

Brothers Attend Second Novitiate

On Sunday, June 23, at Archbishop oban High School in Akron, Ohio, the st Second Novitiate in the history of the Brothers of Holy Cross opened with eight-day retreat conducted by Father loysius Kemper, S.J. Brother Lawnce Miller, was director of the novitate.

Two groups of religious had the ivilege of making the Second Novitiate is year: all the Superiors of the rothers' Houses throughout the United lates, plus all the Brothers who were hally professed in 1947. Among the Brothers present were a university esident and 23 high school principals. The Second Novitiate is a time of flection, after some years in the relious life, with a view to reorienting ie's effort in order to make more proess toward religious perfection. It sts six weeks. But the members didn't pray and study quite all the time. There was work. During the novitiate the ordinary work around the house—such as cleaning corridors and washing dishes—was done by the religious themselves. And there was some time for play too. Picnics at St. Edward High School in Lakewood and at Gilmour Academy in Cleveland were highlights of the recreational program.

The novitiate closed with High Mass on August 4, when 45 Brothers returned to their apostolic labors.

President Inaugurated

On Sunday, October 13, the Feast of St. Edward, Brother Raymond Fleck was officially installed as President of St. Edward's University, Austin, Texas, succeeding Brother Elmo Bransby, who assumed the duties of Assistant Vice Provincial of the Eastern Vice Province in June. The inaugural ceremonies began with an academic procession from the Main Building to the College Chapel, led by the fourth degree Knights of Columbus. The celebrant at the solemn High Mass, Rev. Archibald McDowell, C.S.C., preached the sermon. After Mass the procession moved to the college gym-

Brother Raymond then reviewed the development of St. Edward's, made known the plans for the immediate future of the University and asked the support of the faculty, students, alumni and friends in achieving the goals set forth. An honorary degree

of Doctor of Laws was conferred on Dr. John M. Thiel, a member of the faculty of the University of Texas Medical School, who addressed the gathering on the role of the Catholic layman in the teaching of science. Father James O'Brien closed the session with his blessing.


Attending the ceremonies were the presidents of St. Mary's University and


Quid Pro Quo

Seven Brothers Depart For Foreign Missions

October 3, 1957, seven Brothers dressed in the white habits worn by missionaries in the tropics took part in the departure ceremonies held in Sacred Heart Church on the Notre Dame campus.

Those shown standing in the picture have been assigned to the Bengal mission in East Pakistan where they will teach in the secondary schools. With ten Holy Cross Fathers they set sail from New York City, October 10. On the way to the Orient they will have an opportunity of visiting several points of interest in Europe, and of having an audience with the Holy Father in Rome.

November 8, Brothers Rex and Edwardo sail from New York on The African Pilot for Takoraki, Ghana, where they will take charge of St. John's Secondary School. A third missionary, Brother Donald Allen, will leave St. Gregory's High School in Dacca, East Pakistan, for Ghana some time in December.

Ghana is a recently organized independent nation on the Gold Coast of Africa. The Gold Coast takes its name from the color of its soil and not from the precious metal, an unknown quantity in that part of the Dark Continent.


May the sacrifices we make for the missions bring us many worthy vocations.
