FROM ST. EDWARD HIGH SCHOOL, CLEVELAND: SEH students are showing much interest in and attending the five-minute prayer sessions in the school chapel at the beginning of each lunch period. A diversity of prayer experiences--from brief readings of Scripture to slide-film presentations--are organized by Father John Blazek, the students, or the teachers. \*\* St. Ed's was the donor collection center for the Red Cross Bloodmobile last month. Donors were St. Ed students and teachers as well as students and adults from the area. \*\* A committee of several Brothers has been organized to promote vocations in the school this year. \*\* Br. Robert Kelly, director of alumni, has organized a "Phone Power" system whereby all graduates are being called and asked to donate to a drive for \$35,000 for new gymnasium bleachers. \*\* Students, teachers and administrators of St. Ed's are involved in an all-out effort to promote interest in Catholic education and particularly enrollment at SEH. The program includes talks to 8th grade boys and to groups of parents, visits to St. Ed's by small groups of grade-schoolers, and activities in the high school for 7th and 8th grade boys that include a spelling contest, a speech tournament, and a writing contest. A dinner and social for elementary school principals and 8th grade teachers recently, along with an "open house," brought overwhelming response. The school is literally "going out to the crossroads and bringing them in." \*\* Br. Thomas Henning, principal, was appointed to the planning committee for the Ohio Catholic Education Convention to be held in September 1975.

Brothers at St. Ed's celebrated last month the sixty-fifth jubilee of vows of Br. Theophilus Machalinski, our province "patriarch." Despite his years, Br. Theophilus carries on a full day of work, regularly cleaning the common rooms of the faculty house and doing many other needed tasks. He stands out as a shining example of loyalty and commitment to the work of Holy Cross.

Brother John Miller has been involved in a number of projects related to the Roncalli Center and its program for advancement of religious education for the Archdiocese of Louisville. He is one of three on a religious radio talk show broadcast once a month in the city, and in recent programs has discussed such topics as amnesty, election of bishops, and youth and today's Church. Br. John has also been "on tour" with his slide-tape program on To Teach As Jesus Did. He has already made the presentation to twenty groups within the archdiocese. For a workshop last month he videotaped three children's liturgies. Recently he became editor of a new publication, NetNews, an ecumenical resource newsletter.

The Louisville community spent a weekend at Otter Creek Park to relax and evaluate their covenant made last June. The stay ended with a Mass celebrated outdoors with friends from the city. \*\* Brs. Carroll Posey, Joseph Ballard, John Miller and James May attended the National Council of Teachers of English meeting in New Orleans during the Thanksgiving holiday.

Coping with inflation, Br. John Federowicz, Library Director of Carroll College in Helena, Montana, has effected various efficiencies over the years so that while monies spent for books and periodicals have tripled and staff salaries have kept apace, the total library budget is less than it was five years ago. Recently the library was designated a depository for government publications. Br. John has been granted tenure at the school, has been elected to the faculty senate, and in the winter-spring semester will conduct a television-based continuing education course, "The Ascent of Man." This superb series was assembled by the eminent Jacob Bronowski and will be shown at prime time on Public Broadcasting System educational channels. Carroll College is offering this course to senior citizens at a cost of ten dollars and to others for upper or lower division credit at normal tuition rates.

John Glenn, America's first astronaut and senator-elect from Ohio, recently spoke to the upperclassmen at St. Edward High School, Cleveland.

Recently Br. Elmo Bransby, assistant superior general, wrote to all provincials and district superiors commenting on the World Food Congress, his own concerns about the food crisis, and the reaction of some students in Rome who have formed "The Student Action Against Hunger." As a sign of their solidarity with the poor, the hungry, and those who are "used" by the world, these students decided to hold a week of prayer and reflection, to end with a special day of fast and prayer. Their intent is to create an atmosphere in which the students of other universities of Rome will become conscious of the problems of hunger and justice.

Br. Giles Martin has been assigned to Gilmour Academy. \*\* Br. Timothy O'Connell is now working at Mount Carmel Medical Center in Columbus, Ohio. \*\* Capitulants of the 1973 provincial chapter will meet February 1 at the Brothers Center to decide on procedures for election of the provincial, coming up in 1976. \*\* After being consulted, jubilarians in this year's group decided by overwhelming majority not to have a group celebration at the Center. Observances will be in the local houses.

At the annual board meeting at St. Charles Boys Home in Milwaukee, Br. Warren Shea was given a Distinguished Service plaque for his more than twenty-five years of service at the institution. The board also renamed the school's transition house Shea Hall.
