Brother Wilbert Leveling, C.S.C.

I was born on February 12, 1917, to Stephen and Clara Leveling in St. Paul, Iowa.

I had five sisters and one brother. As a child I moved to Fort Madison, Iowa, where I graduated from St. Joseph's High School. After high school I worked at the Schaeffer Pen Company and later for the

United States Postal Service.

I first learned about the Brothers of Holy Cross from an ad in *Sign Magazine*. I contacted the Brothers and entered Watertown, Wisconsin, in 1939. My first profession was on August 16, 1940, and I started classes at the University

of Notre Dame that same year and graduated in 1944.

After teaching three years at Cathedral High School in Indianapolis, I returned to Notre Dame for my master's degree in history with summers in post graduate studies at the Catholic University of America.

Through the years, God has blessed me with good health allowing me to teach a total of 14 subjects through my years at St. Joseph High School, South Bend; Vincentian Institute, Albany, New York; Holy Trinity High School, Chicago, Illinois; and Holy Cross High School in River Grove, Illinois.

Most recently, from 1981–2012 I worked in the Holy Cross Brothers Archives, with 11 of those summers as a tour guide at the Oratory of St. Joseph in Montreal, Canada. Looking back over my 75 years as a Holy Cross Brother, I know my life has been a happy one, fulfilling, and a great gift from God.

Brother William Schu, C.S.C.

Brother William Leo Schu was born on October 17, 1925, to Clarence Joseph and Estelle Elnora Schu in Chattanooga, Tennessee. His only sibling, Mrs. Carolyne Hoefling, lives in Evansville, Indiana. Brother William, at an early age moved to Evansville and went to Reitz Memorial High School for four years, graduating in 1943. While there, he was taught by Brother Camillus who took a special interest in him and encouraged his interests in the Brothers of Holy Cross.

Brother William is the nephew of Brother Pierre Schu, (his father's brother). Brother Pierre Schu was famous in directing musicals and theatrical shows in a number of schools and was instrumental in directing some future stars on Broadway.

Brother William admired his uncle throughout his high school years so it was no surprise when Brother William entered the Brothers' formation program at Sacred Heart College in Watertown, Wisconsin, immediately after completing high school in 1943.

While at the novitiate, Brother William was cleaning a chimney with a seminarian named Theodore Hesburgh when William's lungs became infected and he was hospitalized. He missed his own first profession and later pronounced his first vows privately to the master of novices in 1945.

Brother Williams' 70 years of service have covered a wide variety of dedicated ministries. A few of his years of service were as teacher, principal, social service worker, and volunteer in Taunton (Massachusetts), Harriman (Tennessee), Lakewood (Ohio), Sherman Oaks (California), Sarasota (Florida) and presently in South Bend (Indiana).

Reflecting on his life, Brother William says, "It has been a marvelous life. God has worked closely with the Brothers to do many good things."

60-Year Jubilarians



Brother Roger P. Berg, C.S.C.

I was born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Immediately after high school, I joined the Brothers of Holy Cross. My hobbies have always centered around sports activities. I was most proud of once qualifying for the Boston Marathon. The trophies in my apartment would attest to the fact that the activity I have enjoyed most is running and winning races.

From 1957–1985, I taught at high schools in Akron, Ohio; Clinton, Michigan; River Grove, Illinois; Monroe, Michigan; and Lakewood; Ohio. In 1985–86 I was a case worker for

Catholic Big Brothers in Cleveland, Ohio.

In 1987 I was in the Milwaukee area and served as a youth minister at St. Jude Parish in Wauwatosa, Wisconsin, then on the faculty of Catholic East Elementary School, Milwaukee, and Marquette High School in Milwaukee. From 1994–2003 I worked for Catholic Social Services of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. Just prior to coming to South Bend, I was a caregiver for mentally challenged and disabled persons.

As blood brothers and Holy Cross Brothers, my brother (Brother Joseph Berg) and I took many vacations together. We both loved to bicycle. We took many exciting bike trips around the country. We even took our bikes to Ireland where we biked for three weeks.

I have enjoyed my life as a Brother since it has given me the ability to help and serve people in need. I like the quote "Preach the Gospel; when necessary use words."



Brother Robert E. Berthiaume, C.S.C.

I grew up in Superior, Wisconsin, on Lake Superior across the bridge from Duluth, Minnesota. I have one brother, Tom, three years younger. The Berthiaume family had a long tradition in the grocery business. We also supplied groceries for the iron ore boats that came to the Superior-Duluth harbor at the western end of Lake Superior.

My family was very active in our parish, Cathedral of Christ the King. I graduated from Cathedral grade and high schools. I did not follow my dad to the College of St. Thomas in St. Paul, Minnesota. Instead I enrolled at St. John's University in Collegeville, Minnesota.

Following two wonderful years at St. John's, I joined the Brothers of Holy Cross and arrived at Watertown, Wisconsin, in June, 1954. Then on to Rolling Prairie, Indiana, our novitiate, for one year, followed by two years at Dujarie Hall, completing my college studies at Notre Dame University in 1957.

As a Latin and English teacher I taught for a few years at Hoban High School, Akron, Ohio; St. Edward High School, Lakewood, Ohio; Gilmour Academy, Gates Mills, Ohio; and Holy Cross High School, River Grove, Illinois.

Then in 1965 I was off to Bishop David High School in Louisville, Kentucky, as part of a pioneering faculty. Following my seven years in Kentucky, including exciting post-Vatican II years, I returned to my first love—St. Edward High School—where I remained for 30 years, first in guidance, then as assistant principal.

In 2001 I moved to Holy Cross Village, Notre Dame, Indiana, and worked in the marketing office selling new villas at the village.

Since my years at Collegeville, I have always had a keen interest in liturgical music. I played the organ at Lakewood during my years there. When I arrived at Holy Cross Village, two opportunities opened up for me. I became the musician for the Village's Saturday 5:00 PM Mass, and I joined the choir at St. Mary's Church of Loretto. I still continue in these two music ventures.

60 years? Time really flies. I am grateful to God for calling me to be a Brother of Holy Cross. These have been fantastic years.



Brother Joseph Fox, C.S.C.

My twin sister, Joann, and I were born April 15, 1935, in Sugar Grove, Ohio. I am the last of eight children. We both left home the same day, September 8, 1953. Joann traveled to Columbus, Ohio, to Mount Carmel School of Nursing, operated by the Sisters of the Holy Cross. I traveled with my parents by car to Sacred

Heart Juniorate, Watertown, Wisconsin, where I began my journey as a Brother of Holy Cross. We did not know that these two groups had the same founder, Blessed Basil Moreau.

First, I thank my parents for a family atmosphere that fostered my vocation to religious life. Without this I most likely would not be here today.

I am grateful to the Brothers for my formation and encouragement on my journey in religious life. I have had many opportunities, some recommended to me and others I chose. In every case I was given the tools and education to achieve my objective. For this I am humbled and most grateful to my many religious superiors along the way.

My years in Holy Cross have taken me on a long winding road of experiences: food service director and cook in Akron (Ohio), Watertown (Wisconsin), South Bend (Indiana); Provincial Treasurer's office, Notre Dame, treasurer at Hoban High School in Akron as well as at Cathedral High School, Indianapolis; Youth Ministry, Archdiocese of Anchorage; and while stationed at our school in Akron, I took student volunteers to West Virginia to assist those less fortunate. I also served as Director of Admissions and Director of Community Service at Hoban High School, Director of Holy Cross Brothers Center, Notre Dame, and Director of Religious, Holy Cross Village at Notre Dame.

In these 60 years, I have had the privilege to serve my fellow religious, and laity in so many ways. I have met and interacted with people from all walks of life. Early on I realized that EVERY ONE has something to offer and I did my best to help them realize this in themselves.

I give thanks to all those men of Holy Cross who have helped me along this journey. With the help of the Holy Spirit, during these 60 years I hope I was able to bring the presence of God into the lives of those whom I have had the honor of serving. Whether it be an audience or a church assembly, he is always grateful for the opportunity to inspire and help lift the hearts and spirits of others.

He has also been devoted to writing music arrangements for choir, piano, organ, and instruments, especially for the annual Brothers' jubilee celebrations at Notre Dame's Sacred Heart Basilica.

Brother Richard Armstrong, C.S.C.

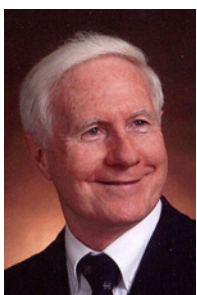
We are called to see Christ in others and to live in such a way that others can see Christ in us. I was born on July 16, 1946, to Earl and Anna Marie Armstrong. My parents were hard-working, very giving, and devoted to my older brother Ron and me. I attended a Catholic elementary school and met the Brothers of Holy Cross

when I enrolled at Reitz Memorial High School in Evansville, Indiana. Like my parents, I found the Brothers to be hard-working, devoted to God and their students. Because of their example and grace from God, I entertained the possibility of a vocation to serve God and others by joining the Brothers of Holy Cross.

After a novitiate year of prayer, I pronounced my vows to God, and six years later I made them for life.

I was in the first class at Holy Cross College in South Bend, Indiana. Chicago then was calling, so I graduated from DePaul University there and later received a master's degree in Spirituality. While attending college, I taught social studies and senior religion at Holy Trinity High School in Chicago. After eighteen years of teaching, I heard a call to move to Phoenix, Arizona, to serve and be served by the poor and homeless at Andre House.

Because of my formation by the Brothers and my time at Holy Trinity and Andre House, I have grown to see Christ in others (the poor, homeless, and the suffering), and I pray that they may see Christ in my fifty years of service.



Brother Lewis Brazil, C.S.C.

Brother Lewis Brazil was one of triplet boys born in Faribault, Minnesota. One of his brothers died three days after birth, and Lewis' twin brother, Larry, died of leukemia in 1987. Both Lewis and Larry graduated from St. John's University in Collegeville, Minnesota, with degrees in music.

After completing an MA degree in Theology at the University of Notre Dame, Brother Lewis began teaching at St. Joseph High School in South Bend, Indiana, and then became band director at Archbishop Hoban High School in Akron, Ohio. From there, he went to St. Edward High School in Lakewood, Ohio, to teach music and begin a Campus Ministry Program which continues to this day.

In 1985, he began studies in gerontology at the University of Minnesota while caring for his mother whose health was declining. In 1986, he returned to the St. Edward community in Lakewood to begin a career in the geriatric delivery system as a coordinator at the local senior center. While working at the Senior Center, he earned an MSW degree in social work

and later worked as a Geriatric Mental Health Case Manager for the Benjamin Rose Institute in Cleveland.

In 2001, Brother Lewis moved to Phoenix to live in community with eleven Holy Cross Priests and was employed at the Catholic Outreach Center in Sun City, Arizona. This agency provided social services for the five Catholic parishes in the Sun City area.

In 2007, with the encouragement of his Provincial, Brother Lewis moved back to Notre Dame to provide social services for the independent residents of Holy Cross Village and Andre Place. Brother Lewis continued his musical interests with the formation of the Holy Cross Village Jazz Ensemble in 2007. In 2009, due to the increasing healthcare needs of Brothers in the Midwest Province, he dedicated his full attention to Province members and was appointed Director of Aging & Healthcare. Brother Lewis says "he feels blessed by God and his community to serve the needs of so many people (young and old) during the past fifty years."



Brother Thomas Maddix, C.S.C.

I was born in Providence, Rhode Island, raised in Manly, Iowa, and educated in Austin (Texas), Notre Dame (Indiana), and Berkeley (California). Along the way I have been a high school teacher, undergraduate and graduate school instructor, a director of vocations for the Midwest Province, and founder of the

Solitude of St. Joseph at Columba Hall, Notre Dame. In my later years I have been both a health care consultant and executive in Vancouver, British Columbia, and Edmonton, Alberta.

I have authored one book, co-authored two others, and written numerous articles focused on spirituality, ethics, the vowed life, health care leadership, and mission integrity. At the conclusion of my career in health care leadership, I was awarded the first "Life Time Achievement for Leadership in Catholic Health" by the Catholic Health Alliance of Canada. One recent highlight of my retirement was an invitation to speak at a Vatican Health Conference and reside in the same building with the Pope.

Retired now in Vancouver, British Columbia, I volunteer two mornings a week at a local hospital, consult on issues confronting Catholic health care in Canada, and teach as a member of the core faculty in a leadership program for executives in Catholic health care in Western and Eastern Canada. I also remain an adjunct member of the faculty of St. Stephen's College at the University of Alberta where I teach an on-line graduate course in Christian Spirituality.

Throughout all these adventures, I am deeply grateful for the on-going support and openness of the Midwest Province and Congregation of Holy Cross.



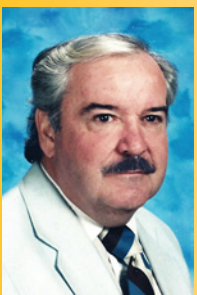
Brother Louis Mangini, C.S.C.

Born in Chicago on August 2, 1937, to John and Eleanor Mangini, I attended St. Genevieve elementary school run by the Sisters of Providence, then on to Weber High School operated by the Resurrectionist priests. After that, I worked as an inventory specialist for a few years until receiving a draft notice

for the US Army. Fortunately my two years in the army, 1961–63, were during peace time so instead of leaving the Army with PTSD, I left having the opportunity then to examine my attraction to religious life. And here I am fifty years later thanking God for all the ways my life has been blessed—blessed with a fantastic family, wonderful friends, and talented and loving religious Brothers.

I received my bachelor’s degree in accounting from St. Edward’s University in 1968 and began teaching that same year at Holy Cross High School in River Grove, Illinois. My summers during the years 1968 to 1974 were spent at Notre Dame where I received my master’s degree in Business Administration. I spent a total of 21 years teaching and ministering as School Business Manager at Holy Cross High School in River Grove until in 1989 I accepted an invitation to head south. The invitation was from Holy Cross High School in New Orleans, Louisiana. Again, I was blessed to join a talented and prayerful group ministering at one of our oldest schools. In 1994 I was told that Holy Cross High School in San Antonio, a school on the poor west side of town, was in need of a business manager, so I packed up and this time headed west to Texas. Most of the time from 1994 until now has been in San Antonio. Three years ago at the age of 74 I moved up to St. Edward’s University in Austin so I guess at this point I have completed the cycle.

In a way, I believe all of religious life has gone through a cycle in the past 50 years. The early 1960’s seemed to be the hay day of religious communities, and there is no denying now that most communities are struggling to survive. Nevertheless, I have no regrets and continue to be thankful for all the ways God has blessed my life.



Brother John McMuldren, C.S.C.

I was born on August 6, 1942, to John and Catherine (Darby) McMuldren; I was blessed with two older and loving sisters: Dee (Dolores) Igleheart and Trudy Abercrombie. My family was proud of our Irish Catholic heritage. My eight years at St. Sebastian’s School and four years at Archbishop Hoban High School

strengthened my Catholic roots. While at Hoban, I was in Brother Andrew Sukenik’s glee club for four years, and he

encouraged me in my thoughts about joining the Brothers of Holy Cross.

Most of my 50 years of religious life could be divided into three main chapters. The first chapter of 10 years was at Holy Cross High School in River Grove, Illinois. I discovered that I loved to teach and work as a counselor. I enjoyed community life and being part of a dedicated faculty; I felt very confident there in my decision to become a Brother and made my final vows there.

The second main chapter of 10 years was in Alaska. With an invitation from Archbishop Hurley and the encouragement of our provincial Br. Charles Krupp, I became the Director of Youth Ministry for the Archdiocese of Anchorage. I loved it. I was surrounded by natural beauty and great youth ministers. What an incredible place to live and minister! The people and church there made any sacrifice worthwhile.

The third chapter of 14 years was in Tyler, Texas. Bishop T.K. Gorman Schools enabled me to participate in the dramatic growth of the struggling Tyler Catholic School System into one of the finest “Blue Ribbon” schools in the state. Our graduates continue to earn significant scholarships to great universities and have become leaders in the community.

Presently, I am semi-retired and working in the Provincial Development Office. I also enjoy living and working with the residents here at Holy Cross Village. Thank you to those, named and unnamed, for your love and guidance through the years. God has been very good to me, and I am very grateful.



Brother Philip Smith, C.S.C.

I was born in Gary, Indiana, and was educated in grade school by the Sisters of the Holy Cross. Sister Maria Gemma, C.S.C., was instrumental in my coming to know about the Brothers. 25-year Jubilarian



Brother Roberto Ortega Jimenez, C.S.C.

Growing up in the west Texas town of Fort Hancock, I had no idea that Brothers existed. It wasn't until I visited Saint Edward's University in Austin, Texas that I found out about the brothers vocation. It was an eye opening experience. I was elated to think I could serve the church as

a brother.

I really felt comfortable as a brother because Christ seemed to me to be a brother.

Christ worked among his followers, visited synagogues, studied and learned the rules and regulations, but spent most of his ministry walking with the people whom he served.

Brother James Spooner, C.S.C.

Born in Cleveland, Ohio, Brother James Spooner is the fifth child and only son of Clarence and Anna Spooner. He attended Our Lady of Angels Grade School and St. Edward High School. It was the influence of the brothers that led him to join the Brothers.

After professing first vows, Brother James began his college education at the University of Notre Dame. In two years he moved to Boyssville of Michigan. During his five years at Boyssville, he completed a B.S. at Eastern Michigan University.

In 1972 Brother James began ministry at Monroe Catholic Central High School. He pursued evening and summer classes at Eastern Michigan and completed an M.S. in 1977.

1982–1985 Brother James joined two other brothers at Holy Family School in Ashland, Ky., a K–12 ministry of the Catholic parish in Boyd County. He taught science to students in grades 7 to 12. During this time he began administrative studies at Christian Brothers University completing his master's in administration in 1988.

The next year Brother James moved to Muskegon, Michigan, and became principal and part-time teacher at Muskegon Catholic Central Junior High School. This was followed by two years as associate principal at Archbishop Hoban High School in Akron.

Brother James' next ministry was as president and principal of St. Edward High School in Lakewood, Ohio filling the dual role for five years, and then serving eight years as president. It was a chance to renew acquaintances and lead the school he had graduated from 24 years earlier.

After a sabbatical year, Brother James assumed leadership of Holy Cross High School in River Grove, Ill., where he served the first year as president and the second as president and principal. Declining enrollment led to the close of the school.

Brother James was then invited to return to Archbishop Hoban as associate principal, the ministry he continues today.

Brother James is grateful to God for the brothers who have mentored him, opportunities to minister in places which have enlivened his faith and wonderful people to work beside.
