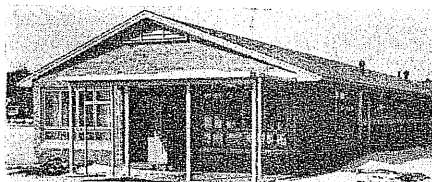
Members of the school band, directed by Brother John Hanon, won first places in state-wide school band competition at Indianapolis recently.

Brother Julius Wadekamper, one of two Midwest province men working at Ginasio Dom Amando, returned there after a brief stint in the States. He wrote to say that he arrived back in Brazil with forty pounds of overweight baggage. Ready to leave Belem by air for Santarem, he was delayed when the plane broke down at the end of the runway. Finally back at the Ginasio, he found one of the Brothers had already left for Rio de Janeiro, where the religious is to spend a year studying Educational Orientation, a course now required of schools by the government.

Besides teaching duties, Brother Julius spends alternate days helping with the farm the Brothers acquired recently. They must clear the jungle before any crops can be raised. During vacation periods the Brothers study in Belem to fulfill governmental requirements for teachers, who must become officially "registered" in each subject they teach.

Shortly after Brother's return, with the boarding students starting to return, the city stores ran out of flour, and since the next boat shipment was a month away, all had to do without bread. But it was possible, Brother pointed out, to buy a case of Pepsi-Cola now and then.

Notre Dame Camp for Boys exists to provide youngsters from eight to fourteen years of age with the fun of camp life, and that in pleasant surroundings and in a Catholic atmosphere. The Brothers of the Congregation of Holy Cross who make up the staff and supervise all camp activities want to make the weeks at camp an unforgettable experience for the boys who come by providing them with those things boys like to do.

Notre Dame Camp has room for 125 boys, who must be no younger than 8 or older than 14. A boy may enroll for two, four, or six weeks. Camp rates are listed on the accompanying information sheet.

If private tutoring is desired in grade or high school subjects, there is an additional charge. Licensed teaching Brothers are the tutors.

Notre Dame Camp opens on the last Sunday in June and continues for six weeks. These six weeks are divided into three periods of two weeks each, and a boy may be enrolled in any one or all periods, as desired. Since the en-

rollment is limited in each two-week period to 125 boys, it is necessary for a boy to be enrolled as soon as possible for the two, four, or six weeks he may choose.

The two-week periods begin, respectively, on the last Sunday of June, the second Sunday of July, and the fourth Sunday of July. Each period ends on the Saturday preceding the day of opening of the following camp period.

Through its games and sports program Notre Dame Camp aims to teach boys indirectly how to give and take. The group activities — games, sports, cookouts, campfires, handicrafts, and the like, allow the campers a wide variety of



amusements. Small chores, like making their own beds or helping with dishes after meals give campers a taste of responsibility and cooperation with others.

The athletic program provides healthful exercise, so necessary to growing boys, and help arouse their interest in competitive play. Softball, volleyball, soccer, tennis, basketball, hiking, horseback riding, archery, swimming, and boating are available to the campers and contribute to their physical development.

All sports and games — in fact, every camp activity — the Brothers carefully supervise. The swimming periods are under the supervision of Brothers who are certified Red Cross lifeguards. Each camper is taught to swim.

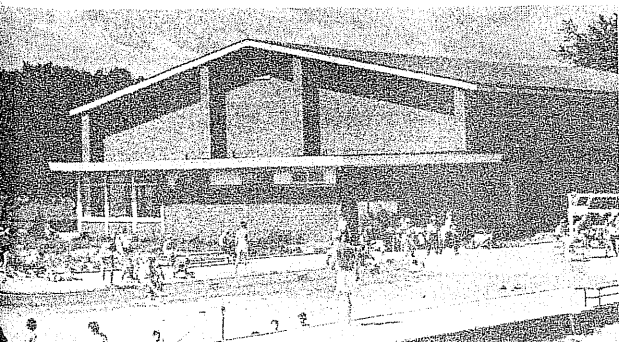

Hence, the Brother counsellors have the incentive to develop and encourage the interests of the boys and the time for the follow-up work.

ACCOMMODATIONS

ALL THE ACCOMMODATIONS of Gilmour Academy are available to the campers. The Campus comprises 133 acres, divided into 35 acres of beech woods, St. Mary's Lake, open fields, two football fields, four tennis courts, two volleyball courts, three softball diamonds, a new indoor swimming pool, extensive lawns and gardens.

FOR INDOOR ACTIVITIES, the campers have Rockne Fieldhouse, the new Gymnasium, Craft Rooms, Music Shed, and the Little Theatre.

TRANSPORTATION is furnished by Gilmour Camp whenever the camper lives within our routes. Routes and schedules are determined after June 20.

LUNCHES may be carried or purchased at the Campus Canteen. Sandwiches from the Grill and soft drinks are available for the boys who want them.

TUTORING in the academic subjects is offered at \$4.00 for the usual fifty-minute period.

SWIMMING will be at Gilmour this summer. Licensed instructors and guards will teach the campers swimming in small squads.

INSURANCE is carried by Gilmour Day Camp on each camper. The camp has the Camper's Accident and Sickness Insurance policy with the Maryland Casualty Company. The benefits are \$1,500 and \$1,000.

The fee includes transportation, accident insurance, craft materials, direction and instruction in sports and recreation activities, training in crafts, movies. Ordinarily, there is no refund for early withdrawal or dismissal.

Camp will be in session five days a week and will open at 10 a.m. and close at 3:30 p.m.

Three St. Joseph High School boys won awards for their exhibits in the Northern Indiana Regional Science Fair, held on April 11. David Demske, a senior, placed first in the chemistry division and is one of the two boys from the region chosen to exhibit his project at the National Science Fair in Hartford, Conn., opening on May 6. Thomas Borlik, a junior, won a first place award in the physics division. Michael McLane, a sophomore, took a second place award in chemistry. The winning science exhibits were student-planned and student-executed.

Among the thirty-nine seniors at Gilmour Academy, four won National Merit Scholarships this year. Competing in the finals will be Richard Vyhnal, Dennis Brennan, Frederick Delse, and Richard Jeffreys.

Eight Gilmour students were district winners in the Ohio High School Speech League's "B" division. Gary Lulenski won first in Original Oratory; Chris Colombi, a first, and Leland Schubert, a second, in Dramatic Readings; John O'Brien, a first, and John Kenesey, a second, in Humorous Reading; Dennis Brennan, a first, and Baker Wood, a second, in Extemporaneous Speech. These winners will now compete in the state finals.
