

Midwest . . . NEWS NOTES

BROTHERS of HOLY CROSS - NOTRE DAME, INDIANA 46556

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Recently the Midwest Province joined the National Catholic Coalition for Responsible Investment. At present, twelve religious communities make up Region VIII (Indiana and Michigan). The bylaws of Region VIII were approved at a meeting held on August 22, 1977, at Moreau Seminary. The purposes of the association are: (1) to raise theological and ethical questions related to investments; (2) to assist members to express social responsibility with investments; (3) to assist members to act when necessary to prevent or correct corporate policy which leads to social injury; (4) to support the social policy and program objectives of the National Catholic Coalition for Responsible Investment and the Interfaith Center on Corporate Responsibility; (5) to consider proposals for projects for action presented by one or more members; (6) to review and discuss corporate proxy statements. Meetings are held six times during the year. Br. Donald Bailer represents the Midwest Province at these meetings.

Receiving advanced degrees this summer were Brs. Raymond Dufresne, Master of Library Science, Rosary College; James Spooner, Master of Science, Eastern Michigan University; David Fitzgerald, Master of Science (Geology), Iowa State University; Lawrence Stewart, Doctor of Philosophy (Biology), University of Texas.

Two training sessions in the liturgy were also conducted at the Brothers Center by the Notre Dame Murphy Center in September.

The Resilient Church: The Necessity and Limits of Adaptation, by
Avery Dulles. Doubleday, 1977. \$7.95.

The author of *Models of the Church* develops some further reflections on the mission of the Church and the dynamics of renewal.
