Holy Cross School, the 'Miracle on Paris Avenue'



It has been over 35 years since I was a student at Loyola University and lived at Tulane University for a summer on a Catholic Communications grant in Journalism. Last week I went to New Orleans to photograph the Notre Dame Women win the NCAA Basketball Championship...such was not the case. Prior to the Notre Dame game I was introduced to Mike Bujol, athletic director the past two years at Holy Cross High School in New Orleans, and tournament director for the NCAA basketball games in New Orleans.

Mike invited me to visit the post-Katrina Holy Cross which was rebuilt at 5500 Paris Avenue in the Gentilly 7th Ward neighborhood. Holy Cross has been in New Orleans for 163 years and 134 years at Holy Cross School for young men, grades 5-12.

Bujol, a Loyola University graduate and veteran New Orleans area broadcaster, served recently at the University of New Orleans as Sports Information Director. Mike got his inspiration to be sports information director in 1982 from my mentor, Roger Valdiserri, former SID at Notre Dame, who I first met in 1968...such a small world.

Prior to the August 29, 2005 Katrina Hurricane, Holy Cross Priests, Brothers and Sisters had made their mark on the New Orleans 9th Ward. Five Brothers were sent there in 1849 by Rev. Basil Moreau, Superior General and founder of the Congregation of Holy Cross, in LeMans France. At the time the Congregation of Holy Cross was just 12 years old. The first five Holy Cross Brothers arrived May 18, 1849 to take over St. Mary's Orphanage. New Orleans had been hit by

epidemics including cholera, yellow fever and malaria. Living conditions prior to the American Civil War were almost unbearable. The Brothers began St. Isadore Farm in the 9th Ward in 1859 when they bought the Reyes Farm, a riverfront plantation. The farm would provide food for the students at the school they would found in 1879.

The school was first known as St. Isadore's College. By June 1890 the Louisiana Legislature gave Holy Cross College the right to confer Bachelor and Masters Degrees. The old main building is now the only evidence of Holy Cross having been there in the 9th Ward for 156 years. The old main building was built in 1895 for \$15,000. In 1897 as the need for St. Mary's Orphanage diminished, Holy Cross established St. Isadore's College and Day School. Holy Cross High School considers 1879 as the date the present Holy Cross School was established. The area was known as the "Holy Cross Historic District."

In 1923 the first Ursuline School for Girls (the oldest Catholic School in America), was destroyed to make room for the 1923 Industrial Canal (the same Industrial Canal which experienced levee failures that flooded large parts of New Orleans when **Hurricane Betsy** hit in 1965 and **Hurricane Katrina** in August 2005).

Over the years a number of additions were made to the 9TH Ward property beginning in 1954 and ending in 2002 (See **picture of old property taken by the California Highway Patrol after the flood waters from the broken levees went down**). At one time some 150 boarders were part of the 800 member student body. The boarding program ended in 1972.

When Katrina hit New Orleans, Mr. Charles DiGange, a '64 graduate of Holy Cross School and 25-year Director of Institutional Advancement at Loyola University, New Orleans, had his vision of Holy Cross as a fundraiser to 'rebuild' bringing about the 'Miracle on Paris Avenue.' DiGange became Holy Cross' Headmaster in 2004, a year before Katrina hit. He was a member of the Holy Cross faculty from 1968-1989.

Since Katrina all of the old school buildings have been leveled with the exception of the historic main building. The school is currently attempting to sell the portions of the former property to invest in the new school on Paris Avenue. The population of the 9th Ward is now about 40 percent of pre-Katrina levels.

Holy Cross bought the 20 acres in the Gentilly 7th Ward neighborhood from the

Archdiocese of New Orleans. It had been the site of St. Frances Cabrini Shrine Church and Redeemer-Seton High School. The diocese decided not to rebuild the church, built in the 1960's, because of the cost to repair the flood damage as well as the fact the mostly African-American population of the flooded neighborhood decreased by more than half in the years following Hurricane Katrina.

After Katrina and the purchase of the new land, for two years, until 2007 Holy Cross students were educated in some 30 mobile classrooms located at the new Paris Avenue site. The student dining hall building was just completed in January 2013. The school is presently preparing a middle school athletic field where the mobile classrooms were located. Students are bussed into Holy Cross from as far as 25 miles away. Holy Cross at 900 students, grades 5-12 is one of the only schools in New Orleans proper to gain population after Katrina.

The new school currently has 5 buildings, 20 acres, 900 students from grades 5-12 and plans to buy additional property, build an auditorium, pool and chapel. The school hopes to continue to increase its enrollment to 1200 young men. The current value of the new property, buildings and equipment is 120 million dollars. FEMA paid for much of the new school along with alumni, donors from across the country as well as Holy Cross institutions. The school still carries a debt on the facility.

Holy Cross is now one of the finest schools in Louisiana or the nation. It was an honor to have Mr. Bujor give me the full tour of the facility. Mr. Charles DiGange, Holy Cross Headmaster, was at St. Edward's University for meetings at the time of my visit. Congratulations to all who work on and made this "Miracle on Paris Avenue" happen. The Congregation of Holy Cross has reasons to be proud of your efforts to continue the vision of our founder the Blessed Basil Anthony Mary Moreau who had the vision to send Holy Cross religious to New Orleans in 1849.

Buttigieg is a South Bend native having spent his early years less than a mile south of Holy Cross College. In a relatively short time his energy and

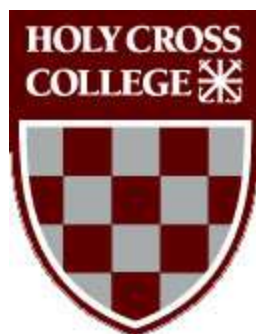

He also serves as the representative for the city and its residents for special events and ceremonies. His goals for the city include strengthening the local economy by retaining and attracting businesses, partnering with the local public school system, managing a cutting-edge and transparent city administration while providing safety and security by empowering neighborhoods throughout our community.

As if that wasn't enough he performed "Rhapsody in Blue" with the South Bend Symphony Orchestra earlier this year.
