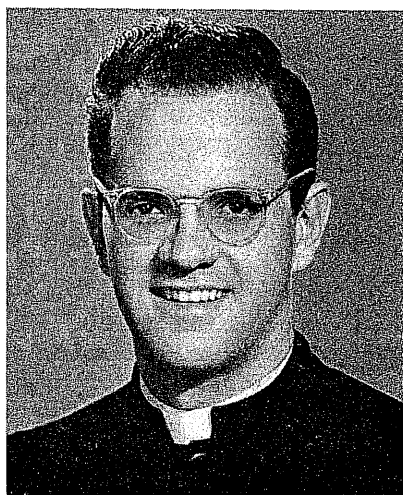
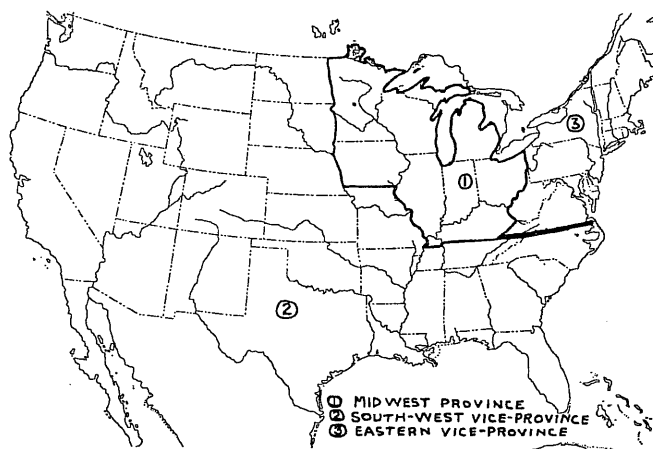
### "Now That You're Back..."

Back for a six months' holiday from the Dacca mission, a lot of conversation starts for me with "Now that you're back, what changes do you notice most?" Well, here goes. Maybe you know I've been home twice before since I first left for Bengal in 1926. Anyway, I've spent a little more than half of my life so far in the Dacca Mission. Things that appear most ordinary to you strike me as new or different—not new or different from what they were seven years ago here in U. S., but very different from what I am used to.

Let's say I want a drink of water. Why there's the faucet and if I let it run a while it will come out cold too. Look at that! No hunting for the filter, just drink. And cold! I still do a "double-take" as they call it while convincing myself that it's O.K., that I am not rashly inviting typhoid or dysentery by drinking water from the faucet. Then too, that other faucet gives hot water, well I ask you! In the mission hot water comes from the kitchen when and if you ever bother to wait for it.

Then these black clothes. It's summer and I sure know why the devil is painted black. Adding insult to injury the black clothes get dirty easier than white and, when they do, you have to stop and clean them rather than get out a nice clean habit just back from the *dhobi*, (washer-man), merely check it for rips and missing buttons and just put it on. Life is simpler back in East Pakistan.

Suppose I want to get from Akron to Cleveland. I start asking, "What tram do I take . . ." "Tram?" "Er—streetcar—" "No streetcars for years. Where do you want to go?" I tell him, "Cleveland, St. Edwards," and am informed that I am to walk so many blocks, take a bus, change to such and such another, ride to such a place, walk back so far, look to my left, take a bearing on the Humpty Dumpty building, go around the corner and there I am at the bus station. Then, at Cleveland I'll have to . . . About here the kind-hearted soul realizes about half of how lost I feel and changes pace with, "When do you want to go?" I tell him next day or so. He says, "Oh, then Brother Uno will be glad to drive you down." My qualms are scoffed at—it's no trouble at all they tell me. And so I go in style and comfort. I don't have to pack bedding, hire a rickshaw, get a place on the *goina* boat, decide about packing a lunch or not, nor do I have to look over the bicycle before hopping on that alternate means of going places.

Neither is this a mere twenty-five miles or so. Here it's just get in the car and go. Different? Well I should say so. As to food and drink, there's always an icebox or whatever they call it loaded with various soft drinks and milk. Oh boy! Milk! real, whole, unboiled milk, cold!! A large variety of sandwich ingredients also fill this same ice box but so far I have refrained from looking too closely lest I bust out of my britches too soon. Comes breakfast, cereals—all varieties show up, eggs such as we know but WITH BACON, and maybe ham or maybe sausages, all this on just any old day too, not Christmas or Easter! Any old

time there's likely to be ice cream in that wonderful ice box. Coffee is yours whenever you want to take the time to get it—not just once a day and wondering then how long our supply will let us have even that.

As you can imagine none of this is hard to take. We missionaries get up to a year of it on our "vacations." These include visits to relatives and helping out by teaching in one of our schools. Two years back home is too much, leaving the second time gets to be unreasonably hard. As I said, I guess I'll be going back after about six months.

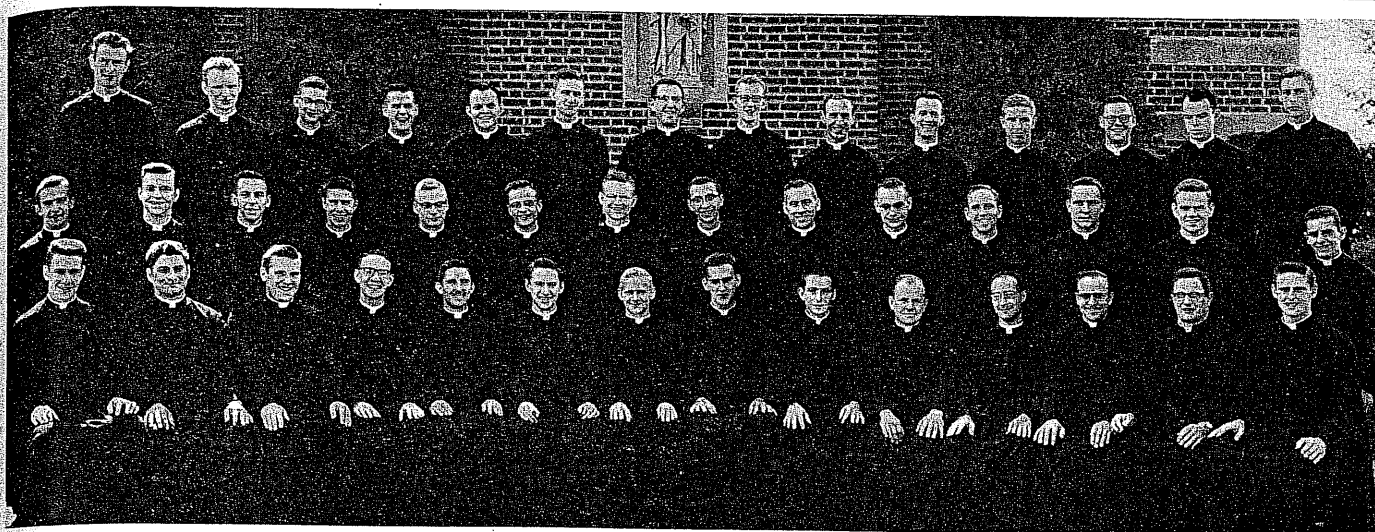

**New Orleans, Louisiana**

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Henry C. Bezou, Archdiocesan Superintendent of Schools, congratulated Holy Cross High on its 1956-57 Student Handbook. He asserted that it is as good as he has ever seen and hoped that it would have many imitators in the New Orleans Archdiocese.

A conducted tour of the campus and buildings was a feature of the September meeting of the Parents' Club. Oldtimers and members of the Executive Committee served as guides and hosts to the new members.

For the second year the Junior Academy of Science is being sponsored by Brother Wendel Adam. Its aims are to stimulate interest and to perfect skills and abilities in science. Last year a Holy Cross member of the Junior Academy of Science won first place in the state with his project, "Classification and Identification of Bacteria." His work was entered in the Botany Section of Biology in the exhibit sponsored by the Louisiana Academy of Science at Loyola University in New Orleans.

At Holy Cross all Freshmen are required

to study Latin. No other language choice is offered. Classes are of one hour duration.

Brother Cornelius Corcoran directed the 173 students attending the six weeks' summer session at Holy Cross High.

The leadership qualities of a Holy Cross senior were recognized when Jephtha Kolb was elected Vice-President of the Southern Region of the Future Business Leaders of America at the convention held in Washington last June. Brother Salvator Esposito, the Faculty Moderator of the Holy Cross unit, also attended the convention.

**Terre Haute, Indiana**

Brother Camillus Kirsch last month received an appointment as Vice-President of the Indiana Children's Home Association.

For the first time in the history of the Father Gibault School for Boys, a new youngster has been

received from outside of the United States. A junior boy arrived by plane from Westminster in British Columbia, Canada.

Gibault is well on the road to recovery from the loss it suffered when the dairy barn burst into flames August 24. The fire was caused by spontaneous combustion in a full hay mow. There were no injuries, and all the livestock in the barn at the time was led to safety. A new hay loft has just been completed on the old foundation, constructed of tile and thus resistant to fire.

To assist Gibault from its loss, a neighbor to the south, the Pfizer Company, largest manufacturers in the world of anti-biotics, donated thirty acres of alfalfa hay in the field to the school.

Gibault's Board of Directors has purchased 150 acres of land adjacent to the school. A fifth of this tract borders Honey Creek and is wooded. The rest of the purchase is tillable land. Now Gibault has a total of 350 acres.

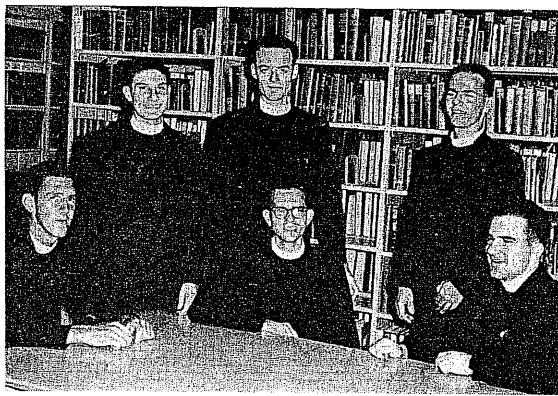
**Brooklyn, New York**

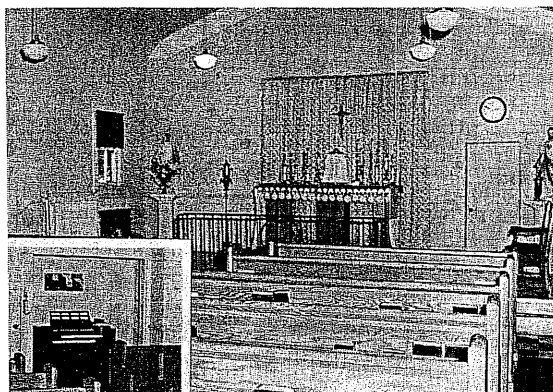
